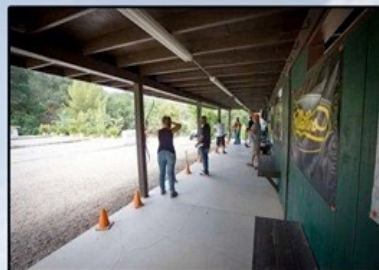

Countries Unite at the 8th NASP World Tournament

Orange County (Florida) Convention Center

Sunny Orlando, Fla. was the place to be last week as student archers from the United States and Canada came together for the National Archery in the Schools Program eighth world tournament. In the past, the world tournaments were held at ESPN's Wide World of Sports, and this year the Orange County Convention Center opened its doors on July 21-22 for the first time since NASP's inception to allow students, coaches, and families to participate and compete in this global event. Student archers, who received top honors in their national level competitions, showcased all the hard work and dedication they've invested throughout the year.

Participating students ranged from fourth grade through twelfth. Out of the 3,691 students registered to compete in the bulls-eye competition, 3,397 students participated. 1,247 youth were registered for the International Bowhunting Organizations 3D challenge, and 1,179 archers competed. There were no surprises as students shot utilizing the same competitive format used at the national tournaments. Each archer was given five practice arrows, followed by fifteen scored arrows, at each of two distances. They shot from ten and fifteen meter shooting lines, for a total of forty arrows per archer. Students used the same Genesis bows and Easton arrows, while shooting "bare-bow" style; using no stabilizers, sights, and release aids.

As the first whistle sounded, results started "flying" in. Beginning in the Elementary Division, fourth grader, Mathew Harper from Maysville Middle School in Ohio, received top honors with his score of 292. In the female category, fifth grader Caitlin Blair who attends Fairfield Christian Academy in Ohio shot a top score of 290.

In the Middle School Division, eighth grader Henry Thompson from Anderson County Middle School in Kentucky tied with Justin Miller, also an eighth grader from Hartland High School in Michigan with a score of 297. In the female category, another exciting tie between eighth grader Emmaline Kleinman who attends Crosby Middle School in Kentucky and Easter Swan, also an eighth grader from Meigs Middle School in Ohio. Both girls shot a 295. After a close tiebreaker, Henry Thompson and Easter Swan took top honors, with Justin and Emmaline achieving runner up.

In the High School Division, twelfth grader Chris Lingenfelter, who attends Sarcxie High School in Missouri, scored a 296, while in the female category, tenth grader Taylor Backus who attends Madison Consolidated High School in Indiana, scored a 295. Overall winners of the 2017 NASP world tournament were awarded to Henry Thompson and Easter Swan.

Of course we can't forget about NASP's companion event, the International Bowhunting Organization's 3D Challenge. Twelfth grader Cole Luburgh, who attends Philo High School in Ohio, shot a high score of 297 achieving overall male in the competition. Tabitha Way, who attends Carolina Warriors Homeschool Archery Team in South Carolina, shot a 294. She also earned top honors as overall female. Brooklyn Mays, a sophomore from Webster County High School in Dixon, Ky., was the female runner-up with a score of 293. Henry Thompson from Lawrenceburg, Ky. won the tie-breaker for runner-up against Michigan's Garet Fyke. Congratulations to the IBO/3D winners!

Ryan Bass, director of the IBO/3D challenge had some inspiring words about the event this year. "The 2017 World NASP/IBO 3D Tournament was a huge success as we saw a 5% increase in the number of NASP archers shooting 3D over the Myrtle Beach Worlds in 2016. We believe this can be accredited to NASP® and the IBO's efforts to bring the NASP/IBO 3D Challenge to more states by providing the resources necessary to hold state level tournaments."

Critical to the success of NASP's tournaments are the hard-working volunteers and sponsors who not only impart their time and efforts in providing a safe and enjoyable experience, but also provide the equipment needed to execute a successful event. According to NASP's VP and General Manager, Tommy Floyd, "The generosity and support from our many vendors as well as the representatives from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission made the event even more safe and special for participants."

Big thanks go to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission who officiated much of the tournament and provided numerous volunteers. Thank you to Easton Technical Products, Mathews Archery, Morrell, Rinehart, and Feradyne Outdoors, and Academy Sports + Outdoors for supporting another successful NASP event! "Events like this reflect our continued success and growth as an organization. I personally want to thank all those who volunteered, the city of Orlando, and the staff of the Orange County Convention Center," added Floyd.

By plane or by car, students are homeward bound, some already planning for the 2018 World Tournament to be held in Louisville, Kentucky June 7-9. Again, congratulations to all of the student archers for their hard work and accomplishments!

2017 World Police and Fire Games by Roy Brokaw

On August 11, 12, 13, 2017 I competed in the "2017 World Police and Fire Games" in Los Angeles, CA. You have to be an active duty or retired law enforcement representative or firefighter to compete in this competition. I was told there were eighty-eight shooters for the first days archery event and about the same for the other two days, although I think a few additional local shooters showed up for the last day's 3-D event. I saw competitors from several countries including, India, Hong Kong, Romania, Germany, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Russia, Canada, Australia, and the USA. I'm sure a few others countries were represented that I was unable to identify. The United States had the largest contingent followed by India who had around fifteen shooters and a coach.

