I just spent 2 long days at the California Fish and Game meetings in Ventura California. Just a quick update. It looks like they are going to continue the abalone moratorium for now and continue to monitor for an opportunity to open a

season. They upped the urchin harvest so for those of you that dive on the side there is hope. For anyone that farms in the Central Valley I would say look out. The tricolor blackbird is now protected along with nesting habitat. Being from Oranco, I can tell you what happens when protected birds start nesting on your property. #PAININTHEASS! A big thanks to Bill Gaines of Gaines and associates and Wayne Raupe for speaking about the fire arm carry issue during bow season. Its on the list of items for discussion at the next meeting. Robert will fill you in with details in his article. Duck Hunters rejoice!! We are back to 2 Pintails! The extended Goose season up north will also be set up to include all hunters in the early part of the season rather than just private land owners late season. It looks like Pig Hunting will now just require a validation stamp and land owners will now be able to rid their land of the invasive species without a depredation tag. Nice adjustment by the state. The predator policy is a bit of a letdown, but I will let Robert explain in more detail. Another big thanks to Gaines on the raffle gun bill. It looks like that Assembly bill will be allowed to die in suspense. For those of you who are wondering, there was a California Assembly bill written and submitted that would outlaw all raffles involving any type of firearm. This was in response to a fire department in Northern California raffling an AR-15 for charity just 2 days after the Parkland, Florida School shooting. While the raffle may have been ill-timed, I think the reaction was knee jerk and would have had little effect on anything except to deny law abiding citizens and non-profit groups the ability to make some money. Anyone who has been to a CWA, DU banquet or Hunter Education conference recently, I can tell you without the firearm raffles there would be very little money collected and very little reason to go! Outside of that, please read Robert's always informative legislative update.

In closing I want to take a moment to thank a very important member of the CBH/SAA board and wish him well in retirement. I received a call from Rusty Mills and after the usual banter about our wonderful state he announced to me his intention to retire from the board of CBH/SAA. Rusty has been an invaluable member of the board and has done an outstanding job running the State Target championships over the years. ## Legislative Information

A California Fish and Game Commission meeting (CFG) was held April 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> in Ventura. Agenda items of interest 22, Public forum for items not on agenda, 25, Wildlife Resources Committee (A) Work plan development I. Update on work plan and draft timeline II. Discuss and approve new topics, no new topics and the next meeting was cancelled. 26. Authorize publication of notice of intent to add regulations concerning sage grouse preferential points and draw (Add Section 716; amend subsections 300(a)(1)(D) and (a)(1)(F) and Section 702; Title 14, CCR) 27. Discuss proposed changes to resident upland game bird hunting regulations (Subsection 300(a)(1)(D)4., Title 14, CCR) Sage grouse permits available at 0 this year 28. Adopt proposed changes to waterfowl hunting regulations (Section 502, Title 14, CCR), check regulation for complete information 32. Discuss and approve terrestrial predator policy, much discussion on the word “humane” being included. Adoption included the word and a sentence was added at the end mentioning overall options. “Recreational Take” was included in the last sentence. 33. Non-marine items of interest from previous meetings (A) Department update on trapping license fees analysis (Petition #2015-009), denied, referred to current fee schedule 34. Non-marine petitions for regulation change from previous meetings (A) Action on petitions for regulation change – None scheduled at this time (B) Action on pending regulation petitions referred to staff and the Department for Review I. Petition #2015-008: Repeal hunting of American badger and gray fox moved for discussion to June meeting II. Petition #2017-001: Allow firearm possession while archery hunting, this petition has been with DFW for a year and was submitted by a CRPA lawyer. I was consulted initially before they presented to the Commission for consideration. In our present times, personal safety should be considered; additionally it may have violated other laws and regulations. 35. Non-marine, non-regulatory requests from previous meetings (A) Action on non-regulatory requests (B) Action on pending non-regulatory requests referred to staff and the Department for review 36. Department informational items (non-marine) (A) Director’s report (B) Wildlife and Fisheries Division, and Ecosystem Conservation Division, the Nutria Rodent presence in the San Joaquin Valley, nightmare for wetlands conservation. 37. Other informational items (A) Staff report (B) Legislative update and possible action I. Discuss Proposition 68, the California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018 (on the June 2018 ballot) 38. Discuss and act on Commission administrative items (A) Next meeting – June 20-21, 2018 in Sacramento (B) Rulemaking timetable updates (C) New business 39. Strategic Planning (A) Process update (B) Review mission and vision statements. Next FGC meeting will be June 20 & 21 in Sacramento

Wildlife Resources Committee meeting is scheduled for Thursday May 17<sup>th</sup> in Los Alamitos. No agenda has been posted for this meeting at this time. **Update**, meeting has been cancelled.

