# Everyone Has Their First Cover Story

After two seasons of hunting the Arizona desert for deer without any success, I decided to switch it up a bit. Luckily, I was invited on a guided hunt by my friend Chris Levai. This hunt was to take place in Missouri with Weaubleau Creek Outfitters (WCO) with a total of seven hunters in our group. Coming from California, I had only done spot and stalk style hunting, so the idea of sitting and hunting from a tree stand was completely new. Let's be honest, I was like many hunters who started off their hunting career with spot and stalks, I thought this tree stand thing would be a breeze and pretty much a guarantee for success. Going into the hunt I thought I would be sitting in the tree and the deer would be just hanging out below me, grazing along, ultimately giving me that perfect 20-yard shot. Boy, was I wrong!

The first afternoon we arrived at Weaubleau Creek we were able to go out for an evening hunt, mostly to just show everyone to their stands, make sure everyone could get into their stand and was comfortable with the style of stand and/or blind. It was my very first time in a tree stand and let's just say I was less than graceful getting over the rail and into the chair, but that is why someone very smart invented harnesses.



After getting all settled, it wasn't very long before I spotted my first deer, but I could only see the side of its butt. Was it a buck or just a doe? Now, I did have a doe tag as well, but I decided before ever getting in that stand that I wasn't going home with anything less than an 8 point buck. Not being able to tell what it was that had disappeared behind the trees, I continued to scan my area and range out specific spots so that I was ready! About fifteen minutes later I saw that butt again but still couldn't make it out if it



Was a doe or buck. So an hour later when a nice 8 point buck appeared between the trees, I didn't know what to do! I stood up and tried to re-range where he was standing just to make sure he was truly at that 40-yard tree, I had ranged shortly before, and he was! I had already grabbed my bow, so I put away my binos and started to draw back when he disappeared behind some trees and quickly got out of range. Two thoughts crossed my mind as that buck disappeared. Man, was my heart racing! And boy, I really don't know what I'm doing!

Darkness fell quickly and my first tree stand hunt came to an end. Excited after seeing a buck on my first night and having had the opportunity to make a shot, that is, if I was a little more prepared, I went back to the house with lots of questions. What do I do if the buck doesn't stop? What if I don't have time to range him? Pretty much I was wanting step by step instructions on something that could be very unpredictable. Armed with great advice from the amazing guides at WCO and great friends I was ready for my first full day in the stand.

The first day started off very early and very slow... I didn't see a single creature (besides those damn squirrels!) until around 1 pm in the afternoon when I spotted a flock of turkeys 60 yards out. The turkeys were going in the direction of the shooting path I had already ranged out. I slowly grabbed my bow and stood up, they were around 50 yards at this point. The day before I had learned how quickly an opportunity could close so I drew my bow back. My biggest fear of hunting is wounding an animal so I knew that no matter what, I was not taking a shot on a little turkey unless they came within 25 yards from me. So I kept glancing at my ranged 20-yard mark. They were following my path perfectly! 40 yards, 30 yards, 20 yards, crap! There were 3 different turkeys within my 20-yard range! With two either sex turkey tags in my backpack, and not knowing what to do, I started moving my bow back and forth at full draw, thinking to myself, which ones bigger?

Which one do I shoot? Ok, let's not freak out, first one to give me a good shot is the one. Right in line with my 20yard tree one of the turkey's gave me a broadside shot, and I took it. The wings flew out and she made it 6 yards before I watched her fall. Omg! I just killed a turkey! I just shot the very first thing with my bow! Surprised by the fact that all the other turkeys didn't run too far, I sat and watched until they finally walked out of my view. Getting out of the stand, shaking with excitement as I walked up to see my first kill, it didn't feel real. After double checking my turkey was indeed dead, I called my guide, "I killed a turkey, what do I do now?" "Get back in the stand and kill a buck!", The guide replied. So I grabbed my turkey, walked back to the stand, dropped the turkey on the ground and climbed back up. Unfortunately, the rest of the day was uneventful, but it still felt pretty good bringing that turkey back and being the first to kill anything out of our group of seven. Now, I was ready to be the first to kill a buck!

The next day was an exciting one! It consisted of the best two hours of sitting in that stand the whole trip. Within those two hours, I saw one doe followed by 5 different bucks, but they were all hot on her trail! Two forkys and two decent 8 points came in nose down, moving quickly. For each one, I tried to use the deer call to get them to stop or at the very least look at me! All four didn't even flinch! As I said, they were hot on that doe's trail! Those boys were rushing in from every direction! The fifth one was moving a little slower and more within my range, so I figured I would try the call again. This time with my bow in hand, I blew the call, OMG! He stopped! But he stopped behind the tree, and I don't have a good shot. Unsure if the buck behind the tree had spotted me, I blew the call again, he ran off like a freight train! This was when I learned to never use a call twice in a row or really at all if you aren't ready to make the shot. This is also when I "learned" how to make the call noise myself, it's not pretty, but it was proven effective later!

