Legislative Team Update

Greetings CBH/SAA friends and family!

It was great to see many of you at the CBH/SAA Annual Meeting and Big Game Banquet on February 24-26! The Legislative Team and Bill Gaines kicked off the Friday Legislative session with a recap of 2022 and a summary of what we can expect in the coming year. Notably, there are over 50 firearm related bills, many of which affect hunters, sportsmen, and sportswomen.

We are also making another run at redefining the eligibility age for junior hunters – we helped bring this bill right up to the finish line last year but fell just short! We are feeling hopeful that this year will bring better results.

Regarding items in front of the California Fish and Game Commission, we need your feedback on a couple items...

First, if you or someone you know hunts on Los Banos WA (archery or otherwise) or have any information on the history of archery and hunting at this property, please contact us at CBHLegTeam@gmail.com. WE **NEED YOUR HELP!**

In the last couple newsletters, I reported that the Legislative Team was following up CDFW's proposed ban on archery at the Los Banos State Wildlife Area (WA). Following our public testimony at the Wildlife Resource Committee Meeting, we met with CDFW staff briefly to elaborate on our concerns and to hear feedback from CDFW on our prior testimony. Well, long story short, the records dating back for at least the last 10 years show no regulation changes related to archery at Los Banos WA. CDFW and CBH/SAA want to know:

1)When was archery added to the regulations in Los Banos WA?

Why was archery added to the regulations regarding Los Banos WA?

3)Was archery previously permitted in other Type A WAs? Which other Type A WAs? Why is archery no longer permitted in these other Type A WAs?

Second, who wants some more California archery elk tags? Did you know, according to CDFW, there are only ~25 archery only elk tags and only 5 archery hunts in California?! This year, CDFW is proposing ~50 new elk tags, modifications to current elk zones and a new Tehachapi elk hunt zone. The primary drivers for these

new tags and hunt zones include 1) limiting potential hybridization between endemic Tule Elk herds and introduced Rocky Mountain Elk herds and 2) reducing human/elk conflicts that have reached intolerable levels. All of the new tags are "general" tags, because CDFW views firearm hunting as the most efficient/reliable means of take to meet the specified goals. While hunters can hunt these tags with archery equipment, we are hard pressed to complete with firearm hunters in the same areas at the same time.

CBH/SAA strongly believes that additional hunting opportunities should be opened to bowhunters seeking the unique experience of hunting during the rut. If archery is a less efficient/reliable means of take, then additional archery elk tags should be issued to meet objectives! In recent conversation with CDFW, staff is receptive to the idea of additional archery tags or general tags with an archery validation, but their current focus is on establishing these new hunts and hunt zones, and measuring hunter efficiency. If you have insight/ideas on how to balance CDFW herd objectives and creatively increase hunting opportunities for bowhunters, we'd love to hear from you. Increasing archery elk hunt opportunities in California will be a primary focus of the CBH/SAA Legislative Team this year and into the future. Continued on page 14

How do we? Sometimes it feels like it's increasingly a struggle to practice the things we love the way we want to do it. The same can feel true with archery.

I think part of the answer lies with the kids. Whether the bow they love has cams, lets them string walk, or is a stickbow, they should be able to compete in that bow style at all competitions. Sure there might be times when they are the only ones competing in their category, but wouldn't it be worth it if it gets them hooked for life? Or, if they choose not to pick up a bow one day, still be an ally for it?

California has a history of having her archers chosen to compete on the US team whether it's through NFAA or USA Archery. Some California archers in recent memory with this designation are Paige Pearce, Heather Gore, Pat Norris, Sandy McCain, Alan Eagleton, Karen Keating, Kelly Eagleton, Laney Bisbee, Mark Applebee, Eric Schwartz, Bruce Siegel, Mike Pierce, Julie Robinson, Stephanie Correa, Daniel Stafford, Holly Hawk, and myself.

How can we help support the US to keep submitting the strongest team possible? I think part of that lies in offering the bow styles that are seen in international competition.

