

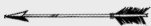

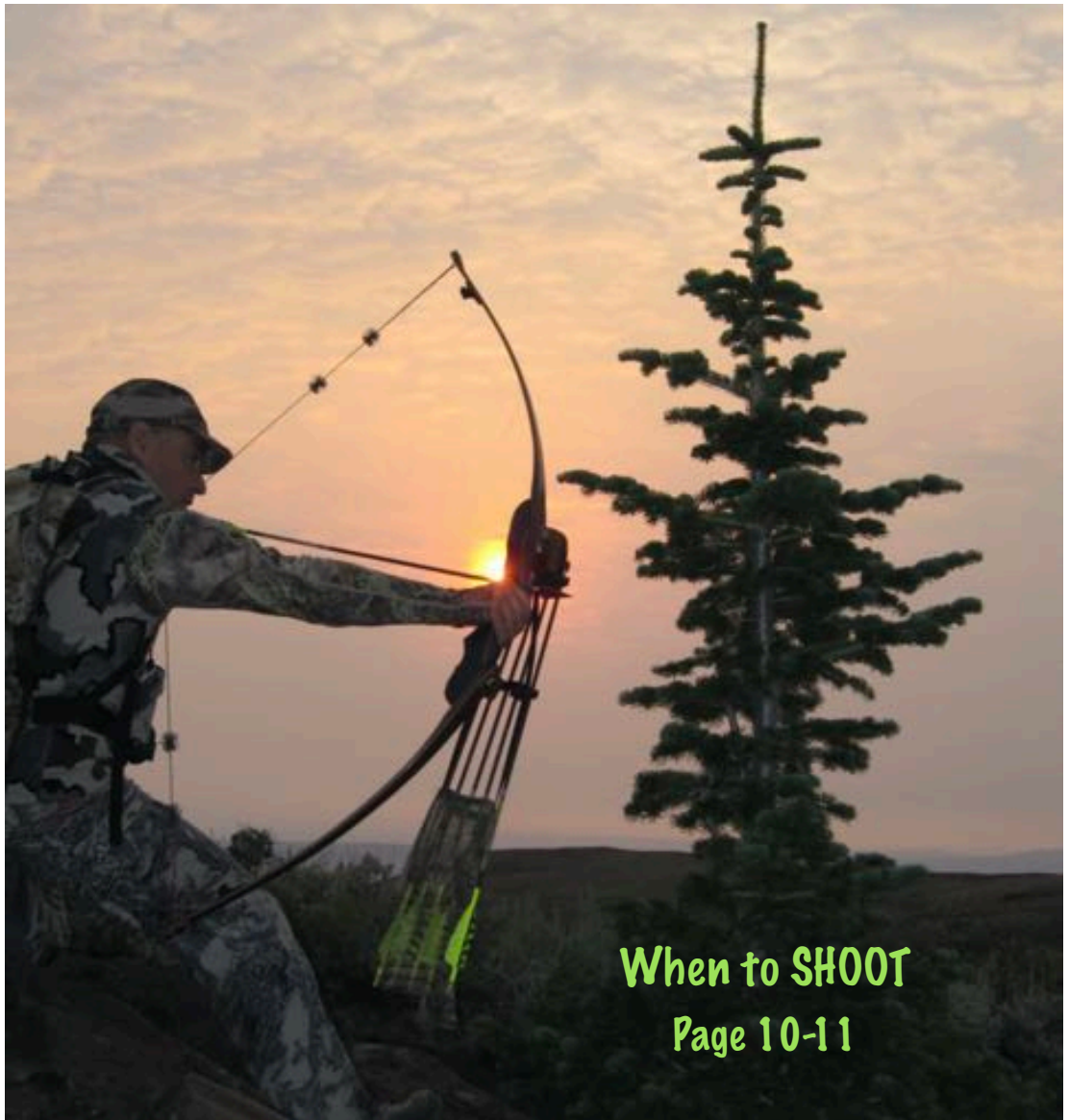

Legislative Coordinator Report Robert Moore

Fish and Game Commission meeting held June 16 and 17 by webinar/teleconference. Agenda items of interest include; 7. Duck stamps Consider approving proposed projects for the Duck Stamp Dedicated Account funds in Fiscal Year 2021-22. (Pursuant to Section 3702, Fish and Game Code) DISCUSSION AND ACTION ITEMS 8. California bighorn sheep. Receive an overview of the Department's five-year status review of California bighorn sheep (*Ovis canadensis californiana*, also known as Sierra Nevada bighorn sheep) which is listed as endangered under CESA. During the presentation Mountain lion predation was hampering any translocation of stock as the bigger herd populations were declining. DAY 2 – June 17, 2021, 8:30AM, 13. Committee assignments Consider assignments from the Commission's membership to its three committees, consisting of at least one commissioner: Marine Resources, Samantha Murry, Wildlife Resources, Eric Sklar and Tribal, Jacque Hostler-Carmesin. (A) Discuss potential support for legislation (B) Update on committee prioritization project 17. Justice, equity, diversity and inclusion Receive and discuss an update on developing the justice, equity, diversity and inclusion plan. 18. Wildlife Prosecutor of the Year Announce recipient of the Commission's annual Wildlife Prosecutor of the Year award, consistent with the Commission's policy adopted in 2016. 19. Tribal Committee Discuss referred topics and consider revisions to topics and timing. 20. Department informational item: Wildlife and Fisheries Division, and Ecosystem Conservation Division.

Items of interest from previous meetings: These items are generally updates on agenda topics recently heard before the Commission. (A) Urban coyote workshops 25. Petitions for regulation change received at previous meetings consider whether to grant, deny, or refer for additional review petitions for regulation change received under general public comment at previous meetings. Note: New petitions for regulation change will be received under general public comment. Any petitions granted today will be added to the Commission's rulemaking calendar for development and future consideration. (A) Action on current petitions I. Petition #2020-011: Request to restore recreational and commercial red abalone harvest, San Miguel Island II. Petition #2021-003: Request to change East Walker River special fishing regulations III. Petition #2021-004: Request to remove *Xenopus amietae* from the restricted species list (B) Action on pending regulation petitions referred to staff or the Department for review I. Petition #2020-011: Request to establish limited entry and precautionary regulations for commercial coonstripe shrimp trap fishery

