





#### 2018 CBH/SAA Annual Meeting

The meeting was held in Ontario, Ca. January 12 through 14th. The meetings started with the Legislative Meeting on Friday afternoon, followed by the hospitality room hosted by Orange Belt Field Archers Region that evening. The evening was a chance to visit with other members and officers before the work began Saturday morning, but every chance to discuss business was taken.

Saturday morning started early with members meeting at breakfast before the day started at 8am. The general meeting started at 8am with the CBH/SAA President welcoming all of us. All regions were represented, for the first time in a few years. Reports from officers were on the

agenda to review what happened over the 2017 year. Wayne's key report was on "communication" with others. What happens at this meeting needs to be brought back by the region representatives to the clubs and in turn from the clubs to the individual membership. The VP, George Papac, is working on obtaining a bulk rate for awards and it is a work in progress. The Secretary, Pam Severtson, mentioned that

NFAA has a new computer setup and it has been challenging at times and to bear with it until they work out the bugs. The 2nd VP Hunting and Big Game Chairman, Craig Fritz, mentioned that the drawing last year was a huge success and sold out on Friday. The 2nd VP Field, Carlos Funes, apologized for not completely following through on the 2017 Field. The 2nd VP Target, Karen Keating, mentioned that the State Target shoot was up in numbers and results were sent out in a timely manner. 2nd VP Indoor, Rusty Mills, said that we were up 100 shooters.

Legislative Coordinator, Robert Moore stated he had a lot going on this year. People retiring at the DFW after relationships are built, has been a struggle. DFW looking into the possibility of having a minimum draw weight on their bows, that CBH/SAA sits on the Big Game Advisory Committee and the Hunting Conservation Coalition. Merchandise is available for sale to support the Legislative Defense Fund.

IBEP Chairman, Johnnie Waddles wanted to thank all of the instructors, pro shops and clubs for their support. They had an outstanding ISE show in 2017. Looking forward to

teaching more game wardens about bow hunting as there are many that have never been before. There were 250-275 IBEP students this year.

Newsletter Editor, Lori Raupe reported that she enjoys the stories and pics received, but if sending in pics, the ones on Facebook deteriorate and are not good quality.

Webmaster David Bacon has rebuilt the advertising notification system, digital archive is getting better and will remain holding off on putting the newsletter on the website until 3 months after publication.

NFAA Director, Gary McCain said that he has completed quite a few range inspections this year. All Region Presidents are authorized to do the inspections. He made clear that NFAA has eliminated some styles; Bowhunter, Bowhunter Freestyle Limited

and combined the Longbow and Recurve in the adult and over divisions. He stated that eliminating the Longbow division misses the boat and will be addressed.

The CBH/SAA logo is in the midst of being trademarked. No petitions for NFAA this year. There were a

few CBH/SAA petitions. One that passed is the 2 categories for Longbow-Longbow wood and Longbow Aluminum/Carbon.

Sunday started off bright and early again at 8am. Pete Budding was able to read the Invocation written by Maryann Twohey. Wayne reported on the President's Committee Meeting from Saturday afternoon and Pam Severtson reported on the Secretaries Committee Meeting.

Donations were presented;

Lodi Bowmen donated \$100 to the Legislative Defense Fund and CIBA Region donated \$1,000. Butch Kughn, the Legislative Coordinator from the 1990's donated \$500, OBFA Region donated \$1,000 and OBFA also donated \$250 to the Cal Tip Program.

Craig Fritz announced it was his last year sitting up at the front table as 2nd VP Hunting and Big Game Chairman after 23 years. IBEP Chairman, Johnnie Waddles, reiterated that all Bowhunter Ed instructors must be Hunter Ed instructors. California Archery Foundation Chair, Kathy Budding, said it was a slow year and yet she will be giving the chairmanship to Rusty Mills next year. OBFA donated \$250 to CAF.



