Gavin Newsom is out to Destroy your 2nd Amendment

I just reviewed the California Secretary of State's web-site (googled Ca Secretary of State Prop 63 2016) and read the MANY Initiatives that will be on the November ballot. In addition to **Prop 64... Legalization of Marijuana** I also found **Prop 63... Firearms. Ammunition Sales. Initiative Statute.**

Proposition 63 Firearms. Ammunitions Sales. Initiative Statute. Prohibits possession of large-capacity ammunition magazines and requires their disposal by sale to dealer, destruction, or removal from state. Requires most individuals to pass background check and obtain Department of Justice authorization to purchase ammunition. Requires most ammunition sales be made through licensed ammunition vendors and reported to Department of Justice. Requires lost or stolen firearms and ammunition be reported to law enforcement. Prohibits person convicted of stealing a firearm from possessing firearms.

The Mid-Year President's Meeting has come and gone. We, your Regional Officers, CBH/SAA Officers, appointees and staff, met at the Visalia Sportsman Club located at 500 E Roosevelt Ave., in Visalia for the Mid-Year President's Meeting. A **BIG THANK YOU** goes out to Alan Meurer for making the necessary arrangements for the meeting location and to the Visalia Sportsman Club (VSC) for hosting this meeting again, the second time in as many years. The VSC just can't be out done when it comes to hosting this meeting! A **SPECIAL THANK YOU** goes to the guys that prepared the lunch which was 2nd to none! Everything they prepared was outstanding but my favorite was the green beans... they were the BOMB!! So, **Royce Nalls, Scott Willis and Eddie Thomas Jr...** Thank you for a job well done!!!!

We had less than a quorum so business that needed to be voted on was put on hold until the Annual Meeting in January in Ontario. However, we had great discussion on several issues and listened to reports from the attending CBH/SAA Officers / Staff, Committees and Regions then we moved on to Old Business. I know this comes as a surprise to you but included in the Old Business was the reminder that the President and Vice President's (VP) two year terms will expire in March 2, 2018. With that being said I reminded those in attendance and now reminding you that we need to have individuals who are interested in assuming these positions to step forward and notify your Region's Nominating Committee, which includes the President, Secretary and Legislative Rep., of your intentions. The Nominating Committee will then present your nomination to Pam Severtson, Secretary of CBH/SAA, and your name will be on the Ballot that will appear in the December issue of the CBH/SAA Magazine just prior to the end of the terms. In a similar vein is the upcoming elections for the Offices of 2nd VP for Target, Field and Indoor which terms will end on March 2nd, 2017,

and those elections will be held in December just four months away. The process for these offices are the same as noted above with the President and VP. I have not received any notices from the current 2nd VPs that they are wanting to kick sand so if there is no challengers vying for the offices then there will be no elections and they will be considered to have been unanimously elected for another term come January.

In May I was advised that I was going to have some "mid-term" appointments to make and I chose to hold off on my appointments until the Mid-Year President's Meeting. The changes are rather exciting for CBH/SAA and of course for the individuals that are involved in the changes. There is no downside to these changes. First off... Tom Daley has moved up the NFAA ladder and is now the Southwest Section Councilman. This is good for him, but in the grand scheme of California's association with the NFAA this is **GREAT for California! Congratulations Tom!!!**

With Tom's movement into the political arena of the NFAA he leaves an unoccupied seat within CBH/SAA so the one person that has really been interested in doing Tom's job and hugely qualified to do the NFAA Director Job is your CBH/SAA VP Gary McCain. So, Gary submitted a letter of resignation, which I accepted, and then I appointed him to the vacant seat left by Tom. **Congratulations Gary!!!** I am very confident that you will do a GREAT job and I know you and Tom will make things happen in the NFAA! Additionally, having the both of you in your new positions CBH/SAA will have a greater influence at the NFAA level and we will be more informed. Most importantly however, NFAA will have to be more transparent with California than they have since NFAA headquarters left California!

Gary's appointment to the NFAA Director position leaves the 1st VP Office vacant. So, I was very pleased to receive an enthusiastic interest from George Papac requesting to be appointed to that vacated office. With that being said I appoint George to the Office of the 1st VP of CBH/SAA.

Congratulations George and welcome aboard!!!

George will be submitting a resume found in this or the next issue of our magazine so watch for it. Many of you already know him and for those of you that don't... you will know who he is and what he has done. George's appointment will require confirmation by the Board of Directors at the January Meeting for the remainder of Gary's term in 2017. Gary's New Position is an annual appointment made by me and also confirmed by the Board every year at the annual meeting. Other business that we discussed was advertising CBH/SAA in as many Archery Shops as possible. This will be done with a CBH/SAA Banner and our four fold pamphlet and counter cards. The general consensus of those at the meeting was that we need to do something to bring awareness to CBH/SAA and this could be a good start. I personally have contacted several shops and so far I have received nothing but positive responses to the proposal. I would like to have as many shops contacted as quickly as possible so I need your help. If you know of a shop willing to participate in this please send me an email with the name of the archery shop and the contact person's information.