(B) Next meeting – August 18-19, 2021 by webinar/ teleconference. Possible the next actual in person meeting may be October 13 and 14

AB 564 (Gonzalez) – Biodiversity Protection and Restoration Act. AB 564 by Assembly Member would establish the Biodiversity Protection and Restoration Act and require all state agencies, boards, and commissions to consider and prioritize the protection of biodiversity in carrying out their statutory mandates. The bill would require strategies related to the goal of the state to conserve at least 30% of California's land and coastal waters by 2030 to be made available to the public and provided to certain legislative committees by no later than June 30, 2022.

Update: AB 564 has been cancelled by author

AB 614 Aguiar-Curry. Wildlife habitat: birds.

This bill would raise by \$5 the upland game bird hunting validation and the state duck hunting validation fees, as specified, with that \$5 to be deposited, and available upon appropriation to the department for the Nesting Bird Habitat Incentive Program, in the Nesting Bird Habitat Incentive Program Account, which the bill would create in the Fish and Game Preservation Fund. This bill instead would require the Upland Game Bird Account advisory committee to annually review and provide comments to the department on all proposed projects and other expenditures funded from the Upland Game Bird Account to help ensure that specified requirements pertaining to the Upland Game Bird Account have been met and require the department to post budget information and a brief description on its internet website for all projects and other expenditures funded from the Upland Game Bird Account. **Update:** AB 614 is now in the Senate

AB 645 (Gallagher) – Fish and Wildlife: Poaching Violations – Probation. Laws which significantly increased fines for possessing more than three times the daily bag limit and for the illegal take of wildlife for profit or personal gain which increased penalties for the illegal take of trophy-class animals took a step back last year when the State Legislature passed legislation that reduced maximum probation from three years to one year for all misdemeanor violations whose provisions do not call out a specific probation length. Because current law does not specify maximum probation periods for any poaching crimes, the effect of this legislation was to limit probation for even the most serious misdemeanor poaching violations to one year.

Said differently, prior to passage of last year’s legislation, a judge could sentence individuals convicted of serious poaching crimes to probation that would prohibit them from hunting for up to three years. The option of a longer probationary period also helped to ensure that penalty assessments could be collected.

