

Legislation:

Below is a list of bills signed by the Governor that have a huge impact on hunting and wildlife.

AB 44 (Friedman) – Fur Products: Prohibition, SIGNED

As chaptered October 12th, AB 44 – legislation by Assembly Member Laura Friedman (D/43-Burbank) – will make it unlawful to sell, offer for sale, display for sale, trade, give, donate, or otherwise distribute a new fur product in California for monetary or nonmonetary consideration. The bill will also make it illegal to manufacture a fur product in the state. AB 44 will go into effect on January 1, 2023.

AB 44 defines "fur product" as any article of clothing or covering for any part of the body, or any fashion accessory, including, but not limited to, handbags, shoes, slippers, hats, earmuffs, scarves, shawls, gloves, jewelry, keychains, toys or trinkets, and home accessories and decor, that is made in whole or in part of fur.

AB 44 expressly states that "fur product" does not include taxidermy, and defines taxidermy as "the practice of preparing, stuffing, and mounting the skin, in lifelike form, of any fish, reptile, amphibian, bird, or mammal". The bill, among other things, does not apply to a dog or cat fur product; an animal skin or part thereof that is to be converted into leather, which in processing will have the hair, fleece, or fur fiber completely removed; cowhide with hair attached; and deerskin, sheepskin, or goatskin with hair attached. AB 44 also exempts "used" fur products but does

require that a person that sells or trades an exempt fur product maintain a record of each sale or trade for at least one year.

AB 273 (Gonzalez) – Recreational and Commercial Fur Trapping: Prohibition – SIGNED

As chaptered September 4th, AB 273 – legislation by Assembly Member Lorena Gonzalez (D/80-San Diego) – will, among other things, make it illegal to trap any furbearing mammal or nongame mammal for purposes of recreation or commerce in fur and prohibit the purchasing or sale of the raw fur of any fur-bearing mammal or nongame mammal. Coined the "Wildlife Protection Act of 2019", AB 273 also eliminates fur dealer and fur agent licenses.

AB 1254 (Kamlager-Dove) - Bobcats: Take Prohibition **SIGNED** will fully prohibit the hunting of bobcats statewide. Commencing January 1, 2025, the bill will authorize the Fish and Game Commission to reopen a bobcat hunting season in any area determined by the Commission to "require" a hunt. However, the bill will require that, before a bobcat season could be reopened by the Commission, the Legislature will have to appropriate funds specifically for, among other things, Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) to complete a bobcat management plan to inform bobcat management decisions. Further, the bill specifies that the bobcat management plan shall include: 1) a current statewide bobcat population estimate based on the best available science; 2) an assessment of the overall health of the statewide bobcat population; 3) a comprehensive strategy to manage bobcat populations and their habitat throughout the state, including, but not limited to, an assessment of the effects of climate change, such as from drought and wildfires; rodenticides; and human development on the state's bobcats, the bobcats' prey, and the bobcats' habitats; 4) an investigation of efficacious nonlethal solutions to prevent bobcat predation on livestock; and 5) recommendations for regulatory or statutory changes necessary to implement the bobcat management plan. AB 1254 will also require the Commission to set hunting license and bobcat hunting tags fees for any subsequent seasons in which bobcat hunting is allowed at the levels necessary to fully recover all the reasonable administrative and implementation costs to DFW and the Commission associated with the hunting of bobcats. The recent addition of language which requires an appropriation from the Legislature for, among other things, DFW to develop and implement the management plan and the Commission to reopen the bobcat hunting season is especially troublesome. Although the language eliminates development of the plan being yet another unfunded mandate placed on DFW, it places an additional stumbling block in the way of a possible future reopening of the season by requiring that the Legislature specifically earmark funding for that purpose – a difficult "ask" at best, given the current makeup of the building would, until January 1, 2025, fully prohibit the hunting of bobcats. Commencing January 1, 2025, AB 1254 would re-authorize the Fish and Game Commission -- through its normal mammal hunting rulemaking process -- to reopen a bobcat hunting season in any area determined by the Commission to "require" a hunt. The language of the bill specifies that, in doing so, the Commission shall consider the potential impacts of a bobcat hunting season, including: 1) bobcat populations; 2) bobcat wild prey; 3) disease abatement; 4) the control of invasive species, especially nutria; 5) consideration of public values with regard to the hunting of bobcats; and 6) the administrative, implementation, and enforcement costs to DFW and the Commission associated with bobcat hunting.