I have been working with CA State NFAA Director, Gary McCain, and have prepared amendments to NFAA's By-Laws to make the following changes:

- Add all amateur NFAA age divisions to Freestyle Limited (this would add under 18)
- Add all amateur NFAA age divisions to Barebow Recurve (this would add under 18 and 60+)

- Add all amateur NFAA age divisions to Traditional (this would add under 18)
- Add all amateur NFAA age divisions to Longbow (this would add under 18 and 50+)
- Add the bowstyle of Bowhunter Freestyle Limited, as defined by the IFAA, with all amateur NFAA age divisions
- Add the bowstyle of Traditional Recurve, as defined by the IFAA, with all amateur NFAA age divisions
- Add the bowstyle of Historic Bow, as defined by the IFAA, with all amateur NFAA age divisions



The Ben Pearson Story By James H. Faulkner 1964 -Part 2

Part I - March 2023 Newsletter

This story is a continuation from the March edition of the CBH/SSA Newsletter and originally from *The Ben Pearson Story* By James H. Faulkner, what was an Excerpt from Archery Magazine (1964) As it continues...

Through the years, the company has demonstrated its ability to diversify in production and manufacture other products - some of them totally unrelated to archery equipment.

In 1949 the company began manufacturing mechanical cotton pickers. This, too, proved highly successful as the Ben Pearson –rust picker, as it is called, and rated, in agricultural circles as the finest of its type in the field today. It is marketed in practically every cotton-producing region in the world.

More recently, the company branched into still another new enterprise. The manufacturing of automatic indoor archery lane equipment an exciting new industry that Pearson believes to offer unlimited

potential. Archery has been good to Pearson, and with success has come the time and financial ability to pursue his favorite pastime - bow hunting.

In the past decade, Pearson has traveled throughout the country in quest of game and he can make the remark, "I've gotten every kind of game I've ever gone after," with a straight face. It's true. Only bear, elk, and moose of the country's greatest game have not been downed by one of his arrows.

Does he have the desire to get an elephant? No Sir. Strangely, it is on this subject that one senses the presence of conflict between man and hunter. Pearson, it turns out, abhors the senseless killing of animals. He does not believe in killing anything that isn't a vicious predatory animal or one that can't be eaten. One can only conclude that stocking and killing vicious animals like the Javelina is this man's way of compensating for an otherwise quiet way of life. It is his business, his hobby, and his outlet.

Pearson now devotes a great deal of time promoting archery by giving shooting demonstrations and showing films.

In the future, Pearson hopes to concentrate more on films for a couple of reasons. First, it calls for more hunting trips (even if there is a cameraman along) and it means he'll be able to show more people more thrills of bowhunting through the medium of television and his company's film library service.

Pearson, who admittedly likes to think he (or "we" as he puts it) has had a lot to do with the popularity of archery, credits more favorable bow-hunting laws (passed by most states in recent years) with having given archery its greatest impetus.

"Most everyone who takes up the pole takes it up with the idea of bow hunting," Pearson explains. "So it's only natural that more favorable bow hunting regulations would open doors to an onrush of bow hunting enthusiasts."

In Pearson's estimation, bow hunting is here to stay in a big way for several reasons:

"bowhunting gives a hunter a chance to lengthen the hunting season since most bow seasons are separate from gun seasons," Pearson begins. "it also gives a hunter the opportunity to satisfy his natural urge to hunt without destroying too much game. And, finally, our modern mass production methods and better techniques make it possible to supply the mass market with better, more accurate archery tackle at lower prices.

To show just how people are reacting to the growing interest in archery, Pearson recalls with pride the last Ben Pearson Open, an annual \$10,000 archery tournament held in April. It was staged in Detroit's spacious and beautiful Cabo Hall this year, and it drew a record 959 entries, 257 more than the '63 meet, which was also held in Detroit. Cont. page 14

I have a submitted this story from yesteryear which my best hunting partner and uncle wrote. In doing so I omitted the parts that gave too much information to keep our "secret spot" sacred. My dear uncle departed this world, November 21, 2022. In this we honor his memory. (RYork)

August 7-20, 1988

My nephew, Rodney and I put in for our deer tags in Nevada, and we were both chosen.

