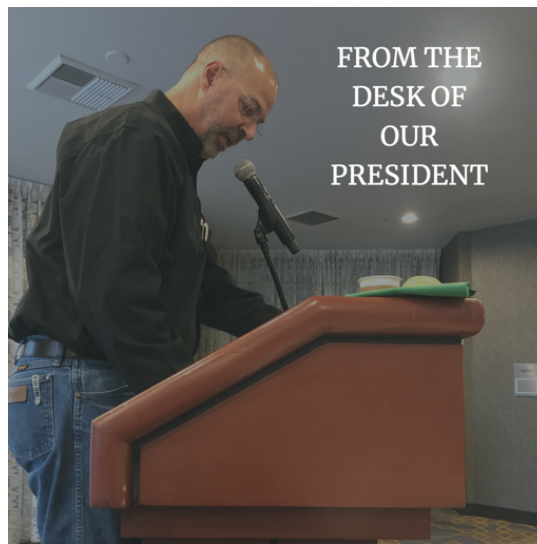

Trapped AGAIN!

(And a Charging Big Old Battle Scarred Boar!)

On January 10th my good friends, Bob King and Al Winger, arrived at my house, in Arizona, for a week of Javelina hunting. They were driving straight through from California and would be arriving late in the evening. When they were about 2 hours away I called them and told them that I was fixing dinner, venison chili over **YAMS**, with the main ingredients being burger from **Goliath**, my Missouri Whitetail buck. They were talking to me via Al's handsfree bluetooth in his truck. Of course, I was not privy to their facial expressions nor their conversation after we hung up. However, after dinner, they told me that they both wrinkled their faces up at the... OVER YAMS part and both had agreed that they did NOT like YAMS. They both ate their share of the chili... over YAMS and then told me that they really liked it. This was the first time they have eaten yams that they liked. (Thanks to my Son-In-Law Chef and food blogger Mike Cleavenger for the recipe.) Well, SUCCESS comes from many directions and this was SUCCESS!!!

We stayed up and talked until after midnight then we hit the sack anticipating heading to the hills on the first day

of our five-day hunt. After breakfast we jumped into our vehicles for the drive out to an area that our friends and hunting partners, EW Williams, and his wife Mary, had shared with me. They had scouted the area a couple of weeks back and had found some good Javelina sign. I hadn't been there before so after arriving we evaluated the area and decided to go up the road a little further. We came to a water source that didn't have any Javelina sign but I thought I would hunt this area tonight as I had more time to hunt this season than they did and told them go back to the first place where the Javelina sign was and I would meet them right after dark.

As far as Javelina was concerned, our first day, Monday, was a bust for all of us. However, I did have a close encounter "OF THE STINKY KIND." After looking for tracks around the area I decided I would tuck up under a juniper tree and do some waiting and glassing. As I sat there a covey of Quail came in for water and about half an hour later, I noticed a white rock about 45 yards away on the other side of the water. I didn't remember seeing it before, so I put my binoculars to my eyes and to my surprise it was a "**Hooded Skunk**." It drank for a while then proceeded to its left staying close to the water's edge. For the next ten minutes it searched for food and drank as it circled the water. It was an amazing little creature and I enjoyed watching it. It searched and scurried along in an odd little gate. Soon it rounded the water on my right and was on my side of the pond, about twenty yards in front and to my right. It scurried along staying close to the water then when it was right in front of me it stuck its nose in the air and caught the scent of something interesting, something it liked, maybe me, maybe something in my backpack. The next thing I knew it was coming right to me, but I thought surly it would turn and go away, but it didn't. It continued its odd little gate until it was just six feet in front of me and still coming! I was **trapped!!** I had no time to exit my position because I was concentrating on videoing this little guy.

Whether it was a good or a bad decision I decided to kinda kick some dirt at it. My first kick had no effect on its progress. After my second kick it stopped, looked at me, then backtracked a couple of feet and circled to my left, then behind me, and went on its way. Yes! I was sweating bullets for about ten seconds and thinking back on it... I guess I should have just let it come on in and investigate... Or would that have been a bad decision!?? My actions, good or bad, I was pleased with the outcome and I didn't have to burn my cloths and I didn't have to explain to Bob and Al why I was driving home naked!

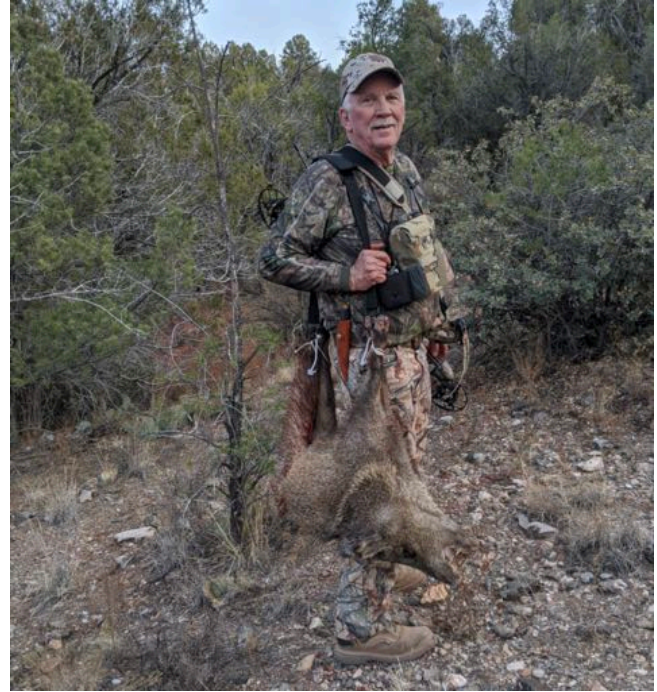
Tuesday we were back at the first place and we sat up two pup blinds. Bob and Al were in one blind, and I was in the other about 200 yards away. After about an hour into the sit Bob's legs were bugging him and he had to get up and walk circles around the sleeping Al for most of the afternoon. I was watching very dutifully, as I should... Right?