After two hours of deer running in and out of sight it had slowed down, and I finally sat down again. This was when I knew that I loved this tree stand thing! Being in the middle of it all, watching as these deer searched for that hot doe and the doe running like heck to get away.





The part that amazed me the most was that none of them ever knew I was standing there, admiring their every move. This is fun!

The next day was the slowest of them all as it was raining hard throughout the morning and into the afternoon, this was the only day I did not sit in my stand all day. Another thing that I learn is a must, as my guide Rob would say, "Dig your feet in the mud and stay put" Let me tell you, that was sound advice because all of my action came in the middle of the day, between the "usual" morning and evening peaks in activity. If I hadn't sat the entire day the other days, I would not have gotten my turkey or my buck. But being discouraged by the rain, I went in for a few hours and even after returning that night, I didn't see anything. All of the other seven in my group did not see anything either, so it was a very discouraging day for us all.

With the last day being upon me I was getting anxious, was I not going to get the buck I thought was a guaranteed slam dunk on this tree stand, guided hunt? The last day started off slow. Then from behind my tree, I spotted a deer, but it was only a doe. Another deer comes into view, dang! Another doe. Then all of a sudden the buck I was hoping for appeared from behind the trees, it was a really nice 8 point! Immediately, I knew this one was mine! Never before had I been so sure, I grabbed my bow and quickly re-ranged some spots as I couldn't remember the yardage for this not ideal shooting lane, with an awkward against the side of the tree shot. He was at 60 yards, again, having that fear of wounding, I already decided I would not shoot at a buck further than 40 yards. So I got the 40-yard range and waited as this buck slowly made his way towards me with now 3 does surrounding him. He reached 50 yards, shoot! One of the does spooked! Continued on page 6

Oh good, she didn't go far and is eating again. But he stopped and started looking around. I froze, praying he wouldn't see me just peaking out from behind my tree. He put his head down again, thank God! But then he just turned around and walked off in the opposite direction disappearing behind the trees.

After that buck disappeared, I thought for sure that my hunt was over and that I wouldn't see another deer. Sitting there, discouraged, the day passing by, continually looking behind me hoping that buck would reappear. Texting the others in the group, who also were not seeing anything. Again, I was sure he was it, and no more deer were coming. Then a few hours later, there was a sparkle of hope when a doe trotted into view, even better, a buck was following, but wait, it's just a forky! As I stated earlier, I didn't want to shoot a forky. However, it was the last afternoon of the hunt, and a forky was sounding better than going home empty handed. So I decided right then, that if that forky gave me a good shot, I was taking it! That fork chased the doe in circles around me, and as he was finally starting to slow down he was 14 yards from me, already drawn back, I let out a call, and nothing. He didn't even take his eyes off that doe for a second and proceeded to run after her until I could no longer see either of them.

Totally discouraged, I sat in my stand, going a little stir crazy by this point, and then another glimmer of hope, another doe had run in and out along my 40-yard path. I stood and waited, 15 mins, 30 mins, an hour, nothing! I finally sat back down and within the next 30 mins. I spotted a small fork run in and out of view in the distance, still not impressed, I remained seated. Then shortly after, I spotted antlers about 50-60yards straight behind some trees in front of me. I sprung out of my seat. Slowly grabbed my bow. Watching, waiting, as he came into view, sweet! There were 3 points on the side I can see and he is headed towards my 40-yard range point. He was about 30 yards away and moving right along, I drew back, aimed towards that mark of my shooting path (a break in the trees) and kept him in view out of the corner of my eye. As soon as he stepped into a clear path I made the "call" with my mouth, he stopped, I lined up and let that arrow fly! My heart was racing that entire time until I let go of that arrow and I swear it skipped a beat! I am a pretty adventurous person, but I have never felt an adrenaline rush quite like that, not even while skydiving!





My heart dropped when the deer fell straight to the ground! Wait! Aren't they suppose to run!? The panic set in, followed by sadness when I watched as the buck tried to get back up on all four legs and couldn't! Oh shit! I spinned him! Mortified and unsure what to do next, as he sat facing me, I immediately put another arrow into his vitals and it was all over very quickly.

Obviously, it was not what I expected when I imagined killing a buck with my bow, and it was hard having to witness his initial struggle to get away. However, when all was said and done, I was still excited that I was able to harvest one of these magnificent animals with my bow, be the only one to bring home a buck, and provide meat for my family. There are so many worse ways these animals die, sometimes it is days or weeks of suffering before they succumb. The fact that this was a quick and humane death makes me feel more at peace with the initial sadness that I felt.