To address this serious concern, this bill as amended March 11, 2021, would reinstate a maximum 3-year probation for the following serious violations of the Fish and Game Code:

- §12012 – The illegal take of wildlife for profit or personal gain
- §12013 – The illegal take or possession in the field of more than three times the daily bag limit
- §12013.3 – The illegal take of trophy deer, elk, antelope, bighorn sheep or wild turkey
- §12002.3(b) - The illegal sale purchase of abalone

AB 645 is in appropriations committee and held under submission

AB 804 Megan, Dahle. Free hunting days. Existing law authorizes the Director of Fish and Wildlife to establish 2 free hunting days per year: one in the fall, and one in the winter.

Existing law authorizes a California unlicensed resident to hunt during a free hunting day if accompanied by a licensed hunter, subject to certain conditions. Existing law prohibits these provisions from being implemented until the Department of Fish and Wildlife’s Automated License Data System is fully operational for at least one year.

This bill would require, rather than authorize, the director to establish 2 free hunting days per year, one in the fall and one in the spring, no later than July 1, 2022. The bill would delete the prohibition requiring a delay in implementation of the above-described provisions. **Update:** AB 804 is in the Senate Natural resources committee.

AB 1223 (Levine) Major rewrite to **The Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act, The Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act**, would, commencing July 1, 2022, impose an excise tax in the amount of 10% of the sales price of a handgun and 11% of the sales price of a long gun, rifle, firearm precursor part, and ammunition as specified. The tax would be collected by the state pursuant to the Fee Collection Procedures Law. The bill would require that the revenues collected be deposited in the CalVIP Firearm and Ammunition Tax Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Fund, which the bill would create.

The bill would continuously appropriate moneys in that fund to the Board of State and Community Corrections to provide CalVIP grants, thereby making an appropriation. The bill would remove the \$1,500,000 CalVIP grant limit and authorize the Board of State and Community Corrections to determine the award amount. AB 1223 would continuously appropriate moneys in that Fund to the Board of State and Community Corrections to fund CalVIP programs which remediate the effects the illegal use of firearms has in our state.

Implementing successful programs for addressing gun violence is something that all Californians support and would benefit from. As such, all of California should equally help to fund their implementation. However, under AB 1223, CalVIP programs would only be funded by law-abiding citizens who legally purchase firearms and ammunition. Because AB 1223 would result in a taxpayer paying a higher tax, the bill requires approval of 2/3 of the membership of each house of the Legislature.

Update: AB 1223 has been extensively changed and is now on the Assembly floor, it failed to pass the assembly but the Assembly Rules plans to amend AB 1223 to add an “urgency clause” – a change which would make the bill eligible to be reconsidered later this Session,

SB 370 Dodd, Wildlife: Big Game Management Account: uses. Existing law establishes the Big Game Management Account within the Fish and Game Preservation Fund. Existing law requires revenue from the sale of tags for antelope, elk, deer, wild pig, bear, and sheep to be deposited in the account, except as provided. Existing law requires funds deposited in the account to be expended, upon appropriation by the Legislature, by the Department of Fish and Wildlife, solely for specified purposes and pursuant to specified limitations. This bill instead would authorize the department to make grants to, reimburse, or enter into contracts or other agreements with public and private entities, including nonprofit organizations, and federally recognized Indian tribes for the use of the funds from the account to carry out those purposes.

Legislative Report from page 5 - **Update:** SB 370 was ordered to inactive file by author

SB 470 Jones, Fishing and hunting: annual combined hunting and fishing licenses.

This bill would create the annual combined hunting and fishing license that would grant the holder of the license the same privileges as the annual hunting and fishing licenses and that would be valid for a term of one year from the date specified on the license. The bill would limit the issuance of these licenses to residents and would require the department to issue these licenses beginning January 1, 2023, upon payment of a fee of \$100, as adjusted annually for inflation. The bill would require the Fish and Game Commission to adjust the amount of the fee to fully recover, but not exceed, all reasonable administrative and implementation costs of the department and the commission relating to these licenses. The bill would require the department to provide an applicant for one of these licenses the option to automatically renew the license and would provide a 5% discount if the applicant selects this option.

Update: SB 470 has been referred to the Senate Appropriations Committee.

My Treestand Fall

This story started back on November 11, 2020, during the heart of the Covid pandemic. I had already filled my AO deer tag and my A31 deer tag was burning a hole in my pocket, along with a bear tag. On the morning of my fall from the treestand, I left my home early in the morning, as I always do, to reach my hunting area before daybreak. I arrived at the trail head, and I parked my truck. I put my backpack and my binoculars on and with my bow in hand and started my hike up the mountain. I usually hike in for a while before I turn on my head lamp. Once I reached the darker part of the canyon, I turned on my head lamp so I could see better. About 200 yards from where my treestand was located I saw movement 30 or 40 yards ahead of me and realized it was a bear. It bolted and ran into a thick patch of bushes and tangle wood uphill from me. As he increased the distance between us, I could still hear him breaking brush and limbs but the noise he was making grew fainter until I could not hear him anymore. All was quiet, the only things I could hear was my breathing and my footsteps on the trail as I continued towards my treestand. It didn't take long before I arrived at the tree where my treestand was located.

