Wildlife Resources Committee (WRC) meeting was held Thursday January 13, 2022 by teleconference. Agenda items of interest: Preference points and refunds for hunting tags, Discuss a potential rulemaking to provide the Department general authority to address returns of mammal hunting preference points and fee refunds in response to potential future public land closures. Referred to DFW for review

7. Regulation Change Petition 2021-017, Vet and discuss various changes to big game hunting regulations proposed under petition 2021-017. This petition has many moving parts so the WRC will have separate meetings and will break out differed components for each meeting.

A Fish and Game Commission was held on February 17, 2022, 8:30 AM. I've shortened the agenda and only included hunting items. Note: New petitions for regulation change submitted since the previous meetings are now received under the agenda item "Regulation change petitions and non-regulatory requests. Note: The Commission may not discuss or take action on any matter raised during this item. Except to decide whether to place the matter on the agenda of a future meeting (sections 11125 and 11125.7(a), Government Code). CONSENT ITEMS Note: Items on the consent calendar are expected to be routine and non-controversial.28. Waterfowl hunting Discuss proposed amendments to waterfowl hunting regulations.(Amend Section 502, Title 14, CCR) 29. Big game preference points reinstatement and tag refunds Consider adopting proposed amendments to big game regulations to include preference points reinstatement and tag refunds due to public land closures for 2021-2022 hunting seasons.

(Amend Section 708.14, Title 14, CCR). Shortly after close of the FGC a 15 day noticed of revised language. Regulation change petitions and non-regulatory requests (wildlife and inland fisheries) (A) 30. New petitions Receive new petitions for regulation change. (Pursuant to Section 662, Title 14,

Report on necropsies on mountain lions taken under 2021 depredation permits. (C) Next meeting – April 20-21, 2022 (D) New business, adjourn The next FGC meeting will be held April 20 & 21. This is a difficult article to write but I/we must recognize and honor our archery Brothers and great friends, some of whom we have lost to this #@%\$@ Covid virus. I am going to keep it upbeat as much as I can. Alan Meurer lost his battle with Covid on August 24, 2021. Ruben Carlos lost his battle on February 7th, 2022, and Marco Proto lost his on February 23, 2022. I had the honor of knowing and spending lots of time with each of them. They all were absolutely the kind of people you wanted in your corner.

In addition to their immediate families, these men had large extended families, many in the archery community that they loved, and were loved in return. Each one of these men would come to your aid at any time and any place. They ALL gave much of their time to the sport of archery which was their love. Each one supported archery through their memberships and support of the California Bowmen Hunters / State Archery Association (CBH/SAA), and their participation in local and distant archery clubs. If it were not for their love of archery many people would never have met these awesome individuals.

Additionally, these three individuals supported the CBH/SAA Small Game Club with their participation in the Tilapia and Carp Tournaments. Both Alan and Marco were at the 2021, Tilapia Tournament and are, by chance, and very fitting, pictured in the group photo that is on this year's Tilapia flyer found elsewhere in this issue of this magazine. Both Alan and Marco were successful in getting tilapia that were milestones for each of them.

Alan Meurer:

I have known Alan for about 30 years. I can't recall when we first met but no doubt it was at the Annual CBH/SAA meeting. I learned we had something in common and that was my middle name is spelled just like his first name... Alan. We hit it off right from the start. When we disagreed on something he would start his rebuttal/explanation with, "Well Wayne..." he would tell my why I was wrong.

The only big game hunt I went on with Alan was when he, Rodger Cady, Bill Kuehn, and I went to

Wyoming. We brought back three deer and one buck antelope. We really had a great time and Alan and I often talked about going back or doing another hunt... but we never did.

Most of our time together was either bowfishing or CBH/SAA Legislative Team activities./. He was a Legislative Team Member for many years and was someone I could count on when I served as CBH/SAA President, and also when I was the Legislative Coordinator. Having people who know the history, and don't always agree with you are important people to have around to offer guidance.