The State Legislature are using a tactic called gut and amend to spot bills that just hold a position in the process.

**AB 3** (Bonta) – Firearms: Age Restrictions would prohibit the sale or transfer of any firearm by a licensed dealer to any person under 21 years of age and raise the legal age to purchase any ammunition to 21 years of age. Under existing law, a person must be 18 years of age to purchase a long-gun and/or long-gun ammunition and must be 21 years of age to purchase a handgun or handgun ammunition. This section “27510: No A person licensed under Sections 26700 to 26915, inclusive, shall not sell, supply, deliver, or give possession or control of a firearm to any person under the age of 21 years, or any other firearm to a person under the age of 21 years of age”. *Hunting and shooting training under this provision to minors would now be against the law as currently written.* Continued on page 8

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# Alpine Muleys

Our adventure started twenty-three years ago when I bought an over the counter general tag for zone x9b, after researching and finding out this was a promising area for big alpine muley's. At the time I was new to hunting this area and was not successful. Within a couple of years the zone became a premium hunt, I wasn't able to draw a tag after trying several times and I gave up. So, it was always in the back of my mind to hunt this area again. In 2013 I met Jerry Maytum, a professional guide and seasoned archer, at the Oranco Archery Range, who told me I would have better odds being drawn for archery than a rifle hunt. Being new to Archery I needed to hone my skills and gain the experience and savvy to plan an effective hunt. In 2017 my hunting partner, Mark Houston, and I applied for our tags and to our surprise, we were drawn. This would fulfill my dream of hunting quality muley's in California, and both of us had high hopes for success!

In late July we talked with Jason Duysings, a friend from Oranco, who gave us insight into the location we planned to hunt. We spent three days scouting the area, the first two with little success, thousands of mosquito bites, and sore feet! But on the last day we scouted a new area at higher elevation with everything needed to sustain big bucks. At the end of the day as we were pulling out to head home, we struck pay dirt! In the final hour we stopped at the last canyon for a quick look and as we got out of our vehicle I saw movement and started glassing, a nice bachelor group of bucks that were skylining the ridge. I grabbed my spotting scope and tripod to set up for a closer look. A huge 4x4, two 3x3's, a 2x3, two forky's and a spike! All well fed and big-bodied. We finally found the bucks we were looking for. Now we had to get off the mountain, a huge dark cloud was moving in from the west, so we hightailed it down before the steep 4x4 road became muddy and slick. Our scouting trip was a success and we couldn't wait to head back in three weeks!

A couple days before the opener we pulled in and set up camp. Finally we were ready with 8 days to fill our tags. The morning before the hunt I woke up and nature called. As I walked out of camp, I saw movement on the mountain side.

Until day three of the hunt. While taking a lunch break we watched the opposite canyon slope, a 2x2 with a turned down club tine appeared from the bushes. As Mark and I discussed how unique the 2x2 was, another buck followed the first out. It was a tall 3x3 worth pursuing. They started feeding on the lush green slope. After some time, we realized they weren't going anywhere and would be feeding for a while. I decided to put the stalk on them and took cover at the base of the canyon under a patch of trees. I got as close as possible about 205 yds, and waited. They started down a draw and headed directly for the patch of trees I was in. At this time I could only see the 2x2 and couldn't locate the 3x3. Suddenly, I saw the velvet of his antlers four yards away, through the branches of small Juniper I was behind. He knew something was up and was trying to wind me. I was pinned down, and before I could react they took off. Later we found them bedded, but darkness overtook us before we could move on them. Our day was done.



The next morning we headed out of camp and glassed the same area, where we spotted a group of nine feeding along the ridge. Through the scope we saw four of them were bucks, so we decided to get closer. I hiked up the canyon wall and Mark went back to camp to get the truck and meet me at the top. I kept my eye on the bucks and put them to bed. Meanwhile, Mark had brought the truck to the top of the mountain and parked out of earshot. He hiked his way up to meet me, and we planned our stalk. I told him the bucks had split from the doe's. However, when Mark grabbed his bow out of the case from

the back of the truck, the fall away rest had rattled loose, spinning on the riser. He was worried about its placement when he tightened it. As we talked, two more bucks came into view and made their way to a bedding area about 170 yds to our right. They were the same pair we had encountered the day before, the tall 3x3 and the 2x2 with the downturn club. I asked him if he wanted to try and put the stock on the 4 bucks 200 yds off to the left of us even though it was over loose shale rock. He was ready for the challenge. Again we split up.