This treestand was a permanent stand that was built out of 2X4 and plywood that was bolted and screwed together and to the tree. I had been using it for a few years and it was placed in a prime area for deer and bear. I have taken a few deer out of it, so I was looking forward to filling another tag from this perch. Also, I was excited that I had a bear in the area and was hoping I had not bumped him out of the area and with some luck, later today, he would come padding along the trail giving me a chance to fill my bear tag. I tied my bow to my draw rope and proceeded to climb up the tree, using my climbing pegs, to the platform. When I reached the platform, I placed my pack and my binoculars on it and continued to step onto the last peg. I placed my left hand on the main beam and reached over with my right hand to grab the front side of the platform to pull myself up onto the platform. Before I knew it the entire platform lifted up like a lid towards me and the main beam. The platform, backpack, my binoculars, and I fell backwards and to the ground. Continued on page 7

My Treestand Fall from page 6 - I landed on my back and left side on the flared bottom of the tree trunk with everything else landing on me.

The hard landing did not knock me out, and I never lost consciousness even with all the pain I was in. I knew I had some serious injuries that needed to be evaluated before I attempted do the macho thing and jump up. I was lying on my back in an awkward position and kinda afraid to move. I laid there for a moment and prayed that the injuries were not life threatening nor serious enough that I could not get up and walk down the mountain. I knew I had to get myself off the mountain by myself and back to my truck.

I started to move a little at a time, making sure that things were, KINDA, working like they should. I was in severe pain and severely short of breath. I moved myself around enough to get to a seated position and then to a standing position. I was still evaluating my injuries. As I stood there, I was in shock trying to figure out how this could have happened! This fall, from the treestand that I had climbed into on many occasions, just blew me away. It was like a dream, and I was wanting to wake up.

I was bleeding from my head and face, and my right wrist was weak and hurt like hell. I was not sure what any of those injuries were. What I did know for sure was that I had fallen from the treestand, and I was really hurting.

My head lamp was knocked clean off my head and laying on the ground along with my backpack and binoculars. When I bent over to pick everything up off the ground it caused such horrible pain in my side that I could not catch my breath. Also, at this time, I realized my right wrist was badly broken because I couldn't pick-up or hold anything with that hand. In this moment of realization, I also knew I didn't want my prior wish to come true and have the bear come back or to have him on the trail when I was on my way out because I knew I could not draw my bow, run or fight him off. Thank God the bear stayed away because I would have been an easy meal for him.

Two days prior to my fall I sat in this stand all day and had no issues with the it. There were no signs of any structural problems. It was as normal as could be. It was strong, sturdy, quiet and today I climbed into the stand the exact same way as I always did.

I fished my cell phone out of my right pocket with my left hand and I was able to make a call to a friend for help. I told him I fell from my treestand and asked him if he could meet me at my truck. After a grueling hike down the mountain, I finally made it back to my truck. I was incredibly happy to see that my friend was already there. I must have had lots of adrenaline running through my veins because I don't remember how I got down the mountain.

I was unable to drive due to the pain I was in and was not sure if I was going to pass out or not as we headed out. I was really hurting! My friend drove me to the hospital, and I was seen by the trauma doctors in the emergency room.



They found that I had broken 7 ribs, #6 thru #12, on my left side. One of the ribs punctured my left lung and I shattered my right wrist. I spent 5 days in the hospital letting my left lung reinflate and heal. I also had surgery to repair my wrist.

Recovery was slow but steady which involved lots of therapy and exercises. I asked my doctor and therapist how soon I would be able to shoot my bow because I still had two tags to fill. They were not very encouraging. I decided that I was going to get myself back to shooting sooner than they expected so I pushed myself in therapy and at home to regain my strength and full function of my wrist. Also, ahead of me during my recovery there were going to be many months of sleeping in a seated position because of lung and rib injuries. God was with me that day and I am thankful he did not make my wife a widow. I truly want to thank my wife, Pam, for being there for me during my recovery. She waited on me hand and foot and never complained.