Alan was the bow fisherman that received the 1st place award for the biggest tilapia of the 2021 Tilapia Tournament with a 5 lbs 6 oz bruiser. Alan was super excited when he shot this big strapping Tilapia on Saturday morning... and rightfully so. There had not been an entry in the CBH/SAA Big Game Club Record Book for a tilapia over a 5lbs before 2008, which was in the 10th year of the Tilapia Tournament's history. From what I see in the current record book Alan's tilapia is the 8th largest tilapia of almost 100 entries. Number one in the current book is a tilapia that Gary Roney shot which weighed 7 lbs 7 oz.

Alan was excited to share his luck with his wife Terri, who is also a bow fisherman but was at home in Visalia. He texted her and sent her a photo of the fish as soon as he shot it. Continued on page 6

knew that the longer a fish is dead and out of the water the more weight it will lose due to dehydration, so he immediately took his trophy back to camp to get it weighed. His timing was perfect because the Small Game Chairperson, JBarr, had just returned to camp for a few minutes and they got an official weight for it.



If you come to the 2022 Tilapia Tournament, and you are lucky enough to shoot a tilapia that places in the top three of the tournament, you'll receive a plaque with a handmade tilapia by Gilbert Olivas, and your name your name will put into the big game club record book.

Very few of us have gotten a tilapia that tipped the scales at 5 lbs let alone 5 lbs 6 oz! I am one of those that have not accomplished that milestone even though I have shot over 200 tilapia. So, I am very envious of Alan's success.

Marco Proto:

The first time I met Marco, his wife and beautiful daughter, Raylene, was at a Cherry Valley Archery Tournament held at the Big Horn Canyon Ranch in About mid-way through the Riverside County. tournament Marco got so frustrated with his shooting that he threw his bow into the bushes. He shot much better after his tantrum. I still don't know if throwing the bow adjusted his sights or if it adjusted him. It was here at this tournament that I realized that I had just found a friend that I would call my brother.

At the 2021 Tilapia Tournament, Marco told me on Saturday that he was having trouble finding tilapia. I told him to come with me on Sunday and I would put

Within minutes, he got his first tilapia, on his first shot. I'm not sure who was more excited about him getting that first tilapia, him, or me. But needless to say, he was over the top! His goal was to get a new small game species for his Small Game List, and he accomplished that. Then he got his second tilapia on his 2nd shot. Now he thought the sun rose and sat at my command! His fish didn't meet the Big Game Record Book minimum weight of 3 lbs to be entered into the book but each of his fish weighed in at a respectable 2 lbs.

You Never Know Continued from page 6 -It was so hot we both were on the verge of having a heat stroke and had to drink lots of water while we sat in my pickup for half an hour with the A/C cranked up. At 6pm that day the temp dropped to 111 degrees, and it felt like someone turned on the A/C.

Ruben and I went chucker hunting with our archery gear and were VERY UNSUCCESSFUL, so we returned with our shotguns and limited out. On this hunt we learned not to travel with "Silica gel" packets still in shotgun cases. You know, those annoying little white packets found in many things you purchase that absorbs moisture. The packets may break open and the little beads could get all over and stick to the metal parts of the gun. This could jam the semi-auto action, and when another bird takes off you might not get another shot... well, you get the point. Yes, this happened and the birds escaped unscathed...

Another lesson, we learned, was to always have table salt in your backpack when hunting in the hot, dry, heat of the desert. We both had leg cramps, and Rueben's were so bad, he had to walk half a mile, backwards, up, and out of a canyon. Back at the truck, a pinch of salt placed under our tongues immediately cured the cramps.

Ruben was very much a wordsmith and would toss \$100 words out at us in just normal conversation. I saw the expression on many faces that told me that

they had no clue what the heck he just said. I don't know if Ruben attended higher education or not but even though I spent 6 years in college and have a Bachelor of Science Degree he had me guessing at times with his extensive vocabulary.