Without WCO, I would not be able to call myself a bowhunter officially, and for that, I couldn't be more thankful or excited. The guys who own it, Steve and Rob along with their guide John were amazing and so knowledgeable. The best thing to come out of this hunt was all the things I learned that helped make me a better hunter. These are lessons I will carry with me on all my future hunts, and I couldn't be more thankful! So again, thanks to everyone at WCO! It was a great time!

Whether you are a seasoned hunter or a rookie like me, I would highly recommend WCO. To all my west coast, diehard spot and stalk hunters, don't knock it until you try it, tree stand hunting was way more challenging than I ever would have imagined. Happy hunting!

#### Paradise, California

On November 8th just after 6:30 in the morning, the fire known as Camp Fire 2018 began to move through the small town of Paradise California, consuming pretty much everything in its path, and devastating an entire community. A little over 48 hours from then, it marked its place in history as the deadliest and most destructive forest fire California has ever seen. Whether you've lived there your entire life, grew up there and moved out, came to visit, just passing through, or simply read about the people this fire has affected - this majestic little town and its tight-knit community left a lasting impression. The fire caused at least 86 civilian fatalities. It covered an area of 153,336 acres (almost 240 sq. miles), and destroyed 18,804 structures, with most of the damage occurring within the first four hours. Total damage was \$16.5 billion; one-quarter of the damage, \$4 billion, was not insured. Joan and Joe Becker lost their home and belongings, and possibly others in our archery family. If you feel you could help them, please reach out. I remember being in the same situation in 2003, when the Cedar Fire took our home and many precious, irreplaceable things.




### Howard Hill Memorabilia Found!

e have a friend of over 30 years who is quite a lady. Her name is Liz Lawton. Liz was raised on Catalina Island just twenty-three miles across the sea (as the song goes) from Los Angeles Harbor. Growing up on Catalina and leving in Avalon was obviously very precious to her, but of her love for the island she has become one of its major historians. Liz's father was the hunting lodge and game manager for Philip K. Wrigley who bought the island in 1919.

Now in her eighties and still as active as she can be, she tells us many tales of the early days. My wife Nancy, her Dad (Paul), Liz and I had gone out for dismer recently. Liz presented are a copy

of the maugural issue of the Santa



Notice in the picture that Howard's pants have gotten pictly dirty and that the heavy brush behind them is very typical of pig habitat on the island. Getting to the pigs was rarely easy and it appears they used the hunting dog to get the pigs out of the brush and into an area a shot could be made. The dog was probably also used to find the tusker if he ran back into the brush before taking his final breath. Errol is also wearing leather chaps to protect his legs from the cactus and harsh manzanita and toyon. He also carries a lever action rifle, as back up, to protect both he and Howard should things not go as planned.

I even speculate that the studio (Warner Brox.) may not have been too happy with Errol's choice of free-time entertainment and insisted on the rifle to protect their investment in Errol and to some degree. Howard as well. You see, Howard was also in the Warner Brox. corral, where all his short films were made with the exception of "Tembo." I believe Warner's provided the camcras and film and the distribution for "Tembo" as well.

This however was not the only piece of memorabilia to be found this evening.

Inside this magazine was a nicely folded "Canadian Club" advertisement from another magazine. The name of the magazine or the publishing date is unknown. Liz tells me that the man pictured with Howard in front of the lodge fireplace and drinking with him in the lounge is Ted Sierks who was the official photographer for the Catalina Island Company.

The picture of Howard being towed on a wave board in Avalon Harbor shows the athletic prowess of the man\*. In the background you can see the round building that was the "Avalon Casino & Ball Room" in which so many of the great swing bands of the 'IOs & '4Os played. Today it is a moreum and theater of sorts. I think you will find it interesting that Howard was not only a handsome athletic man but also debonair in a wide lapel suit, open collar and ascot as you see him with Ted Sierks again at the Eagle's Nest hunting lodge lounge. Avalon, the Great White Steamship and the Casino made Catalina the island playground to many stars and other celebrities. It is obvious that Howard was comfortable and well liked in the company of these people.

#### Next meeting – February 6, 2019 in Sacramento,

this is scheduled as a one day meeting.

1. Consider approving agenda and order of items 2. Election of Commission president and vice president

The commissioners annually elect one of their number as president and one as vice president, by a concurrent vote of at least three commissioners (Pursuant to Section 102, Fish and Game Code). **3** Committee assignments

The Commission forms three committees from its membership, consisting of at least one commissioner (Pursuant to sections 105, 106 and 106.5, Fish and Game Code), (A) Marine Resources Committee (B) Wildlife Resources Committee (C) Tribal Committee 4 Recognition of former Commissioner Vice President Anthony C. Williams for his commitment and service to the Commission. 5. General public comment for items not on agenda Receive public comment regarding topics within the Commission's authority that are not included on the agenda. Note: The Commission may not discuss or take action on any matter raised during this item, except to decide whether to place the matter on the agenda of a future meeting (sections 11125 and 11125.7(a), Government Code). The next Wildlife Resources Committee will be held Thursday May 16th in Sacramento. No Agenda has been posted at this writing.