The above bills basically eliminate any trapping and fur trade.

A concern within the process of those bills relates to the Governor requesting favorable modification to language or he wouldn't sign. Legislature didn't make the modifications and sent him these bills and he promptly signed them. From our lobbyist Bill Gaines and CWA lobbyist Mark Hensley and CRPA lobbyist Roy Griffith, they expect with the Governor caving on those bills that new bills will be introduced to the elimination of certain hunting of species will be introduced after the first of the year. The original bobcat bill had bears included in the language but was removed so it would be more favorable to pass. Another word, not enough people hunt bobcats to give enough resistance within the process. They expect a bill to eliminate bear hunting will be introduced soon.

SB 395 (Archuleta) – "Wildlife Traffic Safety Act" – SIGNED As chaptered October 13th, SB 395 – legislation by Senator Bob Archuleta (D/32-Cerritos) – will, upon appropriation of funding by the Legislature, improve public safety and help protect our wildlife resources by reducing the frequency of vehicle-wildlife collisions on California's roadways. Coined the "Wildlife Traffic Safety Act", SB 395 will also help clean California's roadways, while reducing the needless waste of a healthy, free-range wild food source. This legislation was sponsored by the California Deer Association with the assistance of Gaines & Associates, and in coordination with the Road Ecology Center at the University of California at Davis and the California Rifle and Pistol Association.

As chaptered, SB 395 will, upon appropriation by the Legislature, authorize the California Fish and Game Commission to establish a pilot program by no later than January 1, 2022 for the issuance of wildlife salvage permits through a user and cell-phone-friendly web-based portal developed by DFW to persons desiring to salvage the meat of deer, elk, antelope or wild pigs killed as a result of a vehicle collision on a roadway. The bill requires the Commission to prescribe the requirements for applying for and receiving a wildlife salvage permit. The bill also

authorizes the Commission to restrict the roadways where wildlife salvage may be conducted and the species subject to salvage. Motorists who do not choose to salvage animals, although not required, can still report them to facilitate their removal and possible use.

SB 395 will, upon appropriation by the Legislature, require DFW to develop and implement the pilot program to collect and compile information and data on wildlife-vehicle collisions no later than six months after the Commission establishes the pilot program. The bill limits the pilot program to a maximum of three geographically dispersed sites identified by DFW to be areas of frequent wildlifevehicle collisions. The bill also authorizes DFW to coordinate with other state agencies that remove dead wildlife from roadways to determine the scope of data collected on wildlife-vehicle collisions. At the conclusion of the pilot program, SB 395 requires DFW to report to the Commission on the number of wildlife-vehicle collisions identified during the study period, barriers to additional data collection, the feasibility of creating a statewide wildlife-vehicle collision reporting system, and the estimated cost of implementing a statewide wildlife-vehicle collision reporting system.

Although the "meat salvage" aspect of the bill highlighted most discussions, the reporting aspect is the key component. SB 395 will facilitate critically needed reporting of where vehicle/wildlife collisions occur so Caltrans, DFW, CHP and other state agencies can better assess where future wildlife highway crossings would provide the greatest benefits for both wildlife and motorists would improve public safety and help protect our wildlife resources by reducing the frequency of vehicle-wildlife collisions on California's roadways. Coined the "Wildlife Traffic Safety Act", SB 395 would also help clean California's roadways, while reducing the needless waste of a healthy, free-range wild food source. This legislation is sponsored by the California Deer Association with the assistance of Gaines & Associates, and in coordination with the Road Ecology Center at the University of California at Davis.