Mark stalked the group on the left and I followed the 3x3 and 2x2 to the right. Mark's bucks were bedded down in front of some junipers facing the wind on the base of a hill.

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I watched him take his time and get to a spot within 40 yds above the group. As he was setting up, the largest buck a 2x2 stood suddenly. He had spotted Mark. The group got nervous, then the buck stepped out from behind a small Juniper tree for a look, standing broadside. Mark drew back and released. The arrow flew just beneath the chest of the buck. Then they were gone. That loose rest cost Mark his buck.

I was waiting for my buck to get up from the juniper tree and finally they stepped out and started to walk away. I closed the distance with the wind gusting in my face. Eventually, the 3x3 stopped and I ranged him at 69 yds, that's when he turned and looked in my direction. I decided to take a shot instead of losing my chance. I took careful aim as the buck was slightly quartered away and as I released a heavy gust of wind pushed my bow arm. My arrow connected but I didn't know where. The buck took off running for about 30 yds then bedding up under a juniper. The 2x2 was trying to rouse him to run. I started to knock another arrow, but he stood and the two took off. I started tracking and blood trailing after them, and spotting them three more times before losing them about 2 miles down the other side of the mountain, never getting another chance to shoot. I was frustrated not knowing what had happened to that wounded buck.



Two days later we spotted eleven deer feeding in the distance by the side of a small hill a mile and half away. We decided to get a closer look at them and see if there were any decent bucks in the herd. We stalked to within a 102 yards over loose shale rocks to a small juniper tree, the only cover on the side of the hill. That's when I saw the buck I had wounded 2 days before, feeding with the herd. I was relieved that he survived, and would have another chance to harvest him. We couldn't get any closer, so we put our bows down and rested while keeping a low profile as the herd slowly fed towards us. In the distance, about 600 yards across the grassy field, three more buck were making their way across the base of a hill heading off to the left. We felt like we were in Buck Heaven! And that's when we saw it, a large coyote 300 yds out in a full-on sprint coming right at us! At about 50 yds out he almost flipped over putting the brakes on and veered to our right, then was out of our site behind the Juniper tree. Within seconds we could hear the sound of hooves coming towards us, and as we turn to see the herd with-in 30 yds above us on the hill racing past while reaching for our bows. And they were gone! That dang coyote spooked them! Now we're starting to feel like the only luck we're gonna have, is the bad kind!

That evening as we were heading back to camp to get some hot grub and a good night sleep, there was a hollow feeling in both our guts. It wasn't just hunger, in the back of our minds we knew time was running out. Sleeping became a chore, the days of missed chances kept stacking up and playing out in my mind like an old record player on replay. Would we get any more chances? Finally, I drifted off.

Luckily the next day we found the same herd of eleven again in another canyon. We watched them till they bedded from about 800 yards. After about an hour we decided they would be there for the day and that it was time to put the stalk on. I hiked one mile from the mouth

of the canyon circling behind them staying down wind. The group had spotted me and moved on leaving my buck still bedded in the trees. After locating him I put everything except my range finder and bow down, then crab crawled over 100 yds closer and ranged him at 56 yds. I set my range finder down, stood to shoot, but I figured I could get a little closer because his vision

was blocked by the trunk of a tree. I slowly stocked in a few more yds, then again, and again. I became worried about being seen. That's when I realized I'd left my range finder behind. Guessing about 45 yds I quickly took a shot, but it sailed over him. I was actually 40 yards away. The buck jumped up and stared me down. I slowly knock a second arrow, drew but his vitals were covered by branches and waited for him to turn. As I held my bow at full draw my arm relaxed triggering my release, the arrow sailed into a rock behind the buck. This made him jump quartering away to look for the sound behind him. I had a third chance and couldn't waste it! I knocked, kneeled, drew back, and shot. The arrow struck behind his rib cage and stuck out through his neck. The buck burst through the trees running down the hill and after about 90 yds it tumbled and piled up. The game was over.