Matted hair, dirty fingernails, cold cutting winds, a runny nose and stinky armpits. Those are but a few of the things that are predictable when you're out in the wilderness. Oh, and of course this wilderness offered extra amenities like Ocotillo, Saguaro and Cholla cactus, highlighted by Yuccas, Devils Claw, mesquite and Joshua trees. The only neighbors are owls and coyotes at night. During the day you may see a couple quail, a smattering of ravens, the odd cow or two, black-tail jack rabbits and burros.

Any or all of those presumably deterrents, are temporarily dismissed when a 3/4 curl ram steps from behind a rusty red boulder into your field of view.

Ingredient Checklist (4Servings)

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 teaspoons ground smoked paprika
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- [⊥] ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 4 (6 ounce) tilapia fillets
- cooking spray

Directions:

Step 1

Combine olive oil, paprika, garlic powder, salt, and black pepper in a small bowl; stir well. Brush oil mixture evenly over tilapia fillets.

Step 2

Heat a large nonstick grill pan over mediumhigh heat; grease with cooking spray. Grill fish until it flakes.

The objective was to capture 26 desert bighorn sheep for disease testing and fit them with GPS tracking collars.



Volunteers were needed to assist Arizona Game and Fish Department personnel with locating bighorn sheep from designated observation points. Through GPS coordinates, spotter planes were guided in until the helicopter could arrive. This would keep the As nightfall blanketed the arid surroundings 9 rams helicopter flight time to a minimum.

Each volunteer was canvassed for equipment and skill set. Some of the questions, :Do you have binoculars? Spotting scope? 4x4 vehicle? Orange vest? And GPS/onX mapping application and enough for spotting, so the mission was postponed abilities?

Of particular importance was the rating of one's physical and hiking abilities and orienteering skill set. All would be necessary to assist in the locations of sheep bands so State employees could do their jobs. Even though the project would last only 3 days, the \$850,000 federal grant monies would be consumed.

Being selected to represent California Bowmen Hunters, I was lucky enough to join the ARIZONA Fish and Game team. I was sooo Joshua Trees. Out came the spot scope and: Voila'! - oh, drat; burros!

and one ram. The collar on the left is epoxy filled for rams to compensate for their head butting. collars are plastic reinforced with fiberglass webbing. Once activated a signal is sent out every 30 minutes to a machine which collects information on all animals, then prints it out every twelve hours. If for some reason no movement is detected during a six hour period a "mortality" signal is enacted which emits an alert to officials. These transmission devices have a longevity of three years and are roughly \$1,600 apiece.



and 6 ewes had been "equipped". That night the breeze increased to a wind and by morning gale winds peaking at 45 mph were registered. No "birds" would be placed in the air - nor a tripod stable until the following day. Teams prevailed over the elements on the day which followed. Reported sheep sightings were maintained under the watchful eye of overhead spotter planes until the helicopter crews could arrive.


The chopper carried the most integral part of the operation. Of course the pilot and then two "net gunners". Once the chopper was on the sheep the first "net gunner" would fire their net from the 10" square cannon nozzle.

Continued from page 9 -The helicopter would bank sharply and align on another sheep of the same band and the second "gunner" would net their prev.



Quickly thereafter each gunner was on the ground and immediately "muzzled" (blindfold over the eyes) the sheep. Next blood was drawn, ear tag affixed and a radio collar attached before releasing the sheep (in less than five minutes).



All efforts were successful and our group concluded events safely and early with the anticipated 26 sheep of which 15 were ewes and 11 males. Two of The males were Class IV rams which means they were between six and seven years old. As an added bonus, 7 mule deer were also ear tagged, collared and tested. The results of any diseases will be conclusive in about a week. Giving back to our hunting community can be done quite easily and it is so rewarding to get involved. My concluding remark; I love the desert; for very short periods of time - but nothing like the way I thrive in the alpine mountains; above 10,000 - now that brother; is liv'n!

Hall of Fame Inductee 2-26-2022

To Darick, archery was a part of his family life as long as he can remember. Darick harvested his first big game animal, a javelina, at the age of 12. He was on a hunt with his dad in Arizona. At the age of 13, he hunted Catalina Island. He was able to harvest 3 goats and an island hog.