Trapped continued from page 5- At 2:pm I saw a Mule Deer doe in the clearing, right in front of me. Hmmmm...I think she popped up out of a squirrel hole because there is no way I could not have seen her approach!! I'm sure I hadn't nodded off! Not even for a second!!! Hmmmm... Well, for the next two hours, no matter how hard I tried to stay awake I couldn't. I would nod off and wake up, nod off and wake up and etc etc. I checked my phone occasionally, to see what time it was. The last time I checked my phone it was 4:00pm. Then for some reason, thirty minutes later, at 4:30pm, I woke up and there were twelve Javelina standing in front of me!! I saw a big boar and I ranged him at twenty-four yards. I split my 20 and 30 yard pins. I touched the trigger and the boar exploded and ran to my left and then he turned to his left and was **CHARGING STRAIGHT TOWARD THE BLIND... AND ME!!!** I was in shock!! **Again**, I was **trapped** and had NO time to EXIT my position!!! CRAP! Was this going to be **HAND** to **TUSK COMBAT** with a VERY angry 60-pound boar!!!??? If it was going to be combat, I knew exactly who was going to win this battle and it sure in the heck wasn't going to be me!!! I started saying "Oh S**t! Oh S**t!!! Oh S**t!!!!!" out loud. Suddenly the boar stopped and toppled over on it's side just a mere ten yards in front of my blind! This all happened in less than ten seconds. Damn!! Two days in a row I have been in a precarious position, being trapped! Yet, I came out of both situations unscathed!!! I pray that the next time I'm **trapped** it isn't with a Mountain Lion as I know I can't continue to bat 1000 against these critters!!! On Wednesday, we were back hoping for more good luck. I was sitting at a vantage point where I could see the blind where Al was tucked away, but could not see Bob's blind. Al, having given in to sleep the day before and knowing he wasn't going to be able to stay awake this entire sit he put some of his extra cloths on the ground and arranged his pack as a pillow. Admiring his fancy work he plopped down and promptly went to sleep.

At 2:00 pm I saw a herd of Javelina cross the fence about halfway between Bob and Al. They fed in the meadow then worked their way towards Bob. He said they stopped at 65 yards from him and presented no shot. They fed on the grass and did some rooting then they turned and headed toward Al. Bob watched as the herd got closer and closer to Al. I couldn't see the Javelina at this time. Bob must have been screaming in his head at Al telling him that Javelina were coming his way because when the first three arrived in front of Al's blind he woke up and looked out the window. He got into his chair and grabbed his bow, he ranged them and made a good shot on a big one. I didn't know if he had shot or not for sure as I didn't see his error but the pigs bolted and disappeared. After about 10 minutes I saw Al come out of the blind and gave me a thumbs up. Bob saw me arrive and came over. We found Al's arrow and then we went back to the trucks to get a snack and

let about 40 minutes tick away. After a short blood trail Al and Bob located his Javelina piled up under a juniper. Success!!!!



Who says a SLEEPING hunter never bags his game!??? That's 2 javelina for 2 sleeping hunters!!! We hunted Thursday but we didn't see anything at all. Bob was feeling the pressure of being away from his business, a Marine Diesel Engine Repair business, so he decided he and Al had to leave on Friday, a day early. Bob said even though he had not tagged his Javelina he had a GREAT time. Being with good friends in the outdoors and doing what we love doing... that my friends is SUCCESS!!!

Legislative Coordinator Robert Moore

A Fish and Game Commission meeting was held February 10th by webinar/teleconference. Agenda items with results of the meeting: 2. Election of Commission President Peter Silva his term expires 1/2024, Vice President Samantha Murray her term expired 1/2021 but can remain on the Commission until the Governor appoints a replacement or she gets reappointed. 3. Committee assignments, the Commission forms three committees from its membership, consisting of at least one commissioner: Marine Resources Committee, Samantha and Peter, Tribal Committee, Jacque and Peter and Wildlife Resources, Eric. 6. Justice, equity, diversity and inclusion Draft plan was submitted and will be worked on as resources are allocated. 14. Waterfowl hunting (annual) Discuss proposed changes to waterfowl hunting regulations. (Amend Section 502, Title 14, CCR) 5. Mammal hunting, consider adopting proposed changes to

regulations for deer and antelope hunting quotas and seasons, and regulations for elk, antelope, and bighorn sheep tags. (Amend sections 360 and 363; and add Section 708.19, Title 14, CCR) proposal was adopted. 21. Petitions granted today will be added to the Commission's rulemaking calendar for development and future consideration. (A) Petitions received at previous meetings II. Petition #2020-016 AM1: Request to allow use of a crossbow scope by visually-disabled archers. This petition was forwarded to CDFW for review. CBHSAA suggested the DFW use similar language used for the muzzleloader regulations in regards to scopes. Next meeting – April 14-15, 2021 Next Wildlife Resources Committee meeting May 11th, no agenda has been posted at this writing.

