Eighty-Three Years Behind the Bow

Archery has been a significant part of the 92 years of my life, in fact, 83 years of it since I shot my first Ben Pearson arrow from a lemonwood bow. Starting with hunting ground squirrels and rabbits in the hills and canyons in San Diego, an odyssey in this sport begin.



My self education - or self destruction - of the fine points of archery continued until about 1940 when, while roaming the forest of Balboa Park in San Diego, I discovered a band of archers engaged in battle with black and white targets attached to straw bales. This turned out to be my introduction to organized archery or, the San Diego Field Archers.

A few weeks later I returned to the site of the battle armed with my trusty lemonwood bow and remaining four Ben Pearson arrows ready to join the fray. However, I was informed that all warriors - no matter how enthusiastic must meet certain qualifications. So, these kind people set me up with my own target, out of the way, for my own good and theirs. This is when my appreciation of the sport of archery and the exceptional people involved begin. Even though I was just a little squirt showing up from nowhere they welcomed me with open arms . They soon became aware that my equipment and shooting form were not up to the high standards of my enthusiasm. Thus began years of tutelage and friendship with the extraordinary citizens of the archery nation.

The first thing I learned was how much I did not know. My newfound archery friends were generous with their time and patient in teaching me the basic archery rules and proper form. Continued on page 6

SB1487 (Stern) Iconic African Species Protection Act would enact the Iconic African Species Protection Act and would prohibit the possession of any part, product, offspring, or dead body of African elephant, African lion, leopard, black rhinoceros, white rhinoceros, giraffe, Jentink's duiker, plains zebra, mountain zebra, hippopotamus, and/or striped hyena, Vetoed

DFW has hired Jen Bennet (Cordaro) for the departments R3 coordinator position. Recruit, Retain and Reactivate (R3) hunters and anglers. DFW and conservation groups have been meeting for several months to organize a plan for implementation. A meeting held October 25th DFW presented a first draft on the main overall (macro) plan review and discussion. DFW is not reinventing the wheel for this but has researched out what other states have done and are doing (best practices) under a national R3 effort. Once this has been finalized then micro plans will be developed. These micro plans will be "on the ground work" such as media visibility for promotion, reaching out to HEI graduates that may have not bought a license yet, Share program utilization etc. CBHSAA is recognized as leader in the bowhunting and archery community so the question is How and What are we going to do in the R3 effort?



Of course patience and form can only go so far until it becomes obvious the equipment is a factor contributing to one's shooting ability. With my mentor's guidance and donation of some used arrows and a beautiful previously owned yew wood recurve bow backed with sinew (circa 1929), my arrows begin to group on the target bale instead of the surrounding hillsides. I was not even a member of the club yet so I reckoned it was about time I joined. I scratched up enough moola to pay my dues and became a proud member of the San Diego Field Archers.

My shooting improved thanks to the encouragement of all the club members, especially Frank Eicholtz who was president of the club. However, my archery adventure was interrupted when I graduated from high school in 1944 and received an invitation from the US Government offering an all expense paid trip to see the world. I could not refuse. I landed on Luzon in the Philippines just as the war was ending. From there my outfit was shipped to South Korea where I had the opportunity to observe an archery tournament and was impressed with the ritual performed with each four foot arrow shot from their six foot bamboo bows. If we went through the same ritual it would take over a week to complete a 28 target field round.

When discharged from the army I re-upped in the San Diego Field Archers with new equipment and was shooting better than when I left. I started shooting top NFAA mail tournament scores. Frank Eicholtz gave me a custom made bow and Hugh Rich provided me with 2018, 31 inch, Easton aluminum arrows. I placed second to Dr. Erwin Pletcher in the 1947 California State Field tournament. I could not afford attend the 1947 National Field tournament in Salt Lake City but that was soon remedied by generous club members who took up a collection to help cover my expenses. In addition, club members Mart and Beda Mathews provided the transportation. I placed second -again- to Doc Pletcher. A few years later I paid back the loan, but I have never forgotten the kindness of those very special people.

1948 was a very eventful year for me. I field tested several of Frank Eicholtz fiberglass backed bows that Frank wanted tested under my 60 pound, 31 inch draw. The final results ended up in one of the finest bows I have ever owned. I had the privilege of making friends and shooting the bow with what I believe to be the icons of California's distinguished archers including Frank, Hugh Rich, Doc Pletcher, Roy Hoff, Stew Foster, Babe Bitzenburger, Doug Easton, Lucille Shine, Nubie Pate, Tom Jennings, Cap Gregory, Rube Powell, Larry Hughes, and many others who selflessly shared their wisdom in trying to help me become a better archer and respectable competitor. I sometimes became very upset with myself when not shooting well. I learned it certainly did not improve my shooting or my reputation, but only reflected immaturity. Continued on page 8

In 1948 I won the California State Field Championship in Visalia. I was now ready for the NFAA National tournament. This time I had enough \$ (without a loan) to purchase my Greyhound bus ticket from San Diego, across country, to Two Rivers, Wisconsin. The trip proved a little exciting halfway across the country when I transferred buses. They were transferring some of the passengers luggage -including mine- into another bus which I was to take onto Two Rivers. While watching them make the transfer I did not see my suitcase or archery equipment. I cornered one of the guys in a Greyhound bus uniform and expressed my concern. To make a long story short, we found my stuff in a pile to be loaded on another bus. I figured, from that point on, Someone from above was watching over me and the rest of my journey was going to be successful.