At the age of 15, he harvested his first Pacific Hybrid Deer, a doe. He decided he needed to join the workforce to make money, to hunt more! He then made 2 trips to Santa Cruz Island where he harvested 2 Moreno Sheep and 2 hogs.

Darick has been a member of CBH/SAA since the age of 13. In 2011, he became a regular member and Life Member of the CBH/SAA Big Game Club with 4 species of



Darick Roney Continued from page 10- big game and 2 made the book. In 2013, he became a Senior Member of BGC with 14 species and 9 making the book, was a BGC Record Book Committee Member (2 yrs). He has also been on the BGC Committee for 4 years, Small Game Committee Member for 2 years, a chaperone for the CBH/SAA Big Game Club Youth Small Game Hunt for 2 years and a chaperone for the BGC Broadhead for 2 years.

Darick holds a Lifetime Hunting and Fishing License in California. He is a staff shooter for Riverside Archery Shop, Prime Bows and Victory Archery.

Darick's other hunting successes include:

1 buck antelope, making CBH/SAA BGC Record Book and Pope & Young Record Book

28 buck deer, 3 bears, 2 elk (1 Bull American & 1 cow Tule) with the American making P & Y Record Book, 5 Santa Cruz Island Merino Sheep with one ranking at #5 in BGC Record Book. Also, 3 Catalina Island goats, 3 Island Hogs, 5 turkeys, 5 bobcats, 30+ Mainland hogs and 25 coyotes.

In the CBH/SAA Big Game Record Book, he has 73 California Big Game animal entries, 14 different Big Game species taken in CA (only 16 legal big game species in CA) with 9 Big Game species meeting or exceeding the minimum entry into the BGC Record Book. In 2011 and 2015, he received the "E" Category Whitney Hill Award. In 2011, 2013 & 2015 he received the CBH/SAA Big Game Club Deer Slam Award. He is the only CBH/SAA member that has received 3 Deer Slam Awards. He is the only CBH/SAA member that has taken a record book buck in all 3 species of deer in CA, in one 2 year scoring period.

In 2013 and 2015, he received the Big Game Bowhunter of the Year Award. Other successes; 2012- received the Golden Eagle Award for taking 35 different CA small

game species

2014- received the Double Golden Eagle Award for taking another 15 species, total of 50

2016- received the Triple Golden Eagle Award for taking another 25 species, total of 75

From 2012 to 2015, many 1st place for the largest tilapia taken at the Tilapia shoot. He has 16 record book Tilapia and 12 record book Carp.

Darick had accomplished many State Broadhead, State Field, State Indoor tournaments at an early age and competed at the World Championships at the age of 13.



Pam Severtson

Hall of Fame Inductee 2-26-2022

Pam was introduced to archery at Straight Arrow Bow Hunters in 1988. It wasn't until the mid 90's that she became competitive.

She and her husband, Matt, would travel to the many California archery shoots from south of Fresno, west to Pacifica Archers and Humboldt Archers and east to Nevada County Sportsmen's. They would also travel out of state to Oregon, for the Oregon Safari.

Pam competed at the CBH/SAA State level starting in 1997. This would include Adult & Senior classes and in Bowhunter Freestyle, Pro Freestyle and Adult Freestyle.

Theodore Roosevelt 26th President of the United States (1901-1909) is one of my favorite presidents and as you read along you will know why.

In December of 1897, before he was president, Roosevelt hosted dinner party in New York City with several of his prominent and influential friends. He was "preaching to the choir" as he conveyed his deep concern for the massive deterioration of the wild game because those present were avid sportsman. During the previous ten years, they had witnessed the slaughter of some 60 million bison and what would become the complete annihilation of the passenger pigeon. Each knew all too well that the popularity of market hunting and the absence of game restrictions would combine to cause continued depletion of the remaining wildlife populations, many at the point of extinction.