The Governor's office has not named a replacement for Commissioner Russell Burns as he has resigned from his position back in November.

Legislative information: You can follow current legislation at <http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/> **SB252** Weiner, Ban Bear Hunting, as written this bill would ban all bear hunting in the state. The bill was just introduced and no assignments to committees are listed. **Update:** This bill has been removed from this legislative session as a result of actions from the conservation community.

AB 614 Aguiar-Curry. Wildlife habitat: birds. This bill would raise by \$5 the upland game bird hunting validation and the state duck hunting validation fees, as specified, with that \$5 to be deposited, and available upon appropriation to the department for the Nesting Bird Habitat Incentive Program, in the Nesting Bird Habitat Incentive Program Account, which the bill would create in the Fish and Game Preservation Fund. This bill instead would require the Upland Game Bird Account advisory committee to annually review and provide comments to the department on all proposed projects and other expenditures funded from the Upland Game Bird Account to help ensure that specified requirements pertaining to the Upland Game Bird Account have been met and require the department to post budget information and a brief description on its internet website for all projects and other expenditures funded from the Upland Game Bird Account.

AB 804 Megan, Dahle. Free hunting days. Existing law authorizes the Director of Fish and Wildlife to establish 2 free hunting days per year: one in the fall, and one in the winter. Existing law authorizes a California unlicensed resident to hunt during a free hunting day if accompanied by a licensed hunter, subject to certain conditions. Existing law prohibits these provisions from being implemented until the Department of Fish and Wildlife's Automated License Data System is fully operational for at least one year. This bill would require, rather than authorize, the director to establish 2 free hunting days per year, one in the fall and one in the spring, no later than July 1, 2022. The bill would delete the prohibition requiring a delay in implementation of the above-described provisions.

SB 370 Dodd, Wildlife: Big Game Management Account: uses. Existing law establishes the Big Game Management Account within the Fish and Game Preservation Fund. Existing law requires revenue from the sale of tags for antelope, elk, deer, wild pig, bear, and sheep to be deposited in the account, except as provided. Existing law requires funds deposited in the account to be expended, upon appropriation by the Legislature, by the Department of Fish and Wildlife, solely for specified purposes and pursuant to specified limitations. Existing law authorizes the department to make grants to, reimburse, or enter into contracts or other agreements with nonprofit organizations for the use of the funds from the account to carry out those purposes, including related habitat conservation projects. This bill instead would authorize the department to make grants to, reimburse, or enter into contracts or other agreements with public and private entities, including nonprofit organizations, and federally recognized Indian tribes for the use of the funds from the account to carry out those purposes.

SB 470 Jones, Fishing and hunting: annual combined hunting and fishing licenses. This bill would create the annual combined hunting and fishing license that would grant the holder of the license the same privileges as the annual hunting and fishing licenses and that would be valid for a term of one year from the date specified on the license.

The bill would limit the issuance of these licenses to residents and would require the department to issue these licenses beginning January 1, 2023, upon payment of a fee of \$100, as adjusted annually for inflation.

The bill would require the Fish and Game Commission to adjust the amount of the fee to fully recover, but not exceed, all reasonable administrative and implementation costs of the department and the commission relating to these licenses. The bill would require the department to provide an applicant for one of these licenses the option to automatically renew the license and would provide a 5% discount if the applicant selects this option.

Javelina Burger Recipe

Bret Scott-Owner of Willow Creek Archery Shop

So, you don't like to eat Javelina! Well, here is a sure-fire way to enjoy your Javelina and you will never again give it away.

Cut all the useable meat from the carcass (lots of gristle & Tendons on ribs and lower legs) and remove all of the sinew, fat, tendons and gristle you can. This will aid in getting quality tasting meet and it will make the grinding process much easier.

Ingredients:

1. Javelina ground meat (10 to 14 lbs an average size Javelina)
2. 2 Bricks of Sharp Cheddar Cheese (diced)
3. 8 Jalapeño Peppers (seeds removed and diced) adjust to taste as this is mild
4. Bacon ends diced (20% of the Javelina)

Put the meat through the course grind one or two times. Then, run it through the fine grind.

Mix together cheese, peppers and bacon ends.

Add cheese mixture to ground Javelina. Fine grind.

Divide into 1 lb. logs. Wrap to freeze or vacuum seal.

Freezing suggestions: tightly wrap meet logs plastic wrap, 5 to 10 wraps around and flip the ends up as you wrap, so it has no air contacting the meat then seal 3 to 5 logs in 1 gal Zip Lock Bags or Vacuum Seal 3 to 5 together. The logs stack in the freezer very well. Write on the outside of the bag the contents, Javelina Burger, and the Date of Kill.