Many times, in the past, I have climb up into trees and never thought about falling out of them. Taking unnecessary risks leads to habits that can lead to injuries and or death. I usually attach a strap from me to the tree once I am settled in case, I should dose off, but that does not protect you from your climb up and down and getting into and out of the treestand. Members that joined us were; Johnnie Waddles, Dennis Parish, Joe Dotterer, Al Wiscovitch, Steve Smith, David Bacon, Lawren Wylie, Sandy and Gary McCain, Brad Grap, JBrr, Kevin Hensley. Meeting was from 2:50 pm and adjourned at 4:22 pm.

The *Big Game Club* had a beginning balance of \$10,886.32. We had expenditures for the State Broadhead Championship of \$1,078.67 in new targets and \$880.00 of target re-builds by Dennis Haworth of *Longhorn 3-D Targets*. Our 25 yard dumpster ran \$575 and the (10) toilets from *Andy Gump* increase to (12 next year) \$1,477.22. Logo awards plaques for 1st through 3rd places at the event \$719.99 - pending the addition of 5 more 1st place awards. Plaques were done by Terry Adams of *Unique Awards*. Three-D arrowheads created by Gilbert Olivas were cemented onto the plaques and totaled \$121.29 more in expenses. Our 2021 State Broadhead logo design t-shirts were a smash and sold out. These were produced by Abigail Beighey of *Elevated Graphics* and sold to us for \$706.84. Craig Fritz once again offered to spearhead the campaign for our raffle.

We needed to purchase the tickets twice as our original date for the tournament was cancelled by COVID. Each of the two times the expenses for the tickets were \$109.92. Not enough can be said thanking our fantastic sponsors KUIU, Victory Archery, Wildlife West, Turner's Outdoorsman, Straight Arrow Bow Hunters, The Spot Archery, Riverside Archery, Shoot Prado, Mike Raahauge, Oranco Bowmen, Cherry Valley Bowhunters, Orange Belt Field Archers, Bent Bow Outdoor Productions, Broken Arrow Bow Hunters and Southwest Archery USA. Without these and others who donated goods, it would be difficult to have this event available year after year. With KUIU's help we were able to

"Give Away" 2 guided hog hunts to northern California.

We held a well attended (180+ shooters) at our State Broadhead Tournament on Memorial weekend (May 28th-30th). A huge thank you again (we are told this was her 30th year working registration) to Sandy McCain and her team of Donna Schwartz, Lawren Wylie, Art Cain and Alice York. The total income deposited by registration (28 on-line) was \$7560.00 plus \$270 pre-ordered t-shirts. Eleven *CBH/SAA* memberships and 5 *NFAA* memberships were sold. More on the income side. Our main raffle took in \$25,700 of which \$15,360 was paid out. The amount of \$3,500 in logo wear and 2nd raffle tickets was deposited. Craig Fritz was again on deck to assist wherever needed and carried the Reverse Raffle. Our Masters of Ceremonies were Chriss Boyles and JBarr. Remaining Big Game Committee members Scott Dayton, Brad Grap, Gary McCain and Steve Walters: plus Wally Schwartz and Steve helped in various ways including selling raffle tickets for donated items. A huge thank you David Bacon and Big Game Club's Media Specialist Lawren Wylie for all their assistance in designing and posting information and pictures. Lawren reports *Instagram* 253 and *FaceBook* with 378 followers.

In our Awards Program Bret Scott took the lead to redesign and have printed new score sheets, affidavits and certificates of congratulations. We were able to donate \$500 towards the Pope and Young Traditional Record Book. In short, our California Big Game Club is on the rebound with new members, programs and ideas. Pam (thank you) was instrumental in having "business cards" printed for each of our Big Game ambassadors. Joe Wylie (great job Joe) took on the project of updating our Measurers List. Contacting and verifying addresses and those interested in continued service proved challenging. Even with "running" this list in our newsletter and on line, our response was minimal (31 confirming). When to SHOOT