That evening marked the founding of the Boone and Crockett club. The mission of the club's membership was to do all in their individual and combine powers to stem the tide of this uncontrolled destruction and convince the nation's leadership that "fair chase sport hunting" was not only an ethical pursuit but a sound game management tool.

Theodore Roosevelt, as president, also established the United States forest service, five national parks, fifty-one bird reserves, four game preserves, and 150 national forests. The area of the United States that he placed under public protection totaled approximately 230,000,000 acres.

Roosevelt became the most prolific conservator of natural resources in the American history. The conservation legislation enacted in the early 1900s, ended the decline of the large mammal population.

Theodore Roosevelt was the founder of many conservation projects to protect the decline of mammal populations where the basis of rules and laws for the public and our hunters of today.

The Boon And Crockett Club, the movement and its leaders must have had the intestinal fortitude to persist through the months or even years of and inevitable setbacks, consistent frustrations and possible public ridicule. Such commitment can only come from the heart!





CBH/SAA State Broadhead Championship Tournament General Working Mechanics

- This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter as opposed to the tournament archer. It is designed to offer the hunter some benefits without his/her becoming entangled in the aspects of a Field tournament. NFAA rules do not apply to this event
- The State Broadhead Tournament shall be either a one or two day event held on Memorial Day weekend.
- The 2rd Vice President of Hunting or his delegate shall govern this tournament.
- The range for this event shall be laid out in such a manner as to simulate hunting conditions when possible.
- Archers shall use hunting tackle for this event which is in keeping with California State Fish & Game Laws on Big Game Hunting.

A. Scoring:

- Vital 10 Kill 8 Wound 5
- An arrow must be in the target to score, except a "Pass-through" which must be witnessed and scored as witnessed by other shooters in the group.
- "Bounce-ins and "Glance-offs" shall not score.
- "Antiers" do not score.
- Shaft of arrow must touch the line for higher score.
- Double scoring is required.
- This shall be a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.

B. Divisions and Styles of Shooting:

- 1) Divisions
 - a) Seniors (65+)
 - b) Adult (18-64): Male and Female
 - c) Young Adult (ages 15-17): Male and Female
 - d) Youth (ages 12-14): Male and Female
- 2) Styles
 - a) Sight (S)
 - b) Non-Sight (NS)
 - c) Release (R)
 - d) Recurve (Rc)
 - e) Traditional (T)

C. Awards:

- CBH/SAA Membership (Regular or Associate) is required to compete for awards.
- Guest Class is one class (Male and Female combined) and there will be no awards.
- No awards will be mailed.
- 4) Cubs and PeeWees Participation Award Only

D. Tackle:

- One stabilizer not over 12 inches, allowed. A Quivalizer is not considered a stabilizer
- Bow quivers are allowed in all styles.
- No magnifying scopes are allowed.
- No compound bows over 80 pounds peak draw weight. Recurves and longbows have no limit
- Binoculars are allowed No range finding binoculars allowed even with the battery removed NO RANGE FINDERS Period!
- Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish & Game Codes at all times during the shoot – expandable broadheads are allowed if they meet Ca. Fish & Game Codes.

- Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish & Game Codes (7/8" minimum diameter)
- Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
- All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
- Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
- Longbows: Any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
- 12) Longbows: Must be shot off the shelf
- Clickers allowed in all styles.

E. Miscellaneous:

- Cubs and Peewees will shoot field points only
- Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
- All protests to the Protest Committee must be in writing within thirty (30) minutes of the end of the tournament each day and include a \$25.00 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
- There must be a minimum of three shooters per target at all times.
- Top shooters from each style will be grouped on the 2nd day of the tournament. Cubs and Peewees will not be allowed to shoot in top flight groups. NO EXCEPTIONS
- No target or sight notes allowed (sight tapes ok)
- No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will not be assisted.
- No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours – except for tournament officials.
- Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
- 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
- NO cell phones, computers or any other electronic devices allowed on the range or bow.
- Tournament officals will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualification.