I had my Javelina processed last year and the backstraps and steaks were tough, good flavor, but not fun to eat so this is how I will process my Javelina from now on.



Tips for Skinning Your Javelina

Al Carlos, owner of "**Cactus Creek Arrows**", lives South of Phoenix (Arizona). He has many a Javelina under his belt and shared his knowlege about skinning these little critters, without contaminating the meat. He has perfected his method of the skinning process and removing the chance of cross contaminating with the scent gland and the meat of the Javelina.

Javelina have a scent gland on top of their lower back or hindquarters that is a musky oil, and it stinks kinda like a skunk. This makes many hunters think the meat stinks and tastes horrible, so they give their Javelina away not knowing there is nothing wrong with the meat. In actuality, it was the way they have done the field dressing.

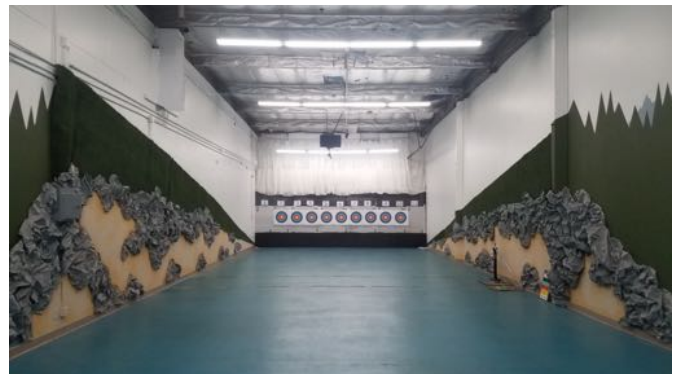
When by yourself, skin it by hanging it in a tree or somewhere that the head is hanging down. Wearing disposable gloves, cut around the lower leg on the foot side of the leg. Once you have the cuts made on the hind legs, slice the skin to the abdomen and down towards the head. Get a little bit of the leg skinned down, so you can grab the inside of the hide, then toss your gloves in the trash. With new gloves, touch **ONLY** the inside of the hide, then continue skinning as you pull the hide down. If you are with a hunting buddy, prep as above, but have him/her pull the hide down never touching the meat. Only the skinner with the knife is to touch the meat.

Cross contamination is the issue here. Eliminate that and you will have excellent table fair.



SOUTHBAY ARCHERY LESSONS

A little over three years ago, South Bay Archery lessons opened an NFAA- and USA Archery-certified indoor range in Redondo Beach. The mission from the start was to create a place where all types of archers—whether Olympic- or hunter-oriented—could better their skill in a safe, accessible, indoor range. It is not an archery shop. There have always been numerous places to purchase equipment, and an abundance of venues to shoot.

SOUTHBAY ARCHERY LESSONS from page 9. But it was more than obvious that too many “lessons” were handed down from well-meaning relatives and friends. Sometimes these free instructions were great, often they reflected what they cost. So now in its sixth year, South Bay Archery Lessons at 1300 Kingsdale Avenue in Redondo Beach—in addition to hosting an approved virtual Vegas tournament location—is a busy but accommodating facility offering lessons to both beginners and the experienced, in Barebow recurve, Olympic recurve, and Compound archery.

The facility features 11-20-yard lanes and a soon-to-be-erected moving javelina. During Covid, lane use is limited to six archers at a time, or two lines with five and six archers per line, and everything--from private lessons to open shooting--is by appointment only. Pre-Covid, and post-Covid when their party room re-opens, they can host party and corporate groups up to 33 archers. Annually, they host a tournament to raise thousands of dollars for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

The range is owned and operated by CBH members Makanalani (Lani) Farbman Thatcher and her husband Paul Farbman. And of course, they met through archery! In addition to having NFAA certification for both their range and their club—the California Indoor Archers (the CIA)—Paul is a USA Archery Level 4-NTS Coach and Level 2 Judge, and Lani is a Level 3-NTS Coach and Level 2 Judge. Their view is that a better, well-trained hunter achieves a more accurate shot, a quicker kill, and is less likely to spend time chasing wounded prey. They invite you to check out their Yelp and/or Google reviews, but better yet, visit them the next time you’re in the South Bay near Torrance.



The Challenge Ahead

As members of the CBH we have all at some point been drawn to face a challenge and accepted it.

Perhaps after feeling the rush of making a great shot on a target you were inspired to join the CBH club and start doing some local or state tournaments.

Many, if not all of us, started with that and for some that challenge was enough.

For others it led to the next step and that was to start bowhunting. Many more started with the gun and maybe after a few years rifle hunting the itch for



something more challenging was the bug that bit them.

Traditional equipment is the challenge for others such as me, but one thing we all have in common is we are bowhunters and we embrace that challenge year after year in the hopes of adventure and success.

When it comes to myself, I’ve been an on again off again CBH member for the past 25 years, not the admission I enjoy making but its true. After all I have a busy career, a wife and 3 kids as well as a host of other things to pull me in one direction or another.

2020 though was a different year and with more time to focus on what I felt really mattered I made an effort to make sure my CBH membership, NFAA and Compton Traditional memberships were all up to date and for a time it felt that was the level of support I could give.