#### 2018 CBH/SAA Annual Meeting continued:

NFAA Director, Gary McCain, stated that we need to bring the NFAA membership up so we can get more votes within NFAA. We used to be at 5 votes, but NFAA membership declined so we are down to 4 votes. Range Fund Chairman, Kathy Budding, stated that applications are on the web for applying for funds. Since Tom Daley was ill, Pam Severtson spoke on behalf of the Hall of Fame Committee thanking all the individuals who helped with the banquet and donations. OBFA donated \$250 to HOF.

Big Game Club Chairman, Craig Fritz, donated on behalf of BGC, \$2,000 to the Legislative Defense Fund, \$250 to Hall of Fame and \$250 to California Archery Foundation. President Wayne Raupe presented his officers and staff with CBH/SAA coffee mugs for the work done by all as a gift from him.

President Wayne Raupe appointed Craig Fritz as the new Procedures Book Chairman. On his committee will also be Pam Severtson and Gary McCain. Part of this will be building FAQ's for the website. Pam Severtson took a quick survey of who would be interested in a State Marked 3D Championship next year. A resounding "yes". This would be piggybacked with another tournament.

Wayne brought us all up to speed on the recent podcast that was not favorable to CBH/SAA. He, Craig Fritz, David Bacon and Jason Duysings met up with Eric Welsh and Jon Weaver to discuss the issues at hand. What came out of the meeting is that communication will be much better going forward.

A State Traditional Shoot was brought up for discussion. It was determined that a formal petition will be brought in next year. Joe Dotterer has a proof of the 50 year buckle, the 75 year buckle and a "Bowmen" buckle that will have a drawing for at next year's meeting. Tickets will be sold.

The petition regarding traditional distances was resolved with Longbow shooters will shoot at the maximum distance from the youth stakes, which is 50 yards. This will be a test period for 2 years.

State Target is set for September 2018. The Indoor will be January 2019. The Broadhead will be at the Tejon Ranch on Memorial Day weekend and the State Field will be hosted in Redding at Straight Arrow, the weekend of June 9-10, 2018. Flyers will be done and in the newsletter and social media.

The CBH/SAA Annual Meeting for 2019 will be at Cal Expo in Sacramento, January 11, 12 & 13, 2019. Mid Year meeting may be at Visalia Sportsmen's on June 23, 2018 after confirmation with them.

#### We're Chasing Ghosts By Ryan Alsap

We're chasing ghosts, the words, spoken out loud for the first of many times that trip, voiced what we'd all been thinking. Huddled around the table in the cozy cabin we'd rented for the 1.5 week elk hunting trip in Wyoming, there was a communal sense of resignation. These were the most wary, skittish elk we'd ever hunted, and after a solid week of catching only a glimpse of tan or a flash of antler in the thick timber of the north-facing western Wyoming slopes, I began to regret our decision to cash our points in on a general area hunt.

Five years ago, our party began accumulating points for the Wyoming elk draw, and for those five years we'd dreamed about, talked about full meat poles and sweeping ivory tines. It was the same year that my Dad, at age 60, put time and life into perspective in matter-of-fact terms. "Son, I'm 60. I figure I've got ten good hunting seasons left in me, so you'd better get to planning."

Since his career change from a logger to a commercial fisherman, Dad's hunting pursuits had taken a back seat to building his new business. While he shared in our excitement over each of our successful hunts, he only could enjoy them through texts, pictures and phone calls. He'd never say it, but he had to feel like he was missing out. And we sure missed having him on those hunts.

So plan we did. Research on Wyoming elk hunting yielded plenty of promise – premium hunts abound, albeit after a bit of wait - many of the best hunts take seven or more points/years to draw in the tag lottery system. This past winter,

we came to a consensus - the two more years of waiting seemed too much, so when a family acquaintance returned from a successful archery hunt in a General Area elk unit we'd been researching, the decisions was made. The email from Wyoming Game and Fish notifying us of our successful draw was a mere formality – we had more than enough points to draw but now it was official. We were going to Wyoming! Eric Duncan, Jered Alsup, and my buddy Colin (Shawnda Colin Burnett) would join my Dad and I.

