President's Message by Wayne Raupe

By the time you read this your Regional Delegates will have descended upon Visalia for the Mid-Year President's Meeting. We will have discussed many topics of importance to CBH/SAA as well as to NFAA. Your discussions with your club officers and the subsequent discussions your officers had with the Regional Officers will determine just exactly what decisions will be made on the issues up for discussion and vote. We will be discussing some old business like... we need a new President, Vice President and 2nd VP of Hunting. Dang that all sounds familiar... have I said that before? Now that our home has sold, Arizona is looking real good to me. Then we will discuss New Business which includes the NFAA Petitions... I think we will... as I have yet to see them. We will also discuss CBH/SAA's 75th year Anniversary, 2018, and what we will do for it.

I attended the State Broadhead Championship this last weekend at the Oranco Bowmen Archery Range in Chino, CA. The Oranco

club members have been working their butts off for several months preparing for the Broadhead and the State Field Championship Tournament. If you haven't been to their range in the last few months you need to stop by and take a look... and shoot it. You will be very impressed. The CBH/SAA, 2 day, Broadhead Championship 3-D Tournament drew about 175 shooters which is about normal for the last few years. I don't understand why the turnout isn't over 400 shooters. This is the only State Sanctioned Unmarked, 3-D, Broadhead Tournament in We have several Local Club the State. Invitational, Unmarked 3-D, non-broadhead, Tournaments in the state that draw between 400 and 2,500 shooters yet we have trouble exceeding 200 shooters no matter where we have it. The archers have 42, 3-D targets per day to shoot broadheads at which gives them the opportunity to fine tune their bows and broadheads for the upcoming fall hunting seasons. What could we change to get a better turnout? What is keeping

participants from attending the Broadhead? Should there be a trophy for the highest score for women and men in the guest class for those CBH/SAA Members who have moved out of CA? Is it that the Broadhead is geared only toward individuals that are old enough to obtain a California Big Game hunting license? Should the Broadhead be more family friendly in that all age classes can participate but those too young to obtain a Big Game Hunting License, for safety reason, must only shoot field points and not be allowed to pull arrows?

Would this change be good or bad for the Broadhead and would this change be good or bad for promoting archery and for recruiting more young hunters into the fall hunts? If you have thoughts on the Broadhead and have ideas on what we can do to increase the turnout, promote archery and promote bowhunting in California please contact the 2nd VP of hunting and or have your region write a petition to make changes that you think would grow the turnout and this sport. Changes may not or will not occur without your input.

The CBH/SAA State Field Championship is coming up in a little over a week and as of my last update there were only 40 to 50 shooters registered for this two day tournament. History is repeating itself in the failure of this tournament based upon the lack of participation. In the distant past this tournament drew big numbers then it dropped off to a point where there was concern whether the State Field would survive. Knowing we had to do something we went to a multiple site venue. We started with three or four sites then increased the number of sits to ten or so. We had good success in the turnout with these multiple sites and again the State Field was alive and well. The multiple site venue was changed back to a single site based upon individuals wanting to shoot with their competition, on the same day, on the same range, at the same time, in the same weather conditions and etc.

There was much debate on this change but alas the change was made and we have been shooting the single site for a few years and now we are back to a struggling State Field Tournament. January the single site vs multiple site was again brought before the CBH/SAA Officers and the Regional Delegates during the Annual Meeting. Much debate ensued and it was decided, voted on, to have the single site venue this year. We will be discussing the single site vs the multiple site again this next January and I think the only thing that will keep the State Field alive and well, both in turnout and financially supporting itself, is to return to the multi-site venue where shooters all over the state can travel less distance to attend the tournament.