Note: SB395 starts the process for a program to be implemented. As mentioned above and pasted here, "upon appropriation by the Legislature, authorize the California Fish and Game Commission to establish a pilot program by no later than January 1, 2022 for the issuance of wildlife salvage permits through a user and cell-phone-friendly web-based portal developed by DFW to persons desiring to salvage the meat of deer, elk, antelope or wild pigs killed as a result of a vehicle collision on a roadway. The bill requires the Commission to prescribe the requirements for applying for and receiving a wildlife salvage permit. The bill also authorizes the Commission to restrict the roadways where wildlife salvage may be conducted and the species subject to salvage." Until the legislature and Commission final this law wildlife salvage is still illegal.

Eureka, Kansas

On Sunday, October 27, 2019, I began my drive to Eureka, Kansas, from Los Angeles for my second Whitetail hunt with the 'Fall River Outfitters.' Fall River Outfitters is a small, one man operation run by a gentleman named Al Gulick. Al has one hundred tree stands and around thirty cameras set up all over the approximately ten thousand acres he leases for hunting. Al is a great guy and very helpful, plus as a lifetime resident really knows the area.

I spent three nights on the road in my RV staying at truck stops and rest areas. I had an interesting breakfast at Lonita's Cafe in Roy, New Mexico. Lenity's serves hash browns and 'toast' with their french toast, I've never heard of that before, but I guess if you're feeling starch and carbohydrate deprived this will fix you right up. I arrived in Eureka on Wednesday afternoon October, 30th. After being there for about fifteen minutes Al asked if I was ready to go out for an afternoon hunt, I

declined because I needed to get my equipment in order. following morning I got up at about 4:00AM and was in the tree stand about an hour before daybreak. It was my first morning and it was 13 degrees. I saw several does and a couple bucks but most were well out of long bow range. I sat in the stand until about 10:00AM when my frozen feet made me cry uncle. At 3:30PM I was back in the stand, I saw a few does and their yearlings, a couple were within range but I was looking for

a good Buck. I got a doe last year and was determine to get a buck this year.

Day two was about the same as the previous day but a bit warmer. I saw some does within range and a couple of bucks at sixty yards behind scattered trees. Getting out of the tree stand in the evening I startled two does I didn't know were there, apparently right behind the stand. They started making a barking sound which to me sounded like two little Chihuahuas, kinda scared the crap out of me. I asked the more experienced hunters if they had ever heard deer make that kind of vocalization? They said they hadn't, I swear that I did.

On day three it got decidedly warmer and I saw nothing at all morning or night and was very disappointed. On the morning of day four, Al moved me to another stand

and I didn't see anything there either. Later that afternoon I decided to go back to the original stand. The wind wasn't quite right but I like that location, a lot. The stand is set up about sixty yards from where I shot my doe last year, I just like the way this stand looks and feels. I saw a couple of doe's but it was extremely windy and there wasn't too much activity except for a Possum poaching some corn.

On Tuesday the morning, day five of my hunt, I drove into the field and parked in my usual spot, about a quarter of a mile from the stand. Two does were standing where I usually parked and I scared them away as I drove in. It was overcast and very dark when I arrived at my stand and I got settled in about an hour before daylight. I could hear movement down on the ground and the sound of deer eating corn but couldn't see anything, it was pitch black. As it started to get light I could make out the silhouettes of three deer. I so badly wanted to see a buck I could have sworn I saw antlers, I reached up and got my bow off of the rack. As it got a little lighter I could just barely make out three does. It still wasn't shooting light and

they stayed in the area eating until it was almost light enough to take a shot. All of a sudden they started to get nervous raising their heads, looking around and sniffing. I thought that they had pinned me although I hadn't moved. Shortly thereafter they moved off and disappeared into the trees. Then, all of a sudden out of nowhere a big buck walked in towards the stand from a direction that I had not seen them come in before.