On January 12th of this year though a new challenge hit me hard, square in the face, SB252.

Senator Scott Wiener funded by the Humane Society of the United States presented a bill to the California Senate to ban all bear hunting in California due to bear suffrage at the hands of hunters.

My first internal response was “well that sucks!”

That initial reaction changed when I remembered back to 1990 when as hunters we had the chance to stop SB132 and we were not quick, vocal or effective and on June 5th the people of California voted to pass the bill ending the management of lions by The Department of Fish and Game, forever.

At that time, we tried but without the resources we have today it was more of a battle than we were equipped to fight effectively at the time.

In 2021 though we have the resources and media access to act swiftly and effectively. In the modern world people of all walks of life can stand up and be heard, loudly. We didn't have such a tool in 1990.

A small group of hunters using Facebook and Instagram used these new tools to go straight to top of the food chain and fight back.

I myself started with a post on Instagram which others saw and shared, many more were shared with me at the same time showing us a clear path to both the author of the bill and the HSUS funding it.

Using the text from the bill itself, posts from Wieners personal Instagram page and the HSUS a quick phone call was made to my local state congressman and also my house rep, districts reps office and my city mayors office.

Within 30 minutes all the mentioned offices had been contacted about the bill, asked for any science-based data to support (which there was none) and had recorded my name and address in opposition.



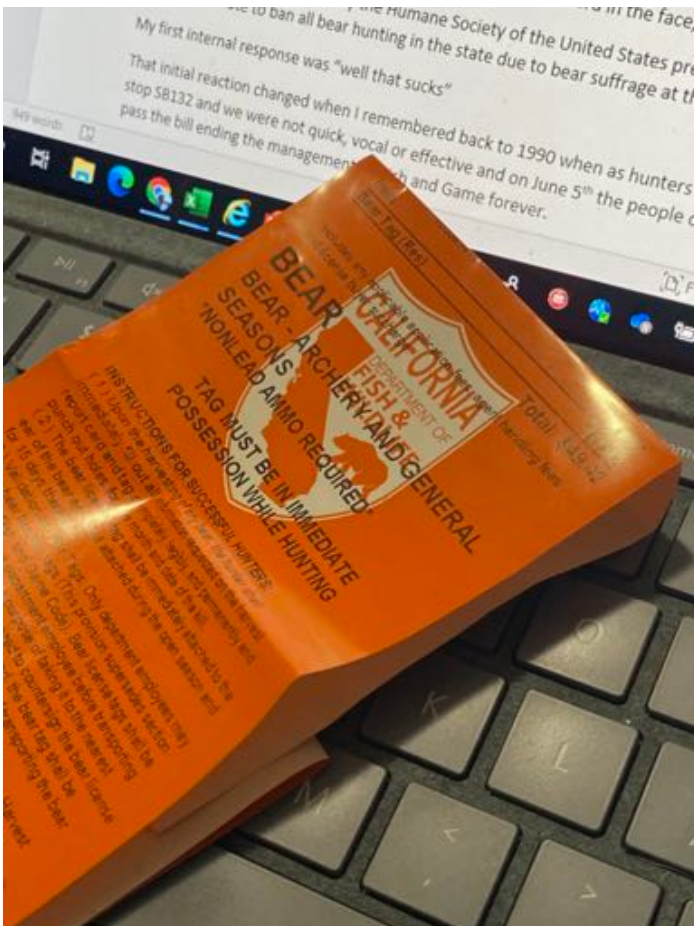
The next phone call was to Senator Wieners office where a very nice staffer spent 10 minutes speaking with me about the bill and why it was the "next big win" for animal rights in California before I was allowed to begin my questioning for science based reasoning, data of car vs bear instances, date for human vs bear interactions in and out of our national parks and asking how much the HSUS would be submitting to the state for conservation efforts once the monies from the Robertson/Pitman Act dried up due to no longer having a state run bear hunting program. The call came quickly to an end after that, but the writing was on the wall, they had nothing.

Hunters and outdoorsmen across the state joined and took the challenge back to the Senator to provide evidence of science to back his claims in SB252. None of those calls were met with information. The Senators personal Instagram account had more likes **300+** and comments **1200+** as of this writing on his SB252 post than any other he has ever posted. People from all over the untied states rallied and made their voices heard. Phone calls, letters, social media posts all made and continue to make a difference.

Less that a week after SB252 was introduced Senator Wiener pulled it from the floor claiming it was not the right bill or the right timing for the State to spend time and resources on for something like "wildlife".

The Humane Society of the United States deleted their post all together signaling a significant loss.