Lists were made weeks in advance. Reservations secured months prior to that. We were brimming with excitement and anticipation as we set out on the 15-hour drive to elk camp; a trip that would take us through the rugged beauty of Idaho, Montana, and finally, Wyoming. After wrapping up the prawn fishing season, Dad was set to fly in from Alaska four days after us. That would give us plenty of time to locate elk before he arrived, if not punch a couple of tags.

The first morning did not disappoint. Within an hour of daylight, we'd located a herd on an open hillside. Fifteen head, with at least two branch bulls, one a very respectable six-point. Safely out of our range, we watched them feed into the timber, confident that similar scenes would play out many times in the coming days. When I drove to Jackson Hole to pick Dad up from the airport, optimism was still high. We'd seen elk. My cousin Jered has passed on a spike. It was tough hunting, but we were sure success was imminent.

Little did we know these were the last elk we'd see in an opening, and the timber to which they fed would be the stage for our cat-and-mouse game for the remainder of our hunt. The days began to blur together. Wake up. Eat breakfast. Hit the timber. More times than not, most of our party would catch a brief glimpse of an elk. Or part of one. No one was presented a shot opportunity. Each following day would be bring similar results.

We talked to locals. Hunters and hunting guides alike, and the reports were all the same. "Worst elk season I can remember." "The wolves have them run ragged." "You'll never get them out of that timber." Ghosts. This was not what we had in mind when we planned this hunt.

One afternoon, I found myself sitting on ridge with Dad overlooking a promising valley below. The Grand Tetons towered above the foothills in the distance. In spite of all the natural beauty, the weight of the hunt was heavy on my shoulders. The pressure to fill freezers, yes, but mostly for Dad to punch his first elk tag in 21 years.

"Dad, I feel like I let you dow-" He didn't let me finish the sentence. "Ryan," he started. "I'm on an elk hunt in Wyoming. This is perfect. Killing an elk would just be a bonus...this is just what I wanted."

Continued from page 13- And it hit me. We were Hunting elk, but I'd been seeking the wrong thing. It had been two decades since I'd last sat on a ridge in Elk Country with my Dad. Two decades spent dreaming of making a hunt together. And I'd spent the majority of our time worrying about the outcome, not enjoying the pursuit.

The hike back to camp was done so mostly in silence, and as I'd done so many times in my childhood, marveled at this man I'm so lucky to call "Dad." If he was so at peace just being immersed in God's great Creation, why was I hung up on catching ghosts? I committed myself in that moment to follow his lead and make the most of our last three days in that amazing country.

That night we discussed our strategy. With five tags in camp, we'd been spreading out in five different directions every day; each hunter exploring canyons, still hunting through the blow-downs and aspen groves. And it wasn't working. It was time to combine our efforts. The next morning, we decided, Dad would stand lookout on a south-facing slope, keeping a watchful eye on the timbered ridge opposite him. We'd hunt the timber as before, but would move through in unison with hopes that any elk avoiding our advances would show themselves to him.

The first canyon yielded zero encounters. A quick call to Dad and he began the hike to the next canyon. I met Eric at the top of the ridge. "It's been a great hunt," one of us said. "But I don't think we're taking home any elk meat." We'd both come to the same reconciliation.

The text from dad came: "On post." It was our cue to crest the ridge into the next tangled web of dark Wyoming timber.

A few minutes into the hunt, as had happened so many times before, a branch breaks and I catch a millisecond view of tan fur before it disappeared into the thick understory. A bull, and a second animal I did not see. I continued my hunt and soon a cow appeared briefly, and just as quickly vanished letting out a few quiet mews on her way up the canyon. I set my rifle against the trunk of fir tree and looked around me. What could be better than this? The sights, sounds and smells of Elk Country haunt my thoughts all year, and I was now, finally, drinking it all in.

The unmistakable report of Dad's rifle broke the still autumn air. A second shot followed, then a third. I felt my phone vibrate in my pocket. Any fear that he'd missed disappeared with his first two words.