figured he was the reason the doe's had gotten so antsy. He walked around just out of range behind a couple of trees and then finally came into range and put his head down to eat. I stood up and started to draw my bow but the fletching on the arrows in my bow quiver brushed against the shooting rail on the stand and made a sound, he raised his head and looked in my direction. There I was at half draw with my sixty pound bow for what seemed like an eternity but I waited until he glanced away to let down. It was ten minutes to seven and there was finally sufficient light to take a shot, when he lowered his head the second time I came to full draw, took aim, and loosed Continued on page 9

Thanks again for your support. We had about 60 people total for the first Annual Hollywood Celebrity Archery Shoot, including 16 NASP kids from San Diego. See photos -- https://www.facebook.com/ snowgooseproductions/ The pictures give you a feeling for it. The fires have really had an influence in that area. The CVA range did not catch fire, but the smoke still lingered and drove my eyes nuts. Some of the folks who said they would be there could not attend because of delays in shooting due to fires forced people into overtime. Nonetheless Frank Stallone, Diamond Farnsworth, Tim Abell, several musicians, stunt people and an Oscar-winning foley artist, combined with retired game wardens from "Wild Justice" gave us plenty of celebs. And some folks like the half a dozen stunt women who had to go to location want to come next year.

Frank Stallone was the winner for celebs. but Diamond Farnsworth stole the show as he brought along a vintage bow -- in "Rambo" he was Sylvester Stallone's stunt double and he did all the trick shots -- so that was the bow he brought to show everyone.

The real winners were the kids. They shot from 11 and 16 yards and one won a bow, and several more won targets. The real winner was Logan Siebla the teacher from IDEA HS in San Diego. The last event of the day was two arrows shot at giant rabbit 100 yards away (with a baseball sized target tacked on the giant rabbit as the bullseye), winner take the \$1100 Mathews bow. Dave Gore, national archery champ was in the lead until Logan stepped up to shoot. His first arrow missed the rabbit by ten feet. So the second arrow he just decided to let go and use The Force. His second shot hit one inch closer to the exact center than Dave's and so Logan left with the bow.

People are already talking about next year. We are forming a team to produce it.

I held my form and saw the arrow enter his right side with a very audible thump. He reacted to the impact and ran straight ahead about thirty yards, looked back, and then disappeared behind a fallen tree. I immediately heard a crash and two loud raspy breathes and then silence. I was sure he was down and out but I sat in the stand for about thirty minutes and waited. When I climbed down I walked to where he was standing when I took my shot and there was my arrow covered from point to fletching in pinkish colored blood. I followed the blood trail for about thirty-five yards and there he was. Blood was still percolating up through the exit wound of the far side lung. I had made a great double lung shot, I guess all those 3-D tournaments paid off. I figure it he was dead within about twenty-seconds of being shot.

I walked to my car, called AI, and waited for him to arrive with his truck. We loaded up my deer and drove a few miles to where another of his hunters had gotten a buck. We field dressed both bucks and then drove back to Al's place where we hung the deer from the rafters in the garage. My buck, a large eight point, weighted in at 171 pounds field dressed. I skinned the buck and kept the antlers. We drove to Woodson County Prime Meats, in Yates Center, Kansas, about thirty miles away to have the deer processed. figured it would be easier bringing it back already packaged after having difficulty last year trying to find a butcher in the Los Angeles area that would process a deer. When we arrived at the processing plant there were already eight bucks laying outside waiting for processing, mine got priority treatment because it was already skinned and was taken directly into the cooler. Several other deer were hanging in the cooler. They told me they processed about five hundred deer last season. I told them that I was in a bit of a hurry to get on the road to head home. The next morning they called and said that my meat was ready to go. I couldn't have been more happy with their work, the meat was wrapped in white butchers paper and labeled very professionally with my name and the cut of meat on every package. It filled the two ice chests I had brought with me, if I had shot a doe too, which I had considered. I don't know how I would have gotten the meat home.