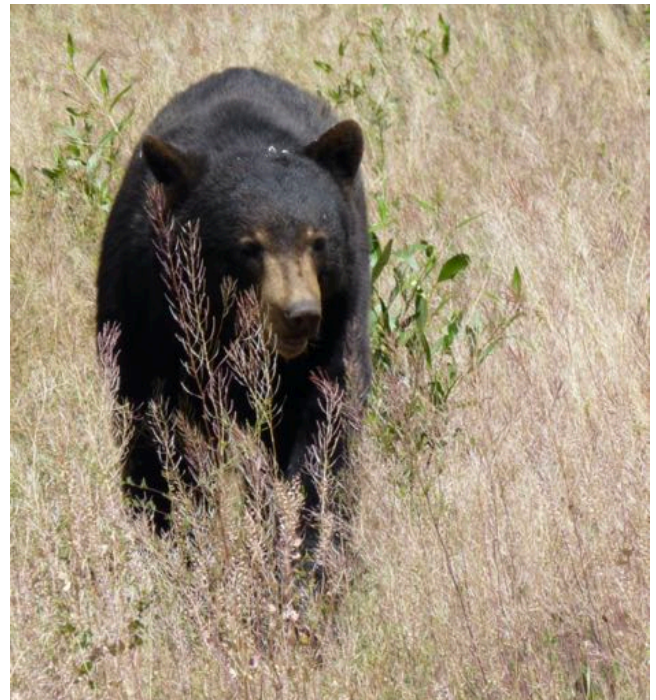

Sunrise Encounter

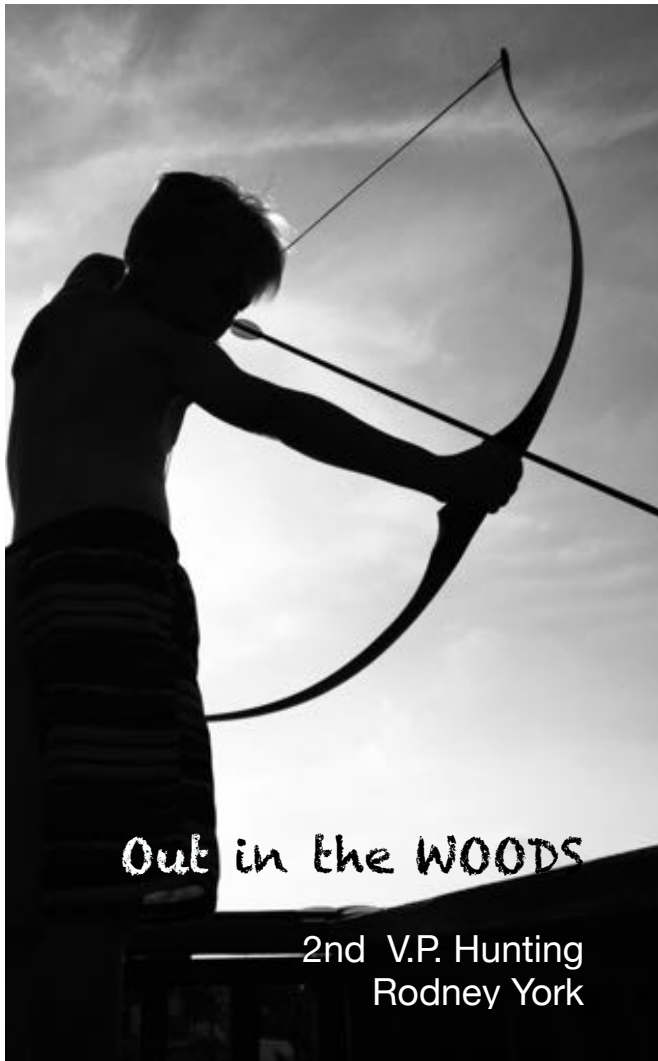

It was back in September.... long ago... I went on a two day archery hunt for bear. It was on a Thursday morning when I had my encounter... I left camp before sunrise to get to a spot where there were a lot of bear signs: tracks, poop and so on... I had found a little area that was open, free of brush and I decided to sit off to the side near a fallen tree. The trail went just past it, through an open space. As I sat, I had this feeling that I was being watched...or followed...



It was still dark, I was using my flashlight to find my way into this area... so I got set; but still this feeling just wouldn't go away... I decided to walk back up the trail and come in from the opposite side for an angling down shot if... if a bear came through I would be within 15 yards... First I made out the eyes... yellowish round eyes... My mind went into high gear... I saw that small face; ears folded back and my thoughts were; *that log is a mountain lion!*... The flight of the arrow fascinated me, it became my exuberance. As time continued it would be the flight of the arrow that was etched in my mind most vividly. I would recall the arrow as it seemed to float on air to its destination. What made this flight so memorable was how the fletching guided the arrow just above the rock or distant log. That drew me to release yet another shaft which flew like a frozen rope in between the branches to its' intended target. The romance of watching as the tip of the arrow clipped the top off the wild oats, or the visualization of the fluorescent nock as it cleared the horizon by just enough space to find its mark was mystifying.

Reminiscing 60+ years of bow in hand is often prompted by the dreariness of a rainy day or the distant snow laden mountains. And as the snow regresses it is a welcoming thought that the bow will again be pressing against my palm much, much more often than in prior months. But it is exactly thoughts of long ago that generated this current column. What was it that originally drew me to archery? Was it the call of fame - certainly not! Was it the legends of bowhunting I knew or of whom I read? Not at all for me. I knew of no one that shot a bow other the famous "Robinhood."

For me it was the call of the outdoors which beckoned me; the need to spend as much time outdoors as I could. That is the motivation I used to make the first call about SB252, after that it was the thrill of the hunt.