One suggestion is to have one northern, one central and one southern site... a total of three sites. Five sites would be ok with me as this is a big state. However the more sites the more complicated it is to get all of the scores back to the 2nd VP of Field to process and verify in a timely fashion. As far as an individual wanting to shoot with their competition... it will be up to them to find out where their competition is shooting and travel to that venue. (Continued page 5)

TURKEY SUCCESS By Wayne Raupe

May 10, 2017, produced a successful turkey hunt for me. This success came exactly one year to the day since my last big gobbler, which was my first long beard. Both long beards were from Central California. Using a box call and a gobble call I called two big gobblers to my blind from about 400 yards out. After about 20 minutes of back and forth gobbling and hen calls they stopped gobbling. I put my calls away and waited not expecting much to happen. About 25 minutes later as I was checking all directions for activity I looked to my left and saw two big toms about 60 vards out. I guickly closed all of the windows in the blind except for the front two. I peeked out the left side window and saw them coming towards my blind on a rout that would put them 20 yards in front of me. As the first one came into view in the front window I drew my bow, settled the pin, and loosed the arrow. The tom immediately took to wing and flew about 100 yards down hill where he crashed. Still in sight I walked down the hill and recovered my trophy and enough wild turkey meat for at least two special dinners. The color of this tom is stunning!!! Beard is approximately 10" long and spurs are approximately 1" Live weight just over 25 pounds. My Xpedition Xcursion-6 Bow performed very well.







DO WE NEED A "SMALL-LARGE" GAME CLUB? YOU DECIDE!

1st Annual Micro-3D Shoot Hosted by the Pasadina **Roving Archers** By Roy Brokaw

On Saturday, May 13, 2017, I attended the first annual 'Micro 3-D' Archery Tournament at the Pasadena Roving Archers Range. This tournament was the brain child of George Papac, Vice President of the CBH. This was not a sanctioned shoot and the rules were very flexible.

Here's what the shoot was all about. Competitors, about twenty of us, shot at small plastic toy animals on which George had painstakingly drawn kill and vital scoring areas. The scoring was 5 points for a kill, 3 points for a vital, 2 points for the remainder of the animal and 1 point for a knock down, hooves and antlers scored, skip in knock downs were not allowed. Each shooter shot one at a time with a score keeper keeping track, not an easy thing to do with these tiny targets. I used my binoculars to find the targets hiding behind weeds. There were two courses of fire, the desert course and the jungle course with twenty targets on each course making a total possible score of 200. I think the highest score achieved was somewhere in the mid 30's most archers scored in the mid teens. The targets were shot at between 10 and 15 yards and no range finders were allowed. It was quite challenging shooting at targets the size of a small lizard. One advantage of the Micro 3-D was setting up and taking down the course, and all of the targets can be stored in a shoebox.

If there's a second annual tournament you might want to come out and give it a try.







in line with the left edge
of the target butt you will find

the shadow of the arrow in flight that was just loosed by the archer. I have yet to see/find the inflight arrow.

Record 14,492 Participate in 2017 NASP Nationals

This was NASP's 15th national tournament since its inception March 3, 2002. Student archers, coaches, parents, and friends from 41 states and Washington, DC gathered at the Louisville Exposition Center from May 11-13 for three record-breaking tournaments under one roof.

In addition to the nearly 30,000 friends and family in attendance, 14,492 youth were present and eager to participate in the world's largest archery tournament--a 12.4-percent increase over the 2016 nationals. Not only did NASP see an increase in the bulls-eye competition, but the International Bowhunting Organization 3D Challenge (NASP/IBO/3D Challenge) entertained 4,123 shooters, 600 more than last year. Finally, 1,850 participated in Centershot Ministries' ("archery in the church") tournament, double the record attendance established in 2016. Including participants, more than 45,000 people attended, including the 240 hard-working volunteers that make this event possible every year.

Shooters competed in elementary, middle school, and high school divisions. Like previous tournaments, there were 20 flights, and each flight was 75 minutes in length. As the bulls-eye competition commenced, each archer took to their assigned lane where each shot five practice and 15 scoring arrows from both 10 and 15 meter shooting lines. A perfect score of 300 (30 bullseyes) has never been shot at Nationals, but several come close.

In the elementary division, Austin Hall, a fifth grader from Northern Elementary, received top honors with his score of 292. From White Hall Elementary, fifth grader Olivia Lyle achieved the top female category with her score of 288. From the middle school division, Henry Thompson, an eighth grader from Anderson County Middle School, achieved the top male category with a score of 298, and Emmaline Kleinman from Crosby Middle School took the top female spot with a score of 294. From the high school division, Chance Seabolt, an eleventh grader from North Murray High School, was high scorer in the male category with a 298. Bailey White, also an eleventh grader from Lawrence County High School achieved the top female rank with her score of 298. Truly a co-gender sport, 47 percent of the participants were female and the top boy and top girl BOTH shot a near perfect 298 out of a possible 300.