After 6 days of a roller coaster hunt, the buck I had wounded was down. I was absolutely ecstatic, as the weight left my shoulders I felt as if I could breathe again. Now we needed another buck for Mark. We spent the next few day glassing the country and found a nice 3x3 buck, but he escaped through the wood's and Mark didn't get a chance to shoot him. This was the end of our hunt for Alpine Muleys, but certainly would not be the last...

This past weekend, April 14th & 15th 2018, I participated in the Rinehart R100 'Break the Barriers.' Archery tournament in Friant, CA. Friant is small town about 19 miles east of Fresno, CA. The shoot was held on a private piece of property and is some of the most beautiful land you'll ever behold. Rolling hills, green grass, large boulders, streams, and ancient Oaks. The shoot was in support of several charities and is extremely unique. The targets for the competition are manufactured by 'Rinehart' and those of us who have been shooting 3-D's for a while appreciate these target because of there realism and the fact that they are very durable and make pulling your arrows a dream, even those shot from high poundage bows. These targets can be very expensive to purchase up into the thousands of dollars for some of the larger, life size animals.

This tournament was shot over two days and there were two shooting courses. The African Range and the North American Range. As their name implies the animals are, more or less, representative of the critters you'd see on those two continents, notice I said, more or less, representative. I don't believe either continent still has dinosaurs, but never the less they're fun to wack. Each range has fifty targets and none of the targets are duplicates, or so I am told, I didn't notice any.

**AB 3199**, Holden (D/41-Pasadena) that would prohibit the use of firearms (except for antiques) as a prize in raffles conducted by private nonprofit organizations. AB 3199 was amended April 5th, 2018. **Update**, rumor is the author will hold the bill in the Assembly Rules Committee ultimately missing a deadline and effectively killing the bill. **AB 2151** (Gray) – Hunting: Antelope, Elk, Bear, and Bighorn Ram Tags: Resident Apprentice Tag would reduce the fee for a resident apprentice (youth) antelope, elk, bear, and bighorn sheep tag to \$20. The bill would also prohibit any future adjustment of those fees. AB 2151 would not make any changes to the cost of an apprentice deer tag. AB 2151 is now on the Assembly Floor for discussion and vote. **AB 2670** (Kiley) – Fish and Wildlife: Natural Community Conservation Planning Act would require the Director of the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) to designate two days per year as "Free Hunting Days" - with one free hunting day in the fall hunting season, and the other free hunting day during the spring hunting season. AB 2670 would not allow unlicensed hunters participating in free hunting days to take any species that requires a draw or lottery to obtain a tag, bill is in assembly appropriations committee. **AB 2805** (Bigelow) – Depredation: Wild Pigs, AB 2805 is Assembly Member Frank Bigelow's (R/05-O'Neals) latest effort to craft a bill which facilitates the ability of landowners to control wild exotic pigs and the extensive damage they do to public and private lands. After a few recent previous attempts to pass similar legislation, Assembly Member Bigelow jump started this effort roughly a year ago by reaching out to the Fish and Game Commission with the request that they work with DFW and interested stakeholders to pull together some recommended bill language. After months of effort, the suggested language was approved by the Commission and forwarded to Assembly Member Bigelow for his consideration late last year, in appropriations committee. **SB 1311** (Berryhill) – Fishing and Hunting: Annual Sportsman's Licenses– legislation by Senator Tom Berryhill (R/08-Modesto) – would create annual sportsman's license that provides the same privileges as annual hunting and fishing licenses, but that is valid for a term of one year from July 1st to June 30th. SB 1311 would limit the issuance of these licenses to California residents. SB 1311, as introduced, does not call out the cost of the annual sportsman's license. However, the bill will be amended in the near future to call out a fee which will offer California's outdoorsmen and women a reasonable cost savings over the cost of buying an annual hunting and fishing license separately, bill currently in Senate Appropriations Committee.

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The shoot is broken down into different categories as are most tournaments. Male/female, age, and type of equipment you are shooting. I shoot a long bow and therefore competed in the traditional class. Usually the traditional class means that it's long bows and recurve bows competing in the same class. Not here, here they included compound bows without sights or stabilizers as traditional. That's kind of like a modern rifle competing against a flintlock, but it's their game, so I just shook my head and enjoyed the shoot. There were about 700 shooters in attendance so there was sometimes a wait to shoot the next target and the terrain may have proven difficult for those not in decent physical condition. We covered about 2.5 miles each day. These shoots are conducted all across the U.S., and as I recall they said there were 17 shoots this year or last. If you get a chance you should give it try, it is truly unique.