Also we had a discussion on Shooting Stakes for seniors. I was approached by a few Master Seniors and they proposed that they shoot from the Youth Stakes because they are no longer capable of shooting the heavy draw weight bows and are shooting bows in the 30# range. We will discuss this again at the Annual Meeting in January but the consensus of those in attendance was that lots of our Lady Shooters shoot light bows from the adult stakes and have the same pin gap issues. This proposal would have to be in the form of a Petition and sent to Pam Severtson by October 2016, if we

are to make a ruling on it.

I was contacted by Steve Greenwood, the GM for Victory Archery, and he offered to place our four fold pamphlets in every order of arrows he sends out to shops in California. He wants to help CBH/SAA in our efforts to promote the organization and because he is so determined to help CBH/SAA he said all of his employees who shoot will be CBH/SAA Members. All in attendance felt that this would be a good opportunity to help promote CBH/SAA so we will be moving forward on this also.

I am sure most of you, if not all, are aware of the hammer wielded by our California Government on July 1st. The liberal legislators... the anti-hunting, anti-gun, the anti-2nd Amendment, the anti-self-protection and the anti-wildlife Management (did I leave anyone out?) legislators who sponsored bills that would take away our rights which was then signed into law by Governor Brown. That's right, the Governor and California liberal minded Legislators want to suppress your freedoms and destroy your state, for their benefit, by sponsoring Senate Bills and Assembly Bills that make you an automatic criminal, if you don't comply with these new laws. Legislative Information

Legislative Information

The next Fish and Game Commission (FGC) meeting will be held August 24 and 25 in Folsom, Ca. Agenda has not been posted at the writing of this article. Upland bird regulation changes that include requiring the use of broadheads for turkeys should be finalized at this meeting.

The next Wildlife Resources meeting will be September 21st in Woodland Ca. Agenda has not been posted at the writing of this article.

The Legislative Sportsmen Caucus Shoot was held June 22nd at the Cordova Shooting Center in Rancho Cordova. The event introduces our state representatives to the shooting sports. CBHSAA sets up an archery range as one of the activities for them to participate and is very popular. Maya Archers instructors Johnnie Waddles, Robert Williams, Carlos Rodrigues, John Tarro, John Laubinger and Robert Moore with additional assistance from instructor Jen Cordaro worked the range from 6pm to 9pm. Good conversations with legislative staff and representatives on archery and bowhunting took place while enjoying the sport.

State legislation for the current cycle has ended with many bills going to the Governor for signature. These have been listed in previous articles using Gaines and Associates Leg reports to keep us up to date. These reports are also on our website under the Legislative link. Activities on both the Federal and State level are increasing that will affect sportsmen. The new land Monument designations will begin the process of establishing management plans by having community workshops to get input into what you want to be included. The first meetings have taken place for the Sand to Snow National Monument. This 154,000-acre monument extends from BLM-managed lands on the Sonoran desert floor to an elevation of 11,500 feet in the San Geronio Wilderness of San Bernardino National Forest. President Barrack Obama established Sand to Snow National Monument on February 12, 2016. Additional National Monument workshops will be scheduled and it's important that hunters and fishermen attend and submit responses.

Establishes new procedures for enforcing laws prohibiting firearm possession by felons and violent criminals. Requires Department of Justice to provide information about prohibited persons to Federal National Instant Criminal Background Check System. Summary of estimated by Legislative Analyst and Director of Finance of fiscal impact on state and local government. Increased state costs in the tens of millions of dollars annually related to regulating ammunition sales, likely offset by various regulatory fees authorized by the measure. Increase in court and law enforcement costs, not likely to exceed the tens of millions of dollars annually, related to removing firearms from prohibited persons as part of court sentencing proceedings. These costs could be offset to some extent by fees authorized by the measure. Potential increase in state and local correctional costs, not likely to exceed the low millions of dollars annually, related to new and increased penalties. (15-0098)

Ban all standard (“high-capacity”) magazines... even those “grandfathered” in *

Ban online and mail order/catalog ammunitions... require direct purchases only *

Ban the importation of ammunition purchased out of state *

Destroy virtually all small business ammo retailers with new regulations *

Criminalize the sharing of ammunition between friends who may be practicing for hunting or target shooting *

Mandate a new \$50 DOJ “ammunition purchase permit” *

Require that ammunition sales are recorded in a new gun owner database*

It **will not** thwart any terrorist attack*

Keeping Folks Hungry for Archery

Keaton Chia and his sister always wanted to try medieval sports like fencing, archery and jousting. They were big fans of “The Lord of the Rings” movies and local Scottish games that highlighted archery.