The national tournament wouldn't be complete without the scholarship shoot-off. During this part of the tournament, the top five male and female archers had a chance to shoot for an array of cash scholarships to be utilized for any post-secondary education of their choosing. This year NASP presented \$105,000 in individual cash scholarships. The results of the scholarship shoot-off are as follows: In the male category, T. Sanchez was the winner of the \$20k scholarship. Henry Thompson won \$15k scholarship, Todd Craghead received the \$10k scholarship, Aiden Jones received \$5k, and Chance Sabot received \$2.5k. In the female category, winning the \$20k scholarship was Sydney Vivian. Samantha Hartman-Stackhouse received \$15k, Bailey White \$10k, Maria Zielinkski, shooting a borrowed bow, won the \$5k scholarship, and finally, Anne Reinkemeyer received \$2.5k in cash scholarships.

Congratulations archers!

Team scholarships were also awarded to each of the 24 members of the first, second and third placing High School teams. Thanks to Academy Sports each of the first place HS team members was awarded a \$1,000 scholarship. Easton Technical Products provided \$750 to each of the second place HS team members. and American Whitetail Targets provided \$500 to each third place HS team member.

Easton Technical Products, title sponsor of the NASP Academic Archer Program. awarded a prize package to the top male and female Academic Archer in each of the three bullseye divisions - elementary, middle school and high school. Each prize package included Easton arrows, Easton accessories, a Delta McKenzie Target and a Hoyt bow of their choice.

As the 2017 NASP nationals wrapped up on Mother's Day weekend and kids returned home, the program and its top achievers prepare for fun in the sun at the 2017 world tournament in Orlando, Fla., July 21 - 22 at the Orange County Convention Center.



A California Fish and Game Commission meeting (CFGC) will be held June 21 & 22 in Smith River. Agenda has not been posted at this writing but upland bird regulations should be a discussion item.

A Wildlife Resources Committee meeting was held May 24th in Sacramento; agenda items to be discussed:

- 2. Public forum.
- 3. Staff update on draft Commission climate change policy.
- 4. Discuss and approve recommendations for 2018 sport fishing regulations, includes adding catfish to bowfishing species list in certain bodies of water. WRC Commissioners approved and sent to FGC, should be an agenda item at their August meeting.
- 5. Discuss potential options for phase 2 falconry regulation changes.
- 6. Discuss potential wild pig management options
- 7. Predator Policy Workgroup (A) Update on Predator Policy Workgroup activities (B) Review and discuss draft predator policy
- 8. Future agenda items.
- (A) Review work plan agenda topics and timeline (B) Potential new agenda topics for FGC consideration

The state legislature has started the next 2 year cycle for proposed laws. Bills not passed this year can be carried over to 2018. Several bills have already been introduced that affect sportsmen. Here is a list of bills related to hunting and their current positions in the legislature; AB478, increase age requirement for fishing license, in Appropriations Committee, update in suspense file. AB521, reduce the tag cost for resident elk tags, update now in Appropriations Committee on third reading. AB573, depredation permits for wild pigs, update in Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee. AB986 reduced fees for veterans, in Appropriations Committee, update moved to suspense file. AB1544 lead ammo ban relief, in Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee. AB1617, additional funding sources for DFW, update in Appropriations Committee. SB234 local regulation prohibition, update passed senate and now in assembly. SB710 use of suppressors for hunting, in Public Safety Committee, update hearing canceled. Additional bills related to firearms and DFW budgeting are not listed at this time. Bills could change content when close to expiration with the term gut and amend. Our conservation partners in the Hunting Conservation Coalition also have lobbyists to monitor concerns of sportsmen. This network of information and participation is advantageous to keeping informed of laws and regulations that affect what we do.