I was chosen for a black powder muzzleloader tag, and Rodney was drawn for bow hunting. So Rodney and I drove 500 miles from our home here in North Fork (the exact center of California) to Ely, Nevada. Then headed to the east for about 60 miles or so. There we spent five days backpacking in the Snake and Schell Ranges to scout for deer. Surely in my 61 years of life, I have never seen so many beautiful deer. From one point I stood and counted 74 deer, 34 were bucks, 7 of those were trophy class bucks. We saw bighorn sheep and antelope and truly enjoyed beautiful country.

On the 10th of August, we moved and started up a canyon in the late afternoon. Before it got dark, I

sat down on a steep hill with brush tickets of wild roses, nettles, and big rocks underneath. Rodney and I pushed through and made camp on the side of the mountain. Our sleeping bags were wrapped around the high side of a quaking aspen tree, so we wouldn't roll down the mountain slope. It wasn't our best night to say the least, the stink ants said they had claimed the tree first. It wasn't too bad until one little varmint got in my ear. At first light on the 11th we were happy to move on up towards the top of the ridge. We filled our canteens at what was to be the last spring and worked for the next eight hours climbing the shaley rocks. It was very steep. I had a 30 pound pack on my back and was in all fours position, crawling up two steps and sliding back three. It all had this old man's pump pounding in full blower.



On top of the world, around 11,000 feet, we looked for a campsite to put up our two-man tent. The ridge was a continuation of rocks anywhere from 6 inches to 2 feet in size.

We finally found a little gully that would give us some protection from the wind that was now building up, along with the black clouds. Here we set up the tent with large rocks holding each peg down. I padded the rocks that were under the tent the best that I could so I wouldn't roll down onto Rodney. The setting sun was dipping in the slim blue gap of the western sky. Continued on page 16

My array of words are inadequate to paint this beauty, known only to God's hands. When I turn to the east in silent reverence, I looked down at the beautiful rainbow in the valley below. I was sorry I hadn't pack my camera up the mountain. It was time to fix my famous sandwich of peanut butter and jelly. Rodney and I were about to finish with our supper of trail food, when we could make out a white animal working its' way up along the ridge towards us. It was getting dark with the thunderheads moving in our direction when the little white matted "dog" finally made it to our camp. He came up to us slow, and cautious. He was a mess, his hair was matted, stomach howling, hollow and his ribs sticking out. It appeared the only thing holding him together, was his stringy backbone. I dug out a slice of bread and gave it to this poor, half white - half dirt, hungry little mountain dog. He gobbled it down in one gulp. I didn't want to feed him too much, and we didn't have much anyhow, only enough for bare needs. Our water was low because of the hard to climb slope, so I put out a tarp to catch hail that was just now starting to blow in. Our little companion lapped up the hail as fast as it gathered. It was all but dark now, and the storm was about to hit us in its' full force.

shelter and climbed in our own tent and zipped up for a long night.

The storm, set in - in its' full force. The winds must have been up to 60 or 70 mph as it rocked our little tent from side to side. The lightning was continuous, with deafening thunder as we were in the middle of a hail storm in the sky. Because of the lightning it was bright as day; we set up in our sleeping bags looking at each other meanwhile wondering if the tent would pass the test as it strained at every seam and cord. I open the flap a little and reached out to make a snowball of hail that was building up at the front of the tent. It helped wash down the good old peanut butter sandwich that had made it only halfway down my dry throat. I flashed a light out to see how the mountain dog was doing; he was now a snow dog as the rain coat roof had blown off, and his rock shelter was filled up with hail. I couldn't go out and help the little guy at this time because if I did, in opening the flap to get out, we would have lost our tent.

I settled down deep in my bag, with my nose sticking out, when Rodney started telling me bedtime stories.

Komo: Alias McCoy from page 16 A hunting friend of his had a friend killed by lightning while bow hunting in a canyon. Here I am looking at one of three metal bands that held up the tent just 3 inches from my nose.