I shot the three archery events which were conducted at the Conejo Valley Archers range located in Simi Valley, CA. On Friday the event was a '900 round' which is shooting at what most people would think of when they think of an archery target. A big circle with a gold center, followed by red, blue, black and white scoring rings. You shoot at this target with thirty arrows at each distance 60, 50, and 40 meters. Here in America we usually shoot at 60, 50, and 40 yards. The targets center is scored as ten points out to one point at the outer edge. That's why it's called a 900 round if you hit center with all ninety arrows you get 900 points. Believe me, nobody accomplished that task. Everyone stands in a long line and shoots together at the bank of targets. We actually started shooting at a little after ten in the morning and concluded at about two-thirty in the afternoon. It was very hot, about 88 degrees, and there was only limited shade. I think I consumed about six bottles of water. Anyway, at the end of the shoot I had walked away with the gold medal in my category 50+Traditional. I shoot a long bow like Robin Hood.

On Saturday was the 'Field Round'. In this event you are assigned with a group of shooters, a squad of three or more shooters, and you walk from target to target shooting at three different size targets depending on their distance.

Again this is a European type shoot and the targets are a little different from what we shoot here in the states, and instead of shooting four arrows at each target you only shoot three. The targets are a different color and scored differently. Six points for the very center down to one point at the outer edge. There were 28 targets in this event with a possible total score of 504 points.

Half of the targets were marked for yardage and half were unmarked requiring the shooter to do some distance guesstimating. You are not allowed to have a range finder and you cannot discuss the yardage with the other shooters otherwise you are disqualified. It was hot again, around ninety degrees, and I again consumed a lot of water. Although I shot against some rather talented archers I again prevailed and took home the gold in my category.

On Sunday was the 3-D shoot. This is my area of expertise and what I usually participate in. I'm not a target archer and don't enjoy shooting at circles on paper. I'm more interested in the hunting aspect of archery and the 3-D is more up my alley. In this event you are assigned to a squad and walk around the range shooting at foam replicas of various animal species. The targets were placed at various unknown distances along the course which required some hiking up and down uneven terrain and taking shots up and down hills at distances ranging from around ten yards up to fifty or more yards. Again the distances are not known so you have to use your range estimation skills, a talent that can take years to master if anyone ever does. I'm pretty good. As you can imagine a missed judgment by even a couple of yards can mean the difference between hitting and

missing the target. There were twenty-five targets shot at with only one arrow each and scored 11, 10, 8, 5. 11 points for the very center out to 5 points for a leg or nose. Horns, antlers and hooves don't score. The total possible score for this event was 275. This was the hottest day, around 92 degrees, and the shoot took between about two and half to four hours to complete depending on how fast your group shot and how slow the group in front of you was. A



lot of the people who shoot bows with adjustable sights can take a long time to take their shots. I don't want to sound repetitive but I again got lucky and pulled out a first place win. We often say on the range, "Even a blind squirrel occasionally finds a nut."

I really enjoyed the experience and meeting people from all around the world. It was interesting for me to see their varying skill levels and the type of equipment that they were using. It appears to me that most of these shooters are target archers with limited or no interest in the hunting aspect of the sport. Also many of them had a hard time dealing with the Southern California heat and the thought of running into a rattlesnake had several of them very concerned. No poisonous snakes in their countries I guess.

Legislative Report by Robert Moore

A California Fish and Game Commission meeting (CFG) were held August 16th in Sacramento. These are normally a 2 day meetings with mammal and inland fisheries on the first day and Marine on second day. Since FGC combined this meeting into a one day session and I have to take time of work to attend, I was able to give testimony on 2 items that relate to bowfishing. The agenda items of interest: 7. Authorize publication of notice of intent to amend sport fishing regulations (Sections 1.05, 1.11, 1.18, 1.61, 1.74, 2.10, 2.25, 5.35, 5.41, 5.88, 7.00, 7.50 and 8.00; repeal Section 1.60; and add Section 2.05; Title 14, CCR), section 2.25, we have been working with DFW on modifying this section to add catfish to the species list of allowable take. During discussions for this, the department wants to take a cautious approach to gauge what's the participation level and public response. Here is the DFW ISOR reading;

- Allow Bow and Arrow Fishing for Catfish: The bow and arrow fishing community has requested the opportunity to fish for catfish in certain waters in the state. This request was considered by Department law enforcement and regional biologists who determined that bowfishing could be allowed on waters with large carp populations and that are popular for bowfishing. Amend Section 2.25 to allow bowfishing for bullheads and catfish in the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta, Big Bear Lake in San Bernardino County, and Lake Isabella in Kern County.