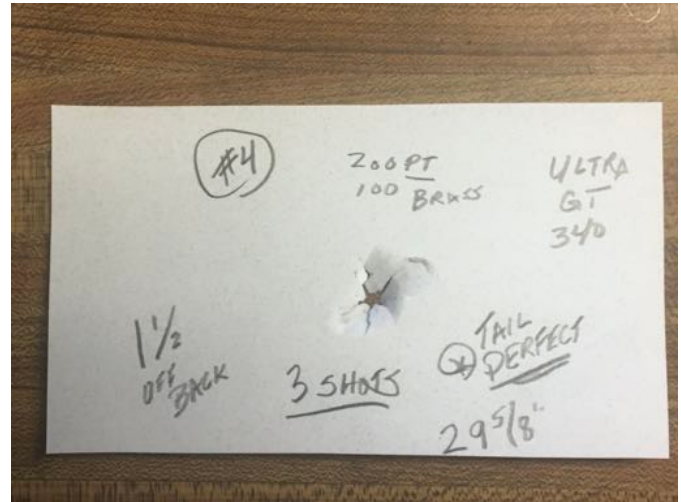

A small piece on the edge of the left velvet covered antler moved slowly behind the cherry brush. It had been several hours since the stalk had begun 500 yards distant. Even with the hot sun beating down and sweat trickling into and stinging the eyes; the focus remained entirely upon the huge rack 4 x 5 Mule Deer. Shoes removed and but two pair of wool socks for the feet, it was a silent approach. The coverless terrain had painstakingly taken several hours to traverse in order to avoid detection. Methodically moving, one knee taken, and the opposite extending and retracting for propulsion, ever so slowly quartering into the bedded buck - pausing for long periods of time between each move. Belly crawling, crab walking with bow on the stomach across the inverted hillside; every trick in the book had been used. At fifteen yards the obvious sounds of burping and regurgitation were apparent. By ten yards the natural sounds of gas being expelled were detected for the first time as the undulant chewed his cud.



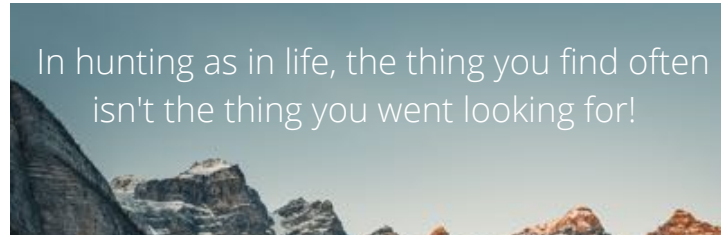
The hunter's eyes shifted slowly to the right where a six foot opening lead to the Rose-hip bush. As the buck rocked forward gaining his feet the downhill motion started towards the afternoon brunch. That was when the archer would release the drawn shaft shelved on the canted bow.



Last month we covered being prepared with your gear, doing everything possible to make sure you were ready for your hunt. Now that August is here many of us will be out in the field pursuing antelope or possibly mule deer in the coming weeks. By mid August and the 1st of September surely some hunters will be pursuing elk. Being ready for, and taking your shot at precisely the right moment in time are the current key issues. Perhaps you, like so many others have practice shooting when exhausted. You may have walked or even run around your property or climbed hills until your breathing was labored. Then you quickly retrieved an arrow from your quiver and loosed it at your intended target. Then again you may have worked until your back was tired, cutting weeds or splitting wood, again exhausted before clipping yourself into your harness and safety rope. You may have hoisted yourself up in the tree still gasping for air, secured your bow from the limb and drawn an arrow to its full length. After inhaling deeply you let the excessive air out slowly as your shoulder blades pinched tightly together and your anchor was reached and solid. Your arrow was on its way to the mark. You know your ability and your equipment. Again you are confident after hours and days of preparation, but when you decide to take that shot could mean the difference between bringing home the bacon and kicking rocks all the way down the lonesome hillside. When to Shoot from page 11- Knowing when to shoot could be the toughest decision a hunter makes. Once you've approached to your known accuracy range there are certain things that you watch for. The batting of an ear to run insects off or the slightest twitch of the tail left or right are signs of a calm animal. A relaxed animal with no adrenaline flowing is quickly harvested with an accurately placed arrow.



feeds, allow time for its head placement to be behind a bush, rock or tree so their eyes are concealed to the hunter. As the animal advances you are anticipating the shoulder blade to be forward more readily exposing the heart and lungs. Most often waiting for a broadside presentation or slightly quartering away shot will destroy the most vital organs. The animal briefly pauses and the arrow is away. Good luck and straight shooting this season.