I knew if the lightning went to the ground on these metal bands I would lose the rest of the hair from my bald head. I turn my head away so I wouldn't be blinded if we took a hit. After a couple of hours the hail let up a little and I went out and dug the snow dog out. I put his roof back on with more rocks to hold the raincoat down. I put a dry, dirty T-shirt on the snow dog to help keep him a little warmer. In the morning, at the break of day, we ate and fed the dog a little more before breaking camp. We set out, down the icy, frozen rocks, praying not to slip and wipe out an ankle. We were to meet some friends of Rodney's in Ely at 12 noon. We slid the collar right off the little white dogs' skinny head. The tag on the collar had a phone number and address back in Oklahoma, so we put the collar in our pack and worked our way down the mountain side. We decided to name the snow dog McCoy.

Our small white companion wasn't too impressed with the name and disappeared from our site. We thought he was gone for good and couldn't understand why he left; we were his only ticket off the mountain but he was gone anyhow.





We had his collar and tag, which meant McCoy wouldn't have a chance of finding his owners. About halfway down, McCoy showed up again so we put his collar back on and tied a cord to him the rest of the way down the Mountain.

On the way down we filled up at the spring until we all hurt. We made it to the Subaru, and four wheeled it down the mud creek to the main road; then on to Ely. We stopped off at the sheriffs office on the outskirts of town and asked if they had an animal shelter. They said they did but if no one called for the animal, the animal would be destroyed. I decided to bring McCoy on home with me. McCoy was a neat dog and I would try to get in touch with his owners.

We met Rodney's friends at 12 noon in Ely and he transferred all of his gear over to their rig. I set out for home; 500 miles to the west. Cross country roads are good with little to no traffic, with some long straight runs. I had my tank full of gas and set on the pedal for a home. I thought this would be a good place to stop and walk the dog and myself. I was getting tired after good long hikes, coming off the mountain and two unrestful nights. As I woke up I was cruising at 70+ miles per hour down the middle of the road - - - sideways!

Black smoke and the squeal of all four tires brought McCoy off the floor to a standing position in the front seat. McCoy's eyes were now as big as mine as we were sliding sideways, seemingly for hours, wondering why we weren't rolling. We finally slid back the other way, and headed off the road so I set my brakes and slid off the road; stopping in the soft dirt. I put the Subaru in four-wheel-drive and backed up onto the road and took off for home once more. I made good time as I was now wide awake. I came up through the backside of Yosemite and drop down to my home in North Fork by 8 PM. Thank God we made it, we all made it. I'm sorry we didn't get a picture of McCoy before my wife washed and combed him out. He came out white and eating like a horse.

I called the phone number on McCoy's collar, but the number was not in service. I then sent a letter to the address in hopes that they would forward it. It was now Saturday and I felt great after a good nights' sleep in a nice warm bed.

Five days later my bride was home and received a phone call from Wendy Chitwood of Great Falls, Montana. She stated she had received my letter and she wanted us to fly Komo home. Now we knew our alias McCoy was really Komo. We called him Komo and his ears perked up! We took Komo to Oakhurst to get a health check before he could get on the airplane.

When Komo was checked out, the doctor took porcupine quills out of Komo's jaw; but outside of that the doctor said he was in good shape for being lost so long (I think about three months if I remember correctly). Wendy said they lost Komo at



McGill which would be about 10 miles west as a crow flies.

They had been at the top of 11,000 foot mountain. After a couple of weeks of food and the visit to see the veterinarian, calls were made to the airport. Arrangements were made to fly him home. My wife, Pauline, said as she was taking Komo down to the Fresno airport to fly home (a 50 mile trip) she was telling him that he was on his way home to see Wendy - his ears perked up, and a sparkle of joy overcame his eyes. And that is the story of Komo -Alias McCoy. As for my deer hunt, I never made it; I was laid up for six weeks after an operation and missed my hunt. But there's always next year and more fun - --

So may Komo and all of the family live happily ever after. May Komo stay close to home and take good care of his new grandchild to be. God bless you richly. We had a blessed time to say the least. Glenn and Pauline York

In a large skillet cook a little over a pound of small venison chunks with a little water and then add 1) chopped onion, 8) garlic cloves and 1) bell pepper - - Cook thoroughly. (*Drain*) Place in a huge pot and add the above ingredients bringing it to a boil. Reduce to low heat and allow it to simmer until served. I also add 4 more garlic cloves, 2 tablespoons of chili powder, 1 tablespoon of cumin, 1 tablespoon of crushed red pepper and 1/2 teaspoon of liquid smoke. Enjoy - we do!