This was a great adventure and I enjoyed my time at the lodge, really just an old two story farm house. Visiting with and talking to the same guys who I meet last year was a lot of fun. Continued on page 10 EUREKA, KANSAS continued from page 9


YOUTH SMALL GAME HUNT BY RAY REZENDES

The Legend's Story – The Archery of Howard Hill

Howard Hill (November 13, 1899 – February 4, 1975) was an archer who was unofficially referred to as the "World's Greatest Archer". He is the only

person to win 196 archerv field tournaments in succession. He was also a football, baseball, and basketball player at Auburn University. He was inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in 1971 for his skill in archery. Howard Hill is one of the most decorated archers in target shooting, hunting, and archery flight



competitions, he is also a celebrated writer and producer. During his career, he produced 23 films about archery for Warner Brothers. He also shot 10 different movies of his own, and was a technical adviser in far more movies to provide advice in the archery field of the movies. He killed over 2,000 animals with his long bow, including an elephant, becoming the first white man to kill an elephant with a bow and arrow. He used four-foot arrows, while pulling a 115 pound bow to take the mighty beast. In 1928, he set the new world record for the furthest flight shot in archery, at 391 yards. That same year, he won his 196th field archery competition in a row. Later in his life, in 1959 he was awarded a plaque for his outstanding achievements in archery.

Later in 1971, he was inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame, later being inducted into the Bow Hunters Hall of Fame in 1975, in the year of his deathHe liked to make difficult trick shots, like shooting an apple or prune off someone's head from sixty feet away. He would then perform the same stunt with an even smaller item from a greater distance. He produced several short documentaries on archery, often performing difficult trick shots like shooting a flipping coin or splitting a wooden ball in half while it is rolling on the ground. He would shoot difficult trick shots from the alternate position of lying on the ground, holding the bow with his feet.

To go with his great ability in trick shooting, he

showed amazing talent in hunting. Altogether, he took some 2,000 animals with his traditional long bow style. Some of his great trips have been filmed o r documented, one of these is Howard Hill vs. Lion, another one of these short documentaries is Howard Hill vs. Elephant. These two

videos, of the very

many, show just a couple of examples of his great hunting ability, and perhaps one of the reasons he is considered by some to be one of the greatest hunters of all time.

Here are some of the events that have, over the past 80 years, made a lasting impression on the people throughout the world concerning **Howard Hill** and archery....

- 1. Shot **exhibitions** in 3 world's fairs.
- Produced 23 short subjects for Warner Brothers.
- 3. Filmed "**Tembo**" in Africa—was shown in 57 countries and in seven different languages—RKO release.

- 14. Pulled 172 lb. bow–heaviest bow pulled by any man on record until recent years. (Items #16 & #17 verified by Dr. R.P. Elmer in Encyclopedia Brittanica, 1932.)
- 15. Drew 35,000 spectators in Grants Park, Chicago in 1941, where the crowd tore the shirt off his back, and took his arrows, bow and quiver as souvenirs.
- 16. Won the International Field Meet at Milwaukee, WI in 1942.
- 17. Awarded a plaque by Archery Council of CA in 1959 for his outstanding achievements in archery.


Hunting with a bow appealed to Howard much more than did target archery. Consequently, his love of hunting was to take him to all parts of the world following the game trails and pitting his skill against all kinds of game, some that nearly cost him his life. Howard's greatness is probably reflected most in his long list of game taken with bow and arrow, dating back to 1925 when he bagged his first moose and white tail deer while on a hunting trip in Canada. From 1925 until he passed away in 1975, Howard compiled a record of kills that will undoubtedly never be equaled.