On the other hand ears cupped forward or folded to the rear indicate the animal is listening for something that doesn't seem right or is aware of your position or presence. If you hear an approaching vehicle or airplane try to orchestrate your shot when noise is at it's loudest. The tricky part is knowing when to shoot, moving too soon can cost you the shot. Waiting too long can cost you a winter supply of venison. While preparing for your shot attempt to have the sun at your back and hidden by shade. Gingerly ease your bow into a vertical position with deliberately slow increments. Your bow must be one which allows you to smoothly hoist the string back without anymore increase in vertical plane until reaching full draw. Of course this type of retarded draw will show no signs of "bobble" making your motion less obvious; just as you wished. As your query

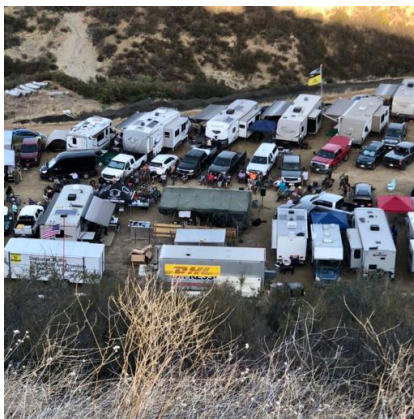
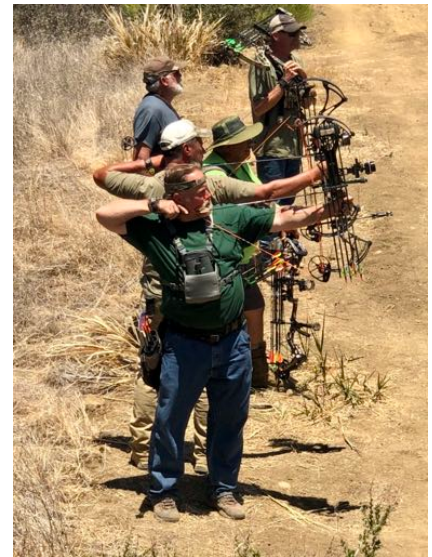

My Treestand Fall from page 7-

Our safety should never be taken for granted. Safety is our responsibility to ourselves and our families. I should have used a harness and Safety Equipment, but I didn't and I fell! I was lucky. As I stated above, the stand was strong, safe and I regularly climbed into it but that does not mean it is safe to climb a tree and get into a treestand without Safety Equipment! If you are going to hunt from an elevated treestand you need to invest some money into climbing gear such as... a complete "Hunter Safety Systems" which includes the Safety Harness, Life Line/ Safe-Line Treestand Safety System, Tree Strap, 2 Carabiners, Lineman's Rope, and Bow & Gear Hoist/cord. Most of the packaged Hunter Safety Systems come with a CD that will instruct you on how to use the equipment. Then learn how to use it and get comfortable with it on the ground, and then, at low heights near the bottom of the tree, before you start climbing trees during hunting season. Learn and use all safety precautions while hunting from treestands. Always place your climbing steps high enough so that you can step DOWN onto the platform and NOT up onto it. This will keep the treestand from being pushed away from you, flipping up and potentially ending in you falling.

There are lots of folks out there that do not agree with our way of life, and some are fanatic about it and will tamper with or destroy stands and equipment. It is always a good idea to look at your setup to see if anything looks like it has been tampered with and then look at and test all ropes, steps, and the stand as soon you can, prior to putting your full weight on them. My stand was strong and securely attached to the tree with lag bolts and screws so none of this should have happened. What blows me away



is to think that somebody would tamper with or sabotage this stand. The board came away from the tree with ease as though it was never attached, and the platform was not attached to the beam like it had been which allowed me to fall.

We as bow hunters need to be vigilant of our surroundings not only for animals that can hurt or eat us but for the possibility of tampering with or sabotaging our equipment by Anti-hunters, animal rights groups or simply people that do not like our way of life.

Bow Hunting is my way of life! Wildlife Conservation at its finest. Bow Hunters, stay safe so you can return to your families. Happy Hunting!

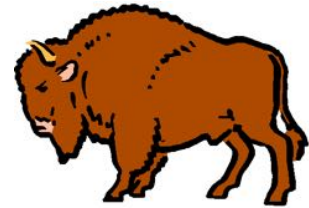

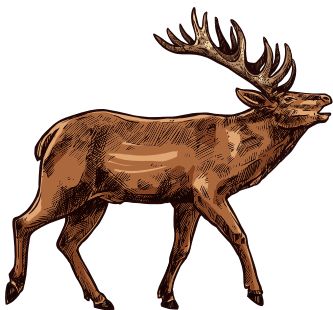
