Happy Holidays CBH/SAA friends and family! I hope you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving and have a safe and happy holiday season!

First, CONGRATULATIONS to our competitors in the CBH State Unmarked 3D Championship! Over 150 shooters enjoyed a beautiful day at Oranco Bowmen on November 5. Final scores are posted on the CBH website and additional awards can be picked up at the Oranco office on Sundays 8:30am-2pm.

This year, Oranco and CBH donated all registration fees to the CBH Legislative Defense Fund. The CBH Legislative Team also hosted a raffle and in total the event raised over \$5,600 for the Legislative Defense Fund. **HUGE THANK YOU to Oranco Bowmen for hosting the event and to our raffle donors: PSE, Willow Creek Archery, Vortex, OnX, Delta McKenzie, Morell Targets, SKB, Turner's Outdoorsman, Ramrods, and Sportsman's Warehouse for helping make the event a success!** Your donations are SO important and enable CBH/SAA to continue to protect archery and hunting opportunities and promote conservation and wildlife management based on scientific research and data.

Which brings us to our update on the Catalina Island Conservancy's (CIC) plan to **eradicate mule deer on Catalina Island... WOW! This one is mind blowing...**

As noted in the November newsletter, <u>SoCal locals brought</u> <u>this issue to our attention</u> in early October and the issue has picked up a lot of steam with coverage in mainstream media including FOX News and the LA Times. In summary, on August 9, 2023 the <u>CIC submitted an application</u> to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) for a Scientific Collection Permit (SCP) that describes a plan to eradicate mule deer on Catalina Island beginning in Summer 2024 using a combination of baiting, netting and "bolting" (e.g., method to stun animals prior to slaughter) near the City of Avalon and other human populated areas and "aerial culling" (e.g., shooting from a helicopter) in the island interior. Deer carcasses in the island interior would be left in place due to the difficult logistics involved with recovering carcasses in these remote areas.

This is not the CIC's first attempt to eradicate deer on Catalina Island. Let's step back to 2007 when the CDFW denied the CIC a depredation permit for deer. According to an <u>email written by CDFW</u> scientists following a visit to Catalina Island obtained through the Freedom of Information Act, CDFW (then called the California Department of Fish and Game [DFG] found that:

"For a depredation permit to be let, the following must be demonstrated:

a) Significant economic loss or property damage – Not demonstrated. Poor planning on CICs has created their problem. Not using the [Private Lands Management] PLM to its full potential, not implementing DFG years of recommendations, and not drafting a land management plan for the entire island to explore ramification of a variety of their actions. b) Need for improving health of the herd - Not demonstrated/ False Pretense. In virtually all CIC documents regarding vegetation that were provided to DFG (very late in the game) describes the need to remove all deer from the island. If the motivation is to, over time, eradicate all the deer - why then would herd health be of concern? Yes, some deer may be in bad shape due to the effect of continued drought conditions on forage and disease. Both conditions are currently occurring on the mainland and have been observed by DFG staff. No one likes to see animals in bad shape, however, that is life, and it is a natural process of population control.

Legislative Committee Update continued from page 4 ~ c) All methods to prevent a) and b) from occurring have been exhausted. – Not demonstrated. The PLM has never been used to its full potential in favor of tourism, premium hunting operations (\$\$\$) and perception of general hunting activities that are not based on facts. Also, no real effort has been put into educating the islands citizens on hunting and no feeding of the wildlife that is causing the perceived "dangerous deer". No discussions with the 2 Cities about deer wise plantings, deer fencing options, etc. No pursuit of DFG recommendations of adding deer fencing to the existing pig fencing to work toward exclusion of deer in sensitive zones of the island."

The email also noted that "The current habitat condition throughout the island is a result of centuries of livestock damage to soil and vegetation, **not** deer browsing."

Again in 2016, the CDFW denied the CIC a SCP to "conduct research on non-native deer on Catalina Island." The basis for denying the permit was because the stated need for the permit revolved around efficacy of removing deer rather than the ecosystem-based restoration and monitoring. The CDFW was "not supportive of studying deer on the island as a test of the efficacy/methods of removal." The <u>letter of</u> <u>denial</u> also stated that there "needs to be a commitment from the CIC to conduct advanced outreach to the public given the expectation of controversy regarding deer removal. ... [The CDFW has] not seen an indication that this outreach is being planned or implemented."

Back to the present... The CIC has not addressed any of the concerns raised by CDFW in 2007 denial of the depredation permit or the 2016 denial of the SCP.