9 COMMON COMPOUND ARCHERY MISTAKES...

AND HOW TO FIX THEM

Top compound archers highlight easy errors and how to overcome them. They say you learn more from failure than from success. Mistakes happen – and the best archers in the world only learn to overcome, then grow, from their errors. So who better to learn from when you're starting your path in archery? Here's what some of the world's most accurate athletes had to say about fixing the most common mistakes when shooting a compound bow.

1. NOT LETTING DOWN

"Some people never let down, because they think they can handle the shot," said Martin Damsbo.

Braden Gellenthien added: "People work too hard to make a good shot. Good shots happen easily but a lot of time we struggle too long and are too stubborn to start over."

If it's not going well, then the best thing to do is to stop; reset, and start over.

2. FOCUSING ON AIMING

"We are really stable shooting this kind of bow but if you only focus on aiming but don't think about expanding properly, working with your back, and rest like you're on your sofa, waiting, it can be tough," said Seb Peineau.

Although the reigning World Archery Indoor Champion said that stability was important, it can be bad if it's a focus. Seb pushes into the grip and pulls, constantly, against his back – and uses a back tension release – to ensure he doesn't rest at full draw too long.

3. NOT FINISHING

Both Mariya Shkolna and Tanja Jensen said the biggest mistakes they made was not finishing the shot. Sometimes everything is perfect – and then, they said, the front hand just falls away and the arrow ends up going wide.

"Sometimes I forget my left hand should stay pointing towards the middle until the end," said Mariya. The lesson: the shot doesn't end when the release engages.

4. TESTING RELEASES

Two-time Hyundai Archery World Cup Final Champion Sergio Pagni, who also works in an archery shop, had a good story about someone trying a different style of release – a back tension rather than a trigger.

The archer did it late at night and alone (bad idea), but set the trigger too hot, and ended up hitting himself in the face when it went off while he was drawing. He knocked himself out – then woke up two hours later with a bloody nose, staring at the ceiling! Be careful.

5. FOCUSING ON NEGATIVES

"When you've been shooting compound for a couple of years. You stop looking at the 10s and focus on the nines. That's a really big mistake. When you have five 10s, and one nine, you forget to think about the 10s – but you have to think about the good shots, so you can make better ones," said world number one Sara Lopez.

She also said that sometimes coaches make the same mistake.

6. FIDDLING

Only when you're shooting strong, consistent shots and the groupings are visually appearing worse than they should be should you invest in top gear said Seppie Cilliers.

"People buy equipment and think that will give them the score rather than practising. Practice is the best way of getting a good score and, when you do practise, your equipment at some point makes a difference – that's when you invest," he explained.

7. TRASH THOUGHTS

"When you push the trigger and you have trash in your head, you cannot shoot," said Natalia Avdeeva. When the world's buzzing around there, you're not feeling the shot, she added.

"I think about my family. It's the best way for me to concentrate."

8. DRAWLENGTH

Reo Wilde reckoned that having the right drawlength is the most under appreciated aspect of gear by new archers. Too long, and the bow isn't as accurate; too short, and the riser becomes "herky-jerky" – and won't sit still.

The only way to fix it? Go to someone, a coach or a store, that knows what they're doing.

9. PUNCHING

"If you start punching, and you get nervous, you'll end up in chaos and shoot misses," said Stephan Hansen. Punching, put simply, is the act of clicking the trigger or forcing the shot to go at a certain moment — rather than pushing or pulling to naturally execute the shot.



"I have tried it. I have been there. Hopefully it won't happen again. It was a bad habit, I was young and I didn't know how to shoot perfectly. I shot a back tension and got over it."

The world number one, and reigning World Archery Champion, said it took him a year to 18 months to overcome punching – and also shot a back tension release from mid-2015 to the end of 2016. He won the first stage of the 2017 Hyundai Archery World Cup with a trigger.

"If I want to punch it, my body doesn't want to. I shot a windy competition recently and I punched a few – because otherwise I couldn't get my shot off – and it felt bad to do it," said Hansen.

"I didn't want to watch myself shoot when I was punching. It was horrible. I don't mind moving my bow arm to correct something but to punch it and see the reaction, it just doesn't look good."