“The skill and artistry required to master the bow and arrow fascinated us,” he recalls.

When he got to college, he decided to give it a try. Today, the 29-year-old is the director of the Easton Archery Center of Excellence in Chula Vista. His work with the Easton Foundations began with the Olympic Archery in Schools program, a league for middle and high school students to practice and compete in teams. At the center in Chula Vista, he’s ultimately responsible for the operation of the facility, including events, programs and promoting the sport to make it more mainstream.

Chia lives in Mira Mesa with his wife, Evonne (who’s also a skilled archer), and their baby daughter. He talks about the center and the school program, what he loves about the sport, and how “The Hunger Games” series drew more kids to archery.

Q: Why was working with the Easton Foundations to promote archery something you wanted to do?

A: Shooting archery in college brought great friends into my life and also gave me the opportunity to teach others, which was very rewarding. So it is a really neat opportunity to work with Easton Foundations to pass on the blessings I have received through archery, to share this community with others and to make a positive difference in lives through sport.

Q: Once you started archery, did you ever get discouraged?

A: Sure did! For my own shooting, it is easy to hit plateaus and slumps in performance. Not only does the sport challenge you mentally with each shot, but also your character in handling disappointments, successes and other turns in your journey. As a coach there are those discouraging times when your student is having challenges and looks to you for answers and you realize you don’t have them.

Q: What do you enjoy about the sport?

A: I enjoy the many challenges that archery presents. It is fun to work on your equipment, to develop a better understanding of how your body works with the bow, to look inward at your own thoughts and mental toughness, and much more.

Q: What does the foundation do, specifically, to promote archery?

A: We offer grants to clubs, programs, schools, colleges and universities, and organizations that propose archery-related plans or projects. We also have our own operating programs including Olympic Archery in Schools and our archery centers.

Q: What do you do to get the sport to become more mainstream?

A: You have to see what matters, what adds value to the sport. The love of the game is at the heart of sport, so we re-created the archery game to make it more team-based and focused on match-play, which is more exciting for the archers and spectators. Being part of a team is very powerful, especially for an individual sport. The league took small steps to test different components with a handful of schools in our Los Angeles and San Diego pilot programs. Today, we have 83 schools across five different states, and we're excited to see it continue to grow!

Q: What kinds of changes have you noticed in the kids in the Olympic Archery in Schools program?

A: We often hear about how their focus has improved both in the classroom and outside of it. Many are more confident and disciplined from training. Archery often attracts those who are not normally interested in sports, so parents often tell us how surprised and happy they are to see their kids outside, practicing a sport and having the chance to be a part of a team.

Q: Have people asked you about "The Hunger Games" a lot over the last few years?

A: Yes! "The Hunger Games" had a big impact on archery. Across the country, clubs saw significant growth as well as a big surge in female participation. Many clubs saw the number of girls double, most often due to "The Hunger Games." Our sport has an especially neat connection to the film as five-time Olympian, Khatuna Lorig, taught Jennifer Lawrence how to shoot a bow.

Q: Your wife is also involved in archery. What's the story of how the two of you met?

A: To help grow our (University of California) Berkeley archery club, I helped teach our beginner classes to introduce peers to the sport. Evonne was in one of my first classes and that is where we met. She got hooked and soon joined the team. We had a great time traveling and competing together on the team and became good friends. When I proposed to Evonne in Japan, archery ended up being a part of that story, too, as it happened at Sanjusangendo — a temple where archery tournaments are held.

Q: Between you and your wife, who's the better archer?

A: She is, of course!

Q: What is the best advice you've ever received?

A: Kim Jin-ho, the 1984 Olympic bronze medalist, mentored our university archery team. After a team dinner, a group of us were talking and hearing about her experiences. She shared that "to be a great archer it's not about what's up here (pointing to her head), but down here (pointing to her heart)." It's about who you are as a person. That has always challenged me to be a better person and seek to glorify God in all I do.

Q: What is one thing people would be surprised to find out about you?

A: I'm pretty normal ... so maybe that I was homecoming king in high school?

Q: Describe your ideal San Diego weekend.

A: San Diego offers so much! A great weekend has time with the family, a bit of something new, some favorites, and good food! Whether it's hiking to Potato Chip Rock, playing board games with friends, trying new food during Restaurant Week, hanging out at church, or going to the range there is always something different to do to match the mood of that weekend.