After submitting the SCP application in August 2023, the CIC reached out to our lobbyist Bill Gaines in early October and set up a meeting with him and two independent wildlife biologists to present the "science" behind their plan to eradicate deer. However, Bill and the independent biologists unanimously concluded that the CIC is grossly overestimating the size of the deer population because of flawed survey methodology and the impact of deer on the native habitat is also grossly overestimated and based on cherry picked photos of browsed shrubs and incorrectly attributing habitat impacts to deer and not drought conditions and historic livestock grazing operations. Finally, the CIC enclosed habitat area is supplemented with irrigation and mature plantings from nursery stock and is not an accurate representation of what the island habitat will look like following eradication of deer. In other enclosures that are not irrigated and planted, there is no discernible difference between vegetation/habitat where

deer are able to graze. CBH/SAA supports wildlife management decisions backed by scientific data and research and we have serious concerns that the science behind the Conservancy's plan is flawed. During the meeting, Bill asked the CIC to consider partnering with the CDFW in a 5-year scientific study to assess what number of deer the island habitat can sustainably support and if eradication was required. The CIC was firm in their belief that they have already performed the required research and that the right number of deer on Catalina is <u>zero</u>.

Leading the opposition, Catalina residents and the Coalition Against the Slaughter of Catalina Deer initiated a change.org petition, which you can sign here: <u>https://</u> <u>www.change.org/p/stop-the-slaughter-of-mule-deer-oncatalina-island</u>. Continued next page.

Legislative Committee Update continued from page 6 ~ As of November 25, over 14,000 individuals signed the petition! Additionally, residents showed up in force at the Avalon City Council meeting and provided 2 hours of testimony in opposition to the CIC proposal to eradicate deer. Two weeks later, the City Council responded by updating City ordinances to prohibit the baiting, trapping, and bolting of deer within the City limits. A solid victory for the Coalition Against the Slaughter of Catalina Deer! They also organized several demonstrations with signs and dialogue helping to educate the island residents and mainland tourists on this issue including lack of science behind the decision, deer as a public resource, and potential impacts to tourism and residential enjoyment of island wildlife.

Concurrent with these efforts, CBH/SAA, Bill Gaines, and our partners in the California Hunting and Conservation Coalition also met with the CDFW on several occasions to share our concerns and advocate for the CDFW to perform their due diligence regarding the CIC SCP application including a peer review of current studies and challenging the use of a SCP as an appropriate process for approving deer eradication. Notably, CDFW staff were under the mistaken impression that the California Deer Association (CDA) and the California Mule Deer Foundation were in support of the eradication!? Bill also coordinated an email campaign to CDFW through HOWL for Wildlife resulting in over 2200 emails sent to CDFW staff in opposition to the eradication. I encourage you to sign up for HOWL and take action on a variety of conservation and hunting issues in California and beyond. Next, CBH/SAA and Bill Gaines are seeking an additional meeting with CDFW leadership on this issue in early December and we will continue to be strong in our opposition of the CIC proposal and advocacy for sound science and management of sustainable deer populations.

There are many map programs which can assist you (even when you are still at home). Here you can see how "onXHunt" map can give you an edge. The author (mistakenly) removed the GPS coordinates and the elevation before posting this screen shot. However, you have here a visual awareness of the 80 acre hunt area with marked locations of stands and blinds. The yellow stands are the authors, the hot pink, his hunting partners and the blue, the land owners. Thick cover [bedding] areas (darker in color) are NO HUNT AREAS but the adjacent areas only 100 yards downwind can be dynamite; especially during the rut!

Adventures In Finland By Lisa Rodríguez

Now it's my turn to step up to our first target of the unmarked World Bowhunters 3D in Rovaniemi, Finland with wood arrows I just finished making and only shot once before. From day one, we shoot with our competition and I go last because I was placed as the very last female longbow archer in the very last group.

First shot, my arrow falls short and disappears into the lichen. My next arrow also falls short disappearing again. "I guess this is how it's going to go" I think as I start to calm myself knowing I now only have 13 wood arrows with me (a requirement for longbow) and I have no idea where to instinctively aim with these new wood arrows. Going forward I decide my new mantra before each arrow shot will be, "I know this weight. I know this distance."

Did I mention I didn't have time to make sure all arrows weighed the same and they varied by as much as 50 grains? To a D shaped one piece longbow archer, that's a huge difference. Hence the "I know this weight."

We all walk forward bouncing as we go on the spongy lichen. Those not scoring, which includes myself, begin looking for arrows.

Due to shooting in a protected forest, we are not allowed to use our arrow rakes. Instead, we press our fingers into the intricate web of springy vegetation hoping to find an arrow, any arrow.

We don't find either of my arrows. We return to the target sign and mark off on the back approximately where our lost arrows may lie. Later volunteers born and raised in the area who know how to find arrows without destroying the lichen the free roaming reindeer survive on, will search for our arrows.

Next target, my luck changes. A member from the group behind finds one of my arrows. How did she know it was mine? I decided to paint the entire shaft of my wood arrows elaborately to mimic the ocean and beach. My next set I intend to make them look like No 2 pencils.