# Advanced Bowhunting Clinic 2018

A group of enthusiastic people looking through binoculars and spotting scopes were glassing the open meadow, trees, bushes and a creek. There were 7, well placed 3D targets during this exercise so students could “glass them up”. The obvious strutting tom was a “give me” but the accompanying hen proved allusive for a few. 3 bucks, a pig and bear completed the session and for first time the “little buck right next to you” were found by one person. The group then planned and executed a stalk to one buck considering terrain, wind and other animals. Techniques to get within bow range were discussed, vetted and tried all the while still glassing for the spoiler animal. A blood trail was laid out for the students to track and recover the “buck”.

On the other side of the property another group were in discussions on treestands, Fall Arrest Systems and shot angles. Each student was fitted with a harness and climbed into a ladder stand using the safety system. Shots from standing and sitting in the stand were executed discussing related shot angles through the vitals from an elevated position. Next was ground blinds, several types were available for discussion related to placement, advantage/disadvantage, “roughing in” and use. Each student chose what type of seat to use in the “pop-up” type blind to shoot from taking note not to shoot the blind itself.

When the field exercises were completed the groups met back at Maya Archers clubhouse for an hour question session. Wildlife Officers Mike Pascoe and Ian Bearry discussed DFW laws and regulations and “what if” scenarios.

This was the second year for this specific clinic with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife’s Advanced Hunter Education Program. After completing the class, each student is asked to fill out a survey related to the class. There were 14 students, all adults, 3 women, 4 with less than a year of hunting experience (have rifle hunted), 8 with less than 7 years of hunting experience), 2 never hunted (have been target shooting), 2 just purchased archery equipment (wasn’t fitted correctly), 9 had bow hunted before and 5 had completed the International Bowhunter Education Program class.

Thank you Maya Archers for use of the archery range and clubhouse. The volunteer instructors participating in the clinic include; State IBEP Chairman Johnnie Waddles and Maya’s VP Hunting Chairman Dave Baker running the treestand and ground blind stations, CDFW Officer Mike Pascoe and IBEP Master Instructor Robert Moore running the Spot/Stalk and Recovery stations. CDFW Officer Ian Bearry provided Wildlife Officers perspectives in the field.

## Weatherby is Moving to Wyoming

It's probably the biggest news to come out of this year's SHOT Show so far. Weatherby, long a California-based company, is moving its headquarters to Sheridan, Wyoming. The announcement was made last night at the company's booth, with everyone from the NRA's Chris Cox to the Equality State's governor in attendance.

Ed Weatherby, former president and CEO of Weatherby, kicked off the event with a bit of context for the company's move.

"Back in the late '30s, before my father started the company, he lived in Kansas, and he absolutely hated the weather in Kansas, and he wanted to get out of there," Ed said. "So he kept going west and ended up in California. And he found some really beautiful weather in California. And almost seventy-five years later, the weather's still beautiful in California. But along the way, in seventy-five years, a few other things have changed, and its gotten to the point that we needed to make a change."

"About three years ago, after being in California for seventy years, it was our seventieth anniversary," Adam Weatherby said as he took the mic. "We began a search amongst a number of western states to find a new home for Weatherby."

"I'm honored to be able to carry on a family legacy, but part of a legacy is it means you've got to leave a legacy for the generation to follow, and it was obvious, being in the state we were in, that that legacy wasn't going to be able to continue for as long as we wanted it to, due to a number of reasons."

Weatherby considered a number of states, but in 2017 the company met with Wyoming's governor, Matt Mead, and the Wyoming Business Council in a conference room at that year's SHOT Show. Governor Mead even reportedly gave Adam his personal cell number to use.

"I knew at that moment they were serious," Adam said. "Sure, they have the friendliest tax climate in the U.S., they have the most guns per capital . . . They have endless access to the outdoors, a number of mountain ranges there in Wyoming. Some great tags for hunting, mind you. An incredible workforce, University of Wyoming, and a number of things to offer."

But moving a company, any company, is a major undertaking, much less a gun company with decades spent in a given location. Adam said the company asked Wyoming for help with the move, which Governor Mead agreed to. Last Thursday, the Wyoming State Loan and Investment Board voted unanimously on an incentives package to bring the company there—"an offer we couldn't refuse," Adam said. "This has been a dream of ours for a long time and something that we're very, very excited about," Adam said. "It's going to be a huge change for us, but I think this is good for us, I think it's good for our industry, I think it's good, hopefully, for the state of Wyoming."