"Bull down." I raced down the hill, across the canyon and up to his location where he, Jered and Eric were waiting. "You did it Dad!" I exclaimed as I stepped in for a celebratory hug.

"We all did it," came his reply, "We all did it."

We took several minutes to reflect on the hunt and took turns snapping pictures before we set about the process of quartering and boning his elk. By dark we were back at the cabin reveling in our turn of fortunes. The next day we employed the same tactic. A single shot from Eric brought the same result. A second bull in as many days and Eric's first ever. Our knives, again, made quick work of the bull, reducing its body into manageable portions for the hike out. As with his bull, Dad shouldered his share of the meat, walking step for step with his hunting partners some 25-30 years his junior.

They were both small bulls, certainly not the heavy, sweeping ivory-tipped crowns we'd dreamed about. But they were ours. And they were perfect.

With work duties calling, Eric and Jered left for Oregon that night, their truck full of camping gear, and elk meat, and smiles.

The next morning I left the cabin before daylight for one last hunt. As I worked quietly up a ridge, I felt the cool wind against my neck as the wind shifted. Downwind from me, branches broke as an elk caught my scent and ran towards safety. I chuckled to myself and changed course back to the cabin. It was time to go home.

We broke camp that morning. Always a bittersweet moment, but we were leaving fulfilled. There would be meat to share, stories to tell, and memories made. Dad closed the green gate behind us on our way out, and secured the lock. There will be many more hunts, but this one felt significant. The beginning of a new chapter.

Somewhere west of Coeur D'Alene and well after midnight I glanced over at Dad in the passenger seat. His even, steady breathing let me know he'd finally succumbed to sleep. I smiled and remembered all those hunting and fishing trips Dad took his young sons on, when it was he doing the driving, and the planning, and the coordinating, and it was I fast asleep in the comfort of his guidance. It felt good to return the favor in some small measure.

I scrolled through my music playlist and soon Chris Stapleton was crooning through the speakers. I barely heard the words as my mind raced to capture every fleeting, ethereal detail of the hunt and etch them into my memory before they slipped away, not unlike those deep timber Wyoming bulls.

I was still chasing ghosts, only now they were the right ones.

Dad shifted in the seat and raised his head. "You doing ok?"

"Doing great, Dad." In fact, never better!

#### From Our Historian Scott Walker

Ben Pearson was born in Saline County, Arkansas on November 16, 1898. Events are hazy and accounts conflicting, but it's safe to say that Ben made his first bow sometime prior to 1926, a six foot hickory patterned after the English longbow obtained from instructions



on bow building in Boy Scout articles written by Uncle Dan Beard. Later, in the Boy Scouts' Merit Badge Series for Archery, he would author his own instructions with "How To Make A Flat Bow." Ben performed numerous exhibitions across America for youth and scout groups and according to a recent article by Arline Chandler, "Pearson never charged a fee for his demonstrations, nor asked for expenses."

In 1926, Ben entered the Arkansas State Championships held in Little Rock and placed next to last. It was a humbling experience for the budding archer. Determined to improve his skills, Ben worked at upgrading his equipment and learning to shoot. The next year, he once again entered the Arkansas State Championships, but this time he walked away as the Arkansas State Champion. During the next 10 years or so, Ben would become a regular fixture at target events, develop into a highly respected competitor and place seventh behind Pat Chambers during the 1938 NAA National Tournament and 24 places ahead of a young Fred Bear. Pat would later go to work for Ben in 1940 as a field man and author "Archery," the first publication issued by Pearson Archery.

After completing grammar school, Ben worked on the family farm in Lonoke county until he was drafted toward the end of WWI. The Armistice was soon signed and Ben's short lived service came to an end. Ben returned home, but the farm couldn't hold him and he moved to Little Rock. In Little Rock, Ben would land a job with the Little Rock Railway and Electric Company, move on to the Arkansas Power & Light Company and as the Depression deepened in 1931 he would take off on his own. He tried the floral business in Pine Bluff, but with little money and even less experience his venture soon collapsed and he resorted to selling caterpillar tractors for John Riggs, doing some work for Lee Woods, Inc., of Pine Bluff and producing archery equipment in his garage.