We continue on ever up the hill. A member of my group puts on a mosquito net hat as another has four on the back of her head feeding as she shoots. She's native to the area and doesn't even notice them. I stand there grateful for the tip Karen Keating gave me over a year ago with the Thermacel which keeps me protected.

Throughout the day, it drizzles, stopping as quickly as it comes.Finally, the top of the hill. We all stop and admire the beauty as we breathe in the cleanest air in the world. Continued next page.

Adventures In Finland from page 11 Attempting to record the majesty, pictures are taken carefully not pointed in the direction of targets yet to be shot. Now begins the shooting down and going back around the hill.

While looking for lost arrows behind a target, our Latvian archer comes out giving up the search for her arrow after finding a beehive. We all retreat quickly. At the next target, an arrow misses its mark, hitting the rocks rocketing into the distance. Search though we may, the arrow is not to be found. One of many such casualties here in Rovaniemi. As 2nd VP of Target, I begin to catch wind that something is wrong with the online registration for the State Target on the other side of the world. Eventually I am able to decipher the issue and the solution but time zone differences do not lend to an immediate resolution.

End of the first day of four.

The next day, walking out the door, it begins to drizzle. I turn around and change out my boots to the waterproof ones I brought just in case. These would later be my saving grace.

As this is the middle of my first year shooting only Longbow, I break again my custom of not looking at the scores to see how I have faired compared to the other international female longbow archers.

If you don't know, the European traditional archers are a force to be reckoned with, having astronomical scores even in Field. I search for my name at the bottom of the list up. In shock I see that I am in the middle. I am overjoyed by this miracle. I hover around there throughout the tournament.

This was my first 4th of July outside of the United States. Just a few days prior, as the only American at the World Bowhunters, I shot the honorary opening arrow on behalf of the United States & the NFAA. The United States only fielded a team to compete because technically the AAE is under the NFAA. They, the Germans of the AAE, made up the remainder of the Team of Nations for the USA. Finland is known as The Land Of The Midnight Sun as during this time of year the sun does not set. For us, that meant we would shoot one of our competitions at midnight. For longbow, that meant shooting at midnight on the fourth day, the last day.

This last, mostly rocky range, was by far the most challenging terrain/course of the four. We have to step carefully ensuring we don't accidentally twist an ankle. We break many arrows. Then an arrow flies long and sparks fly as it hits the rocks. This happens again and again. I'm not accustomed to seeing sparks fly. Will this start a fire?

From Our Historian Scott Walker

Fred bear was an instinctive shooter. He had a signature shooting style with his left foot forward, knees bent, holding his bow while leaning to the right, looking down the shaft of the arrow concentrating on the Target. Or a spot on the animal and then released the arrow. Fred Bear referred to himself as a snap shooter. His advice to anyone who'd listen was not to shooting that way. Fred Bear had been shooting this way for years, and it worked for him. Every bowhunter has their own way of shooting a bow and arrow. My dad (Doug Walker) shot a bow standing straight up and down and leaned back just a little bit. There are all kinds of ways to shoot your bow and arrow you just have to find out what works best for you be consistent and stick with it. I always say practice practice and practice will make you a better shooter. Well I hope you enjoy this article about Fred bear:

Fred Bear's Shooting Style

(National Bowhunter, Special Fall Issue 2007 Orig. Article by Doug Walker)

I was going through some of my old Western Bowhunter© files and pictures when I came across some pictures of Fred Bear that I took of him back in 1966.

This was during my first Alaska hunt with Fred and it was called North to adventure. It was during the last few days of the hunt and Oldham to fly us back to Anchorage and to go home. Norm Mallonee (of the Bow Rack in San Pablo California now retired) and I noticed Fred starting to shoot at some bales of hay they had stacked for the horses and we started taking pictures of Fred shooting. I wanted to get some pictures of Fred's shooting style, so I started taking my pictures at different angles and you can see the results. Like I said, this was decades ago in 1966, and in my opinion it shows Fred's shooting style. All but one of these pictures I took, one was taken by Norm Melanie that he sent to me to use. I honestly do not know of many pictures showing Fred shooting with so many angles in one shooting session. Enjoy.



Fred Bear's 10 commandments of Hunting

1 Don't step on anything you can step over.

2 Don't look for deer look for movement and remember that's also what they're looking for. 3 always approach from downwind, in the cool of the day move uphill, in the heat of the day move downhill.

4 The best camouflage pattern ever made is called "sit down and be quiet."

5 Take only the gear you need to the field that will allow you to hunt longer, harder and smarter.

6 A rain storm isn't a reason to quit hunting. It's a reason to stay.

7 Camouflage your appearance your sound and your sent.

8 Be sure of your shot. There's nothing more expensive than regret.

9 Hunt where the deer are and not where you imagine they would be.

10 Next year's hunt starts the minute the deer season ends.