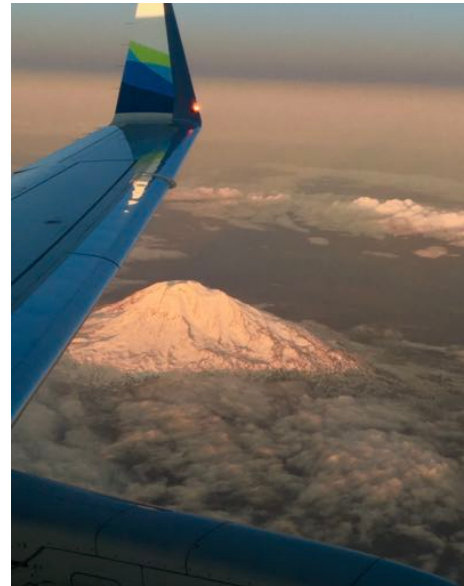

The rattling and violet shaking would intensify as the pilot shouted out, "Buckle UP". Yet somehow the beast too would stay "Aloft", riding on the foil of air that streamed under its wings the twenty some miles to Catalina Islands. Somehow one found comfort in the dry monotone drone of the engines (as long as both were running) even though you knew you had signed all rights away before entering her bowels. The final bank of the amphibious plane to make her approach to the bay gave more meaning to the word "final". Yet after all these years it is the flights that remains in my mind even more than the hunts themselves.



While on the subject of flight one who has been to British Columbia or Alaska can not refrain from writing of these memorable occasions. Watching from above as endless miles of tundra or snow covered mountains race by under you or feeling you can reach out a touch the glaciers on either side can never be explained as well as experienced. Then continuing in the lands of many waters there are the bush planes with "floats". Many of these babies fly so slow that you feel you will fall from the sky. And yet they are among some of my fondest memories of flight and pristine country in the same sentence. Then engraved on my mind is the time it took two passes "In the Land of Sky Blue Waters" to become airborne.



On this occasion the Cessna 180 was loaded to the hilt. The pilot and two passengers were not enough so a boned out caribou was added to the payload. This was done (of course) so that cargo could all be faired out in a singular flight. As we approached the end of the lake on the first pass the pilot murmured something about - "We aren't gonna make it". This tightened the grip my hunting partner had on the dashboard. He had asked if he could sit in the front on the return flight which he was now regretting. Be that as it may on our second pass we "skied" on one pontoon to reduce the resistance of the plane's weight in the water. White knuckle and all we cleared the tops of the spruce by at least a foot when we reached the end of the small lake. So as you have read, it is a romance with flight that takes me deep into the woods, across sage covered hills and over the next mountain for just the chance, one chance to watch the flight of an arrow. Without the bow I would probably never have experienced any of these foundations of life.

FROM OUR HISTORIAN Scott Walker Bows and Arrows in Warfare

The use of bows and arrows in warfare was superior power of enemies for the 12 centuries. Then, gunpowder was developed and from that first ball and hollow rod to what we have now developed took 800 years. In other words, it took 800 years for the gun to grow from a primitive hollow rod to the weapons of mass destruction that we have today.

But what happened to the bow and arrow during those centuries? Well, it pretty much stayed the same. Yes, from Robin Hood (hundreds of years ago) up to the mid-1900s, there just wasn't any change or advancement of bow and arrow technology.

Most of the old-timers around will agree that we refer to modern day archery, as starting pretty much after World War II. This is newer plastics and metals were developed that took our nation to victory. We had men like Fred Bear and Douglas Easton who perfected such materials and equipment that advanced power and proficiency of traditional archery equipment. The recurve bows and aluminum arrows were developed. There were other guys like Ben Pearson, the Gordon brothers with their plastics and fiberglass, Earl Hoyt, Gail Martin and later there were others who came along like Tom Jennings with the compound bow. Then Matt McPherson who advance the power, proficiency and strength of the compound bow. All this came about because of the investigative minds that all archers seem to have, everything that could be used with a bow and arrow seemed to just blossom.

As I said, with a gun it took centuries of development, but in just a few decades, through the 1900s, archers and hunters seem to have it all, new broadhead systems, new sighting systems, and new bow systems. During the Stone Age thousands of years ago the wheel was discovered and now after all these centuries later (in 1966) archery discovered the wheel. The thing to think about all this is all of the Archery improvements that came about in the last 50 years, depending on when you were born, came about during one lifetime.

I remember taking my first deer with a recurve bow I like shooting my recurve back then and now I pick it up and shoot small game around the ranch or just plain old target practice. Personally like most all of the new discoveries and over the years have tried out just about all of the new stuff. But for some it was too much too soon and they stayed with their traditional equipment and I can't blame them. I still get out my old

traditional equipment and still have fun using it. There will always be Archers who love their traditional equipment and I am seeing more and more camaraderie between compound shooters and those traditional shooters. How you bow hunt or what kind of legal bowhunting equipment you use really shouldn't matter.

Bowhunting should be for all Bowhunter's and all Bowhunter's should show respect for all other fellow Bowhunter's and their choice of legal bowhunting equipment.