We have been fortunate that the current DFW executive management (Director & Deputy Directors) and current FGC commissioners are very responsive to fishers and hunters. The mid-year elections are over and there is a new Governor for California. The Governor appointments include Secretary of Resources Agency, Update; Wade Crowfoot, 45, of Oakland, has been appointed Secretary of the California Natural Resources Agency. Crowfoot was chief executive officer of the Water Foundation from 2016 to 2018. He was deputy cabinet secretary and senior advisor to Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. from 2013 to 2016. Crowfoot also served as deputy director for Governor Brown's Office of Planning and Research from 2011 to 2013.

He was West Coast political director at the Environmental Defense Fund from 2009 to 2011 and senior environmental advisor to former San Francisco Mayor Gavin Newsom from 2004 to 2007. This position requires Senate confirmation and the compensation is \$209,943. Crowfoot is a Democrat. Additionally the Governor could appoint a Director of Fish and Wildlife and several Deputy Director positions within DFW. All members of the Fish and Game Commission are appointed by the Governor and 2 positions are open. All appointments need confirmation from the Senate.

The CBHSAA annual meeting was held in January with the Legislative Committee meeting on Friday January 11th. Current Legislative Reps include, Region 1 Teri Faulkner, Region 2 Joe Wylie, Region 3 Sharon Prey/Belle Leporini, Region 4 Jason Yenne, Region 5 Amanda Duchardt and Region 6 Wayne Raupe. 





### 2019 CBH/SAA State Broadhead Championship Tournament General Working Mechanics

- This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter as opposed to the tournament archer. It is designed to offer the hunter some benefits without his/her becoming entangled in the aspects of a Field tournament. NFAA rules do not apply to this event
- The State Broadhead Tournament shall be either a one or two day event.
- The 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President of Hunting or his delegate shall govern this tournament.
- The range for this event shall be laid out in such a manner as to simulate hunting conditions when possible.
- Archers shall use hunting tackle for this event which is in keeping with California State Fish & Game Laws on Big Game Hunting.

#### A. Scoring:

- 1) Vital 10 Kill 8 Wound 5
- An arrow must be in the target to score, except a "Pass-through" which must be witnessed and scored as witnessed by other shooters in the group.
- 3) "Bounce-ins and "Glance-offs" shall not score.
- 4) "Antlers" do not score.
- Shaft of arrow must touch the line for higher score.
- 6) Double scoring is required.
- 7) This shall be a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.

#### B. Divisions and Styles of Shooting:

- 1) Divisions
  - a) Seniors (65+)
  - b) Adult (18-64): Male and Female
  - c) Young Adult (ages 15-17): Male and Female
  - d) Youth (ages 12-14): Male and Female
- 2) Styles
  - a) Sight (S)
  - b) Non-Sight (NS)
  - c) Release (R)
  - d) Recurve (Rc)
  - e) Traditional (T)

#### C. Awards:

- CBH/SAA Membership (Regular or Associate) is required to compete for awards.
- Guest Class is one class (Male and Female combined) and there will be no awards.
- 3) No awards will be mailed.
- Cubs and Peewees will not be shooting for awards but will receive a participation award.

#### D. Tackle:

- 2 stabilizer bars in total, no single bar over 12".
   A quivalizer is not considered a stabilizer.
- 2) Bow quivers are allowed in all styles.
- 3) No magnifying scopes are allowed.
- No compound bows over 80 pounds peak draw weight. Recurves and longbows have no limit
- 5) Binoculars are allowed. NO RANGE FINDERS!
- 6) No range finding devices allowed at any time on the range.
- Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish & Game Codes at all times during the shoot –

- expandable broadheads are allowed if they meet Ca. Fish & Game Codes. Expandable broadheads must open and not be altered to stay closed.
- 8) Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish & Game Codes (7/8" minimum diameter)
- Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
- All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
- Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
- 12) Longbows: Any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
- 13) Longbows: Must be shot off the shelf
- 14) Clickers allowed in all styles.

#### E. Miscellaneous:

- Cubs & Peewees: For safety reasons Cubs and Peewees will shoot field points only.
- Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
- All protests to the Protest Committee must be in writing within thirty (30) minutes of the end of the tournament and include a \$25.00 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
- 4) There must be a minimum of three shooters per target at all times.
- Top shooters from each style will be grouped on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of the tournament.
- 6) No target or sight notes allowed (sight tapes ok)
- No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will not be assisted.
- No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours – except for tournament officials.
- Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
- 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
- 11) NO cell phones, computers or any other electronic devices allowed on the range or bow.
- 12) Tournament officals will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
- 13) Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualification.