The field archery ranges in Two Rivers were beautiful. They were set up in the forest and partly along the shores of Lake Michigan with a wind that presented a challenge on the long targets. I met, shot with, and made new friends I will never forget. I not only had a memorable experience, but I won the national championship. I do not even remember the bus trip home. I was one happy 22 year kid floating home on cloud nine. Shortly after returning from Two Rivers, Frank Eicholtz suggested I should take advantage of my championship and consider giving archery exhibitions to promote the sport of archery.

I thought it was a good idea so I involved my younger brother, Bob, who was a pretty good sharp shooter and a better bowhunter than me. We put our act together, fine tuned it with Frank's help, and started giving exhibitions in the San Diego area. A talent agent saw our act and got us bookings in a local nightclub, in the Pasadena Auditorium, a TV appearance and a movie short filmed in Griffith Park.

Hugh Rich then steered us onto a talent agency in Los Angeles, National School Assemblies. They scheduled lyceum type programs in schools, colleges and city clubs such as Lions, YMCA, and similar organizations throughout the United States. They wanted an entertaining and educational program of about one hour. Bob and I put a program together consisting of trick and precision shooting, the history of archery, the equipment, the art of shooting, bow hunting, archery organizations and clubs, and the various target rounds and tournaments. We auditioned and signed a contract to tour the country for three years.

In those three years we performed in all but eight states sometimes giving two or three performances a day miles apart. We met hundreds of archers who invited us into their homes, fed us and became our friends. We learned, for sure, archers are very special people. Those three years were years of positive growth for me learning to appreciate the great country in which we live and meeting the people who make it so.

Whether we were stuck in a blizzard in Utah, had a flat tire in Oklahoma, out of gas in Connecticut, or just plain lost anywhere, there was always someone to offer help. I could write a book just about those three years.

I decided it was time to settle down, finish my education on the GI Bill and think about raising a family. Bob continued touring the country with his wife, Gerrie, for one year until he received an invitation from Uncle Sam to join the army and help quell a little "dust up" in Korea. (Bob actually went on a night patrol with bow and arrow backed up by six guys with automatic fire power.) I finished my education with a BS from San Diego State and an MBA from Pepperdine University, married a gal from La Jolla, helped raise three sons, and ended up- so far- with eight grandchildren and one great.

I won the California State Field Championship in 1950 and 1951. In 1982 I was inducted into the California Archery Hall of Fame and later served on the CAHF board for about six years, three years as chair. In 1991 I won the State Field Traditional Championship and in 1990, 91, 92 and 93 I won the State Indoor Traditional Indoor Championships.

Archery has been a significant part of 83 of the 92 years of my life. A famous US General said "Old soldiers never die, they just fade away." Old archers never die. The medals get dusty, the trophies get tarnished, the bowstring becomes frayed and the limbs get creaky, but the treasured memories of the friends made and exciting times of 83 years behind the bow are indelible and never fade away.

2018 Traditional Rendezvous at Rancho Neblina By Richard Barron

This past weekend, September 29-30 Rancho Neblina held its annual 3D trad shoot, I and a few other PRA members attended the shoot.

Rancho Neblina is one of my favorite 3D shoots, yes its a bit of a drive to Petaluma and across the some what scary San Rafael- Richmond bridge to the other side of the bay, but it is a beautiful area.

Rancho Neblina, in Two Rock Valley, is just west of Petaluma CA. You take Bodega Road west from Petaluma. (Bodega Bay is where Alfred Hitchcock filmed the movie "The Birds"). Two Rock Valley is farm land, actually cattle land. Rolling hills with oak woodland forests, it's beautiful California landscape, it's a throw back in time to images of "early California". Things in Two Rock Valley haven't changed as fast as in Los Angeles in the last 100 years.



But I have to say, Rancho Neblina is worth the drive. It's 600 acres of "sound of music" rolling hills, pastures and wooded areas. It's a two day shoot, with 3 - 20 target 3D archery courses. You shoot 40 on Saturday and 20 Sunday. Targets are set up in natural settings and well placed, unmarked yardage. They have a few novelty targets , which are fun. There is a lot of walking in the hills and after 40 targets, I was more than ready for a beer. They also have an unusual couple of targets set up, a "Par 2 Target". The target (a large buffalo or elk) is set out about 200+ yards in the field (long distance), the archer has 2 shots to make the target, but you can not go past the target, if you do, you score zero. You shoot the first shot as far as it can go, then go for the target on the second shot, it's a "par 3" for women archers.

The shoot is two arrows, and scored 10 and 8. What I would normally call the "8" ring is now the "10" score and what would normally be a "5" is now an "8". It's a little odd, but makes for faster scoring and higher scores. Continued on page 9

The "holes" (3 D target) are set up from 302 yards, par 4 to a 128 yard par 3. They have a flag at the target so you can see where you need to shoot and the pasture grass is mowed to create a "fairway". It's very fun to see how far you can send an arrow down a fairway. I was able to shoot 5 under par ! Its VERY fun!