CBH/SAA State Broadhead Championship Tournament General Working Mechanics

- 1. This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter as opposed to the tournament archer. It is designed to offer the hunter some benefits without his/her becoming entangled in the aspects of a Field tournament. NFAA rules do not apply to this event
- 2. The State Broadhead Tournament shall be a one or two day event held on Memorial Day weekend.
- 3. The 2nd Vice President of Hunting or his delegate shall govern this tournament
- 4. The range for this event shall be laid in such a manner as to simulate hunting conditions when possible.
- 5. Archers shall use hunting tackle for this event which is keeping with California State Fish & Game Laws on Big Game Hunting.
 - A. Scoring:
 - 1) Vital—10 Kill-8 Wound-5
 - An arrow must be in the target to score, except a "pass-through" which must be witnessed and scored a witnessed by other shooters in the group.
 - 3) "Bounce-ins and Glance-offs" shall not score.
 - 4) "Antlers" do not score.
 - 5) Shaft of arrow mut touch the line for higher score.
 - 6) Double scoring is required.
 - 7) This shall be a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.
 - B. Divisions and Styles of Shooting:
 - 1) Divisions
 - a) Seniors (65+)
 - b) Adult (18-64): Male and Female
 - c) Young Adult (15-17): Male and Fe-
 - male d) Youth (12-14): Male and Female
 - d) Youth (2) Styles:
 - a) Sight Fingers (SF)
 - b) Non-Sight (NS)
 - c) Release ®
 - d) Recurve (RC)
 - e) Longbow (L)
 - C. Awards:
 - 1) CBH/SAA Membership (Regular or Associate) is required to compete for awards.
 - 2) Guest Class is one Class (Male and Female combined) and there will be no awards.
 - 3) No awards will be mailed.
 - 4) Cubs and Peewees Participation Awards Only
 - D. Tackle
 - 1) No Mechanical Broadheads
 - Only ONE "izer" whether it be stabilizer, equalizer, side bar or any such weighed balance with a total protrusion from the bow not to exceed 12 inches.
 - 3) Bow Quivers are allowed in all styles.
 - 4) No magnifying scopes are allowed.
 - 5) No compound over 80 pounds peak draw weight. Recurves and longbows have no weight limit.
 - Binoculars are allowed. No rang finding binoculars allowed even with the battery removed. NO RANGEFINDERS , Period!

- 7) Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish & Game Codes at all times during the shoot—No Mechanical/ Expandable Blades period!
- Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish & Game Codes (7/8 minimum diameter
- 9) Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
- 10) All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
- 11) Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
- 12) Longbows: any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
- 13) Longbows: must be shot off the shelf
- 14) Clickers allowed in all styles.
- E. Miscellaneous:
 - 1) Cubs and Peewees will shoot field points only
 - 2) Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
 - All protests to the Protest Committee will be in writing within thirty (20) minutes of the end of the tournament each day an include a \$25 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
 - 4) There must be a minimum of three shooters per target at all times.
 - 5) Top shooters from each style will be grouped on the 2nd day of the tournament. Clubs and Peewees will not be allowed to shoot in top flight groups. NO EXCEPTIONS
 - 6) No target or sight notes allowed (sight tapes ok)
 - No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will be assisted.
 - No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours except for tournament officials
 - Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
 - 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
 - 11) No cell phone, computers or any other electronic devices allowed on the range or bow.
 - 12) Tournament officials will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
 - 13) Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualifications.