Timeline for adoption includes discussion at next 2 FGC meetings, Oct. 11 & 12 in Atascadero and discussion/adoption December 6 & 7 in San Diego. If passed it would take effect for the 2018 season. 26. Marine petitions for regulation change from previous meetings (B) Action on pending regulation petitions referred to staff and the Department for review; 2, Petition #2016-020 to disallow bow and arrow and harpoon gear for recreational take of sharks and rays. This petition was submitted to FGC last year and was referred to DFW for evaluation and recommendation. I sent a letter to the Commission in opposition to the petition pointing out regulations already address the petitioners concerns. You can review the petition and other related documents to the meeting here <https://nrm.dfg.ca.gov/FileHandler.ashx?DocumentID=148231&inline> Success, the Commission followed DFW recommendation and denied the petition.

Agenda item 19. Authorize publication of notice of intent to amend recreational abalone regulations (Section 29.15, Title 14, CCR). I am mentioning this agenda item in the context of recreationally take of species within the guidelines of laws and regulations. Abalone populations have been declining and through a series of laws such as the Marine Land Protection Act (MLPA) and Abalone Recovery Management Plan (ARMP) regulations were enacted to protect species populations. For the sake of the length of this article let's just say controversy over science and politics continues. Bottom line; through those laws and regulations and mainly rapid changes in marine habitat along the north coast, supposedly populations have reached critical levels and DFW is recommending closure for the 2018 season. This is only a recommendation to FGC.

DFW has been working on updates to their Big Game Management plans. The elk plan is on its final review within DFW and deer, antelope, sheep and bear in the process. Let's hope these plans work to keep populations sustainable.

The next Wildlife Resources Committee meeting will be held September 13 in Riverside. Agenda items 3. Identify and discuss initial recommendations for 2018-19 upland game bird regulations 4. Discuss and approve recommendations for 2018-19 regulations: (A) Mammal hunting (B) Waterfowl hunting (C) Central Valley Chinook salmon sport fishing (D) Klamath River sport fishing 5. Discuss and possible recommendation for phase 2 falconry regulation change options and potential timing 6. Discuss and possible recommendation for wild pig management proposal 7. Predator Policy Workgroup (A) Predator Policy Workgroup member presentations on draft terrestrial predator policy and regulatory proposals (B) Discuss and possible recommendation for terrestrial predator policy and regulatory proposals 8. Delta Fisheries Forum (A) Staff report on Delta Fisheries Forum (B) Discuss and possible recommendation for next steps

9. Future agenda items (A) Review work plan agenda topics and timeline (B) Potential new agenda topics for FGC consideration.

Advanced Bowhunting Clinic By Robert Moore

Zachary, the youngest, was working the trail looking for clues as instructor Robert Williams was offering guidance. Prior evidence projected the animals path may have crossed the creek and the students were looking for blood to verify that possibility. A drop of blood was found on a blade of grass, another on the side of a rock that was tough to find. Students were following many clues to locate a downed buck as part of 4 exercises to further educate bowhunters. For several years the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) Advanced Hunter Education Coordinator Alan Gregory has been asking for an Advanced Bowhunter Clinic. The class would offer more hands on and specific instruction that the standard International Bowhunter Education Program (IBEP) doesn't have. State IBEP Chairman Johnnie Waddles, Robert Williams, Robert Moore and Wildlife Officer Mike Pascoe sat down to establish a class outline with certain goals to meet. The class needed to be an "advanced" class covering more information and hands on than the standard IBEP class. Content was divided up into 4 separate modules that included, Elevated stands, Ground Blinds, Spot and Stalk and Trailing/Recovery. The 16 students were divided in half and were led by the instructors to an area to start the clinic. (Continued next page)

Three types of tree stands were put up so the students could learn placement, advantage/disadvantage and safety. Several full body safety harnesses were available and used to climb into a ladder stand for shooting. Willing students were sized for a correct fall restraint harness and used the safety rope to climb up and secure themselves into the stand. Bows were pulled up with a haul line with the emphasis on how not to lose arrows from the quiver. A 3D target was set out so the students could shoot from the stand in a sitting and standing positions. Several ground blinds were set up that included a basic netting concealment type to manufactured pop-up blinds. The instructor discussed advantage/disadvantage with each type and placement location options. Several stools and chairs were available so the students could test them and then choose which one to put in a blind for the shooting option. A 3D target was placed for the students to shoot while sitting in a blind.

A total of eight 3D targets were strategically placed on the property for the Spot and Stalk module. Students could bring their spotting scopes and binoculars or several were available for them to try including tripods. Each student had a list of animals to locate within a certain area. Students had to look for antlers, ears, and legs etc., a few were easy and some were difficult. One target had to be located and a plan organized and utilized to stalk within shooting range. Instructors discussed how to use terrain, watching the wind and noise reduction to get close. The trailing/recovery module started from the animal that was stalked. A blood trail was laid out with other clues so the students could track the animal to its final resting place. Rolled rocks, disturbed dirt, broken branches, blood splatter, drops of blood etc. were all on the trail.

Once the animal was found tagging requirements were discussed along with photo options, gutting options, bone out, game bags, meat care, cooling and transportation.

The final hour of the class was a question and answer session with Wildlife Officer Mike Pascoe of the California DFW. Mike led discussions on California regulations including legal requirements for game taken out of state and transported into California.