It was during this period that a chance meeting would forever change his life. It seems that Carl Haun, a retired oil man from Blackwell, Oklahoma, had purchased a bow and arrow set for his grandson. It didn't take the grandson long to lose or break all his arrows. Grandpa set about to replace the youngster's arrows but found the task more difficult than anticipated. Upon learning of Ben Pearson, Mr. Haun cranked his airplane up and flew to Pine Bluff. Soon Mr. Haun was knocking on Ben's door and Mr. Haun's arrow problems were solved. According to Roy Hoff, "That was the beginning of a great partnership little known to the user of Ben Pearson equipment. Carl listened intently as Ben explained his dream of mass producing archery tackle and became intrigued. This was still during the depression years, but evidently not in the oil business."

Ben later commented on the meeting. "He was tickled to death to find some arrows for his grandson. So, Mr. Haun invited me to `go for a walk'. He said he wanted to look for some For Sale signs. He took a dim view of mass production in a backyard garage. We came upon an old sorghum mill with a For Sale sign on it." At that moment Carl Haun's financial support and Ben Pearson's mechanical knowledge were joined, forming Ben Pearson Company. Ben Pearson Company would later lay claim to being "the world's greatest mass-producing archery tackle manufacturer."

Ben Pearson retired from the archery manufacturing business in 1967 and passed away four years later on March 2, 1971 at age 72, after revolutionizing the manufacturing of archery tackle, providing quality, functional equipment well within the means of the average person. He left a legacy in the "Bushmaster" and the unsurpassed "Deadhead." He left another in Longbow, a 400 acre retreat near Prim, Arkansas, now restored by his son Ben, Jr. in tribute to his father and those who stalked the hills before him. His presence is still felt there in his get-away cabin. The cabin provides an awesome view of a waterfall cascading off a rock bluff into the blue-green pool below.

### Hazardous Conditions Lead to Migrating Mule Deer Deaths

November 20, 2017

Ice and snow that remained from last winter's heavy snowfall have led to the confirmed deaths of a total of 120 mule deer in recent weeks, according to state wildlife officials. Traditional fall deer migration over Bishop and Shepard passes combined with hazardous icy conditions on steep mountain slopes, resulted in deer deaths at both high-elevation passes in the John Muir Wilderness of Inyo National Forest.

"The deer died while attempting to travel down

snowfields that persisted from last winter" California Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) senior environmental scientist Tom Stephenson said. Recent freezing temperatures turned the soft snow to slick ice. according to Stephenson. "Deer were unable to maintain their footing and slid rapidly down the steep snowfields and slammed into boulder fields below." Stephenson, who investigated mortalities at Bishop Pass, said most deer appeared to die either immediately or after traveling a

short distance from the base of the snow.

Snow falling in the higher elevations has diminished the dangerous conditions according to the CDFW. "New snow of sufficient depth prevents the deer from sliding down the icy snowfield," Stephenson explained.

Mortalities were first reported on October 30, 2017 to the Bishop office of the CDFW by a distraught hiker crossing the 11,972-ft. Bishop Pass, according to CDFW spokesperson, David German. One day later, a mountaineer crossing the 12,047-ft. Shepherd Pass also reported seeing deer that had apparently died near the pass, and then, a few days later, the climber reported additional mortalities. Numerous calls and separate field investigations by CDFW followed, confirming that 76 deer perished in the vicinity of Bishop Pass and 44 others died near Shepherd Pass, west of Independence, CA.

"This is a horrible thing to witness, but hard things happen in the natural world," said Debra Schweizer, a spokesperson for the Inyo National Forest. "While it is heartbreaking, this combination of circumstances occurs after a big winter--about once every 25 years," Schweizer added.