Weatherby will leave its current abode in Paso Robles, California, and move nearly 1,400 miles northeast to Sheridan, located near the Wyoming/Montana state line. Architects are already at work on the new headquarters, which will be up and running in 2019. "We are going to be able to grow, expand, come out with products that are otherwise impossible for us to come out with in the state that we've been in for a long time," Adam said. "We're looking to employ a great workforce there in Wyoming and are really excited about that and the opportunities that that's going to bring. And truly I believe as we're looking forward into the next generation, my generation and beyond, I believe that the state of Wyoming is going to be the place where we're going to grow and thrive and flourish."

Governor Mead said having Weatherby relocate to his state not only made sense on an economic level, combining with other gun and

gun-accessory manufacturers already located there, but also on a conservation level, as Weatherby is a proud proponent of the outdoors. He also called the move “a match made in heaven.”

“We want to be, in Wyoming, as I said in my State of the State address last year, not just a firearms state. We want to be the firearms state,” Governor Mead said. “And I cannot think of a better way to make that known to the country and to the world [than] by having this wonderful, wonderful company, Weatherby. “What the Weatherby family’s doing is something uniquely American,” the NRA-ILA’s Executive Director Chris Cox said. “It’s something in our DNA. And what they’re doing is chasing freedom. We’ve been doing that as Americans for almost 250 years—chasing economic freedom, chasing individual freedom. And what they were forced to do on one level is sad; on one level it’s a great celebration for a great state that still recognizes what Franklin Delano Roosevelt called “the great arsenal of our democracy.”

The California National Archery in the Schools Program (CalNASP), hosted by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, has concluded its fourth annual Virtual State Archery Tournament and the students achieved impressive archery scores.

“We would like to congratulate all of the students who participated in this year’s Virtual State Archery Tournament, especially the top boy and girl shooter of the tournament,” said Lesa Johnston, CalNASP coordinator. “These young people are taking on a sport that requires dedication and focus in order to be proficient as a competitor. On the other hand, archery is enjoyed by people of all ages and abilities. It is a very accessible sport.”

Kaden Dewitt, a seventh grader at Excelsior Middle School in Contra Costa County, came in as the top boy shooter and top overall shooter in the state competition with 23 shots achieving the maximum of 10 points computed into his score.

Kally Norvell, an eighth grader from Gracious Trail Academy in San Diego County, is top girl shooter with 14 shots achieving the maximum of 10 points computed into her score. She came in as fifth overall in the state completion.

### **Hall of Fame~Doug Easton**

**Category B - Bowhunters who have shown Excellence in the Design and Manufacturing of Archery Equipment**

**Doug Easton** was born on September 21, 1907 in Oakland, California. He started making wood bows and arrows in 1922. Seven years later he moved to Los Angeles where he made archery equipment in his garage. He developed the four footed cedar shaft in 1931. In 1932 he married Mary Simonich.

Doug helped organize the 1935, 55th NAA National Championships at UCLA. His first son, Jim, was born on July 26th, three days before the competition started.

In 1949, Doug made the 24SRT size #1820 arrow, which was used by Larry Hughes who won the NAA Championships a year later. The first 24SRT-X shafts were developed in 1946 with proprietary heat treat and drawing process.

The 67th and 79th NAA Championships were held at UCLA in 1951 and 1963, respectively. Doug Easton helped in the organization of both events.

In 1958, the XX75 shafts were produced and in 1964 Easton produced the X7 shaft.

After over 12 years of effort by Mrs. Inger Frith, FITA President, archery returned to the Olympics in Munich in 1972. Doug had worked with the NAA on this project, but not able to attend the Olympics. On December 31, 1972 Doug passed away at the age of 65.



### **Hall of Fame John Yount**

**Category C - Bowhunters who have shown literary or organizational excellence.**

His dreams of taking archery beyond the NAA way of tournaments to what John Yount and his friends called "field shooting" over a roving range of targets became reality. And a way many of the archers and bowhunters wanted to better perfect their bowhunting skills and a way of shooting targets at an unknown distance. Its acceptance as a nationally known organization spread throughout the United States and is now one of the largest organizations of archers and bowhunters in the world, know as the National Field Archers Association (the NFAA).

This was all accomplished through the 1940s when many others felt the same way as John, and knew there had to be a better way than the NAA way of just shooting targets at known distances and in a park-like atmosphere.