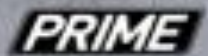

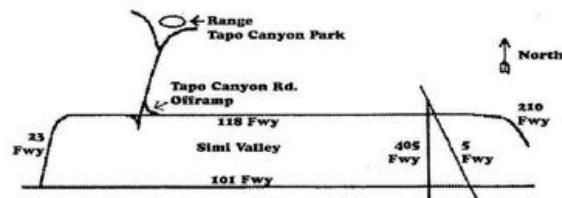

CBH/SAA State Broadhead Championship Tournament General Working Mechanics

1. This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter as opposed to the tournament archer. It is designed to offer the hunter some benefits without his/her becoming entangled in the aspects of a Field tournament. NFAA rules do not apply to this event
 2. The State Broadhead Tournament shall be either a one or two day event held on Memorial Day weekend.
 3. The 2nd Vice President of Hunting or his delegate shall govern this tournament.
 4. The range for this event shall be laid out in such a manner as to simulate hunting conditions when possible.
 5. Archers shall use hunting tackle for this event which is in keeping with California State Fish & Game Laws on Big Game Hunting.
 - A. Scoring:
 - 1) Vital - 10 Kill - 8 Wound - 5
 - 2) An arrow must be in the target to score, except a "Pass-through" which must be witnessed and scored as witnessed by other shooters in the group.
 - 3) "Bounce-ins and "Glance-offs" shall not score.
 - 4) "Antlers" do not score.
 - 5) Shaft of arrow must touch the line for higher score.
 - 6) Double scoring is required.
 - 7) This shall be a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.
 - B. Divisions and Styles of Shooting:
 - 1) Divisions
 - a) Seniors (65+)
 - b) Adult (18-64): Male and Female
 - c) Young Adult (ages 15-17): Male and Female
 - d) Youth (ages 12-14): Male and Female
 - 2) Styles
 - a) Sight (S)
 - b) Non-Sight (NS)
 - c) Release (R)
 - d) Recurve (Rc)
 - e) Traditional (T)
 - C. Awards:
 - 1) CBH/SAA Membership (Regular or Associate) is required to compete for awards.
 - 2) Guest Class is one class (Male and Female combined) and there will be no awards.
 - 3) No awards will be mailed.
 - 4) Cubs and PeeWees Participation Award Only
 - D. Tackle:
 - 1) One stabilizer not over 12 inches, allowed. A Quivalizer is not considered a stabilizer
 - 2) Bow quivers are allowed in all styles.
 - 3) No magnifying scopes are allowed.
 - 4) No compound bows over 80 pounds peak draw weight. Recurves and longbows have no limit
 - 5) Binoculars are allowed No range finding binoculars allowed even with the battery removed NO RANGE FINDERS Period!
 - 6) Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish & Game Codes at all times during the shoot – expandable broadheads are allowed if they meet Ca. Fish & Game Codes.
 - 7) Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish & Game Codes (7/8" minimum diameter)
 - 8) Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
 - 9) All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
 - 10) Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
 - 11) Longbows: Any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
 - 12) Longbows: Must be shot off the shelf
 - 13) Clickers allowed in all styles.
- E. Miscellaneous:
- 1) Cubs and Peewees will shoot field points only
 - 2) Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
 - 3) All protests to the Protest Committee must be in writing within thirty (30) minutes of the end of the tournament each day and include a \$25.00 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
 - 4) There must be a minimum of three shooters per target at all times.
 - 5) Top shooters from each style will be grouped on the 2nd day of the tournament. Cubs and Peewees will not be allowed to shoot in top flight groups. NO EXCEPTIONS
 - 6) No target or sight notes allowed (sight tapes ok)
 - 7) No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will not be assisted.
 - 8) No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours – except for tournament officials.
 - 9) Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
 - 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
 - 11) NO cell phones, computers or any other electronic devices allowed on the range or bow.
 - 12) Tournament officials will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
 - 13) Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualification.

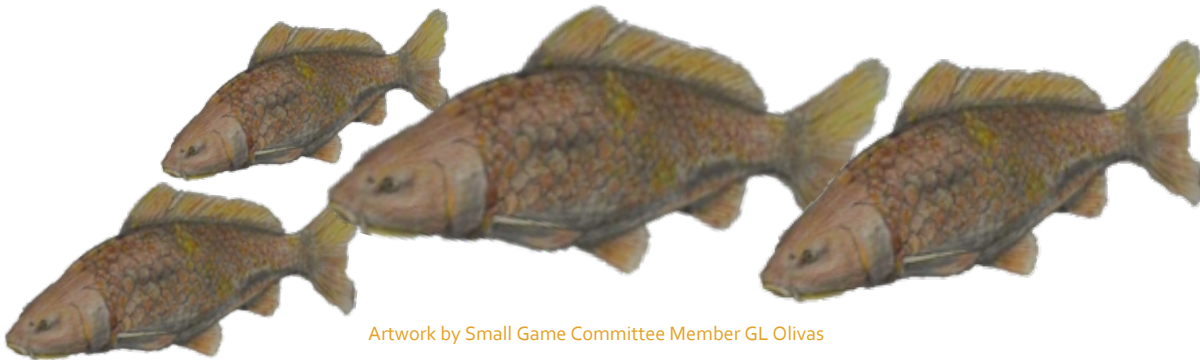