Similar incidents were investigated by the CDFW in 1954 and 1995, in the same approximate Bishop Pass location. In 1954, Fred Jones, a wildlife biologist doing field research in the Eastern Sierra, reported approximately 26 deer slid on the ice and fell to their deaths on rocky terrain below Bishop Pass. Forty-one years later, in 1995, a similar accident in the Bishop Pass location was described by CDFW biologists Vernon Bleich and Becky Pierce. According to German, the deer were

following traditional migration routes of the Round Valley a n d Goodale herds, descending from higher elevation summer range on the west side to the east side of the Sierra Nevada crest where they range in winter.



The Round Valley

herd, which ranges from the Buttermilk area to Round Valley in winter, has an estimated population of 2,800 animals. The Goodale herd, which winters from the Poverty Hills south of Big Pine to just north of Lone Pine, is estimated to contain 5,500 animals. "While these deaths are tragic, they represent a small fraction of the deer populations and are not expected to have a significant effect on the overall population of either herd," German said.

Mule deer are considered abundant in the eastern Sierra, according to Stephenson. Schweizer commented "while it is hard, we manage for the health of the overall population instead of individual animals. Nature is unforgiving and unpleasant things happen in the natural world."







### 2018 CBH/SAA State Broadhead Championship Tournament General Working Mechanics

- This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter as opposed to the tournament archer. It is designed to offer the hunter some benefits without his/her becoming entangled in the aspects of a Field tournament. NFAA rules do not apply to this event
- The State Broadhead Tournament shall be either a one or two day event held on Memorial Day weekend.
- 3. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President of Hunting or his delegate shall govern this tournament.
- The range for this event shall be laid out in such a manner as to simulate hunting conditions when possible.
- Archers shall use hunting tackle for this event which is in keeping with California State Fish & Game Laws on Big Game Hunting.

#### A. Scoring:

- 1) Vital 10 Kill 8 Wound 5
- An arrow must be in the target to score, except a "Pass-through" which must be witnessed and scored as witnessed by other shooters in the group.
- 3) "Bounce-ins and "Glance-offs" shall not score.
- 4) "Antlers" do not score.
- Shaft of arrow must touch the line for higher score.
- 6) Double scoring is required.
- 7) This shall be a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.

#### B. Divisions and Styles of Shooting:

- 1) Divisions
  - a) Seniors (65+)
  - b) Adult (18-64): Male and Female
  - c) Young Adult (ages 15-17): Male and Female
  - d) Youth (ages 12-14): Male and Female
- Styles
  - a) Sight (S)
  - b) Non-Sight (NS)
  - c) Release (R)
  - d) Recurve (Rc)
  - e) Traditional (T)

#### C. Awards:

- CBH/SAA Membership (Regular or Associate) is required to compete for awards.
- Guest Class is one class (Male and Female combined) and there will be no awards.
- 3) No awards will be mailed.


#### D. Tackle:

- 1) One stabilizer not over 12 inches, allowed
- 2) Bow quivers are allowed in all styles.
- 3) No magnifying scopes are allowed.
- No compound bows over 80 pounds peak draw weight. Recurves and longbows have no limit
- 5) Binoculars are allowed. NO RANGE FINDERS!
- No range finding devices allowed at any time on the range.
- Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish & Game Codes at all times during the shoot – expandable broadheads are allowed if they meet Ca. Fish & Game Codes.

- 8) Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish & Game Codes (7/8" minimum diameter)
- 9) Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
- 10) All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
- Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
- 12) Longbows: Any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
- 13) Longbows: Must be shot off the shelf
- 14) Clickers allowed in all styles.

#### E. Miscellaneous:

- Cubs: Due to safety considerations a Cub division will not be included at this event.
- Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
- All protests to the Protest Committee must be in writing within thirty (30) minutes of the end of the tournament and include a \$25.00 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
- There must be a minimum of three shooters per target at all times.
- Top shooters from each style will be grouped on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of the tournament.
- 6) No target or sight notes allowed (sight tapes ok)
- No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will not be assisted.
- No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours – except for tournament officials.
- Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
- 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
- 11) NO cell phones, computers or any other electronic devices allowed on the range or bow.
- Tournament officals will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualification.
