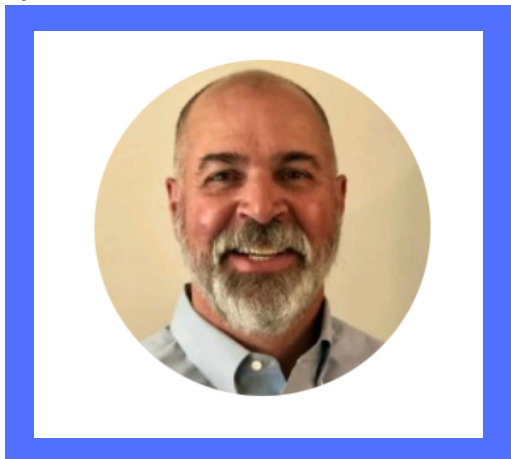

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Quick update from the front office. March and April were definitely challenging months. We had a number of important shoots and several legislative activities going on. I continue to teach a lot of Hunter Education here in California. I have had 2 classes since last newsletter and both have been pretty well attended. I want to really encourage everyone to get out and get your kids enrolled in a hunter education class near you.

Statistics show we are continuing to see a precipitous decline in hunting in the United States and it's very disturbing. [See article later in this newsletter.] Even though the Federal and the State governments are applying a lot of funding and resources toward getting people outdoors and enjoying our natural resources. We know there is no better way than hunting and fishing.

All of us, myself included, are guilty of too much doom scrolling on cell phones and computers. Desk jobs will do that to you.

Getting outside and marching around the woods is a great stress reliever and who knows... you might just find something to shoot? Get a hunting license this year! What could possibly go wrong?

As some of you may know, I am now a NFAA National Level Archery Judge. Yep, that and \$3.15 will get you the proverbial cup of coffee. I was asked to work the Vegas shoot this year and it was certainly a nice opportunity to give back a little. For anyone considering the challenge please do know that it is a lot of work, but certainly rewarding. Vegas shoot attendance was a little smaller than was expected, but still a very competitive shoot. All the top shooters were there and I'm sure a great time was had by all.

There was plenty of great scores along with a great vendor area and entertainment for everyone. The Vegas shoot will be a little earlier in 2027, March 11-14, so be prepared. While you are at it, mark your calendars for 2028, it will be March 9-12. I know the shoot is expensive, but I think most would agree that its worth the money. See you there in 2027!

The Legislative department has been very busy in 2026, and its not getting any easier. Our lawsuit against the department concerning Catalina deer is progressing. At this point there is not much to report. As previously stated, our goal is just to get the department to go thru the proper CEQA process before making a decision to eradicate an entire herd of deer in our state.

Mule Deer are precious resource and should be considered as such. Hopefully they start seeing things our way. AB1912 appears to be progressing well. [[AB 1912](#) (2025-2026) is a California bill introduced in February 2026 that would allow individuals to carry concealed firearms while hunting deer with a bow and arrow during archery season. It amends existing law to permit this for self-defense.] It has made it out of both committees. One was a unanimous vote and the other was done on consent. Both of these are good signs. Did You Know?

New State Awards!!!

The Quintuple State Tournament Award – This award shall be awarded to the archer who wins 5 State Championship Titles within a 12 month period. This will need to be done in the same division and shooting style (e.g. gender, age class and bow/arrow style). The archer must win the “Champion” title in each of the following; Indoor, Field, Target, Marked 3D & Unmarked 3D.

The Trifecta Paper and 3D Tournament Awards – This award shall be awarded to the archer who wins three Paper or three 3D State Championship Titles within a 12 month period. This will need to be done in the same division and shooting style (e.g. gender, age class and bow/arrow style) except for the State Broadhead and State Traditional. The archer must win the “Champion” title in each of the following;

A. Trifecta Paper Tournament Award – Indoor, Field, Target

B. Trifecta 3D Tournament Award #1 – Broadhead, Marked 3D & Unmarked 3D

C. Trifecta 3D Tournament Award #2 – Traditional, Marked 3D & Unmarked 3D

Cubs are not eligible for the Trifecta Award #1 because they do not compete at the Broadhead. These awards will be presented at the CBH/SAA Annual Banquet. You will be notified if you are to receive an award. If you believe that you qualify for any of these awards, please reach out to the CBH/SAA Secretary for confirmation.

These new awards began with the 2024 State Broadhead, going forward.

A BIG GAME MEASURER’S Clinic is scheduled in Redding on the weekend of **July 18 and 19, 2026** at Straight Arrow Bow Hunters. Sign up today! Please let us know if you are interested and committed to attending this clinic. We need a minimum number of confirmed participants **by June 1st.**

Learn how to score, complete a Big Game application and get the game submitted to the CBH/SAA Big Game Club. Learn how to score for other people and submit their game. Where Does Bowhunting Stand in California?

For generations, hunting has been woven into American life. It has meant early mornings in the cold, stories passed from grandparents to kids, freezers filled for winter, and a deep connection to the land. For some families, it is tradition. For others, it is food, wildlife stewardship, or simply a way of life that feels honest and grounded. But across the United States, hunting has been losing ground. Statistics show the hunting crowd is getting older. Fewer newcomers are sticking around. And in California, every draw season seems to remind us that good opportunity is either getting harder to reach or harder to understand.

The national numbers back that up, too. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reported that 14.4 million Americans age 16 and older hunted in 2022, and hunters spent \$45.2 billion that year. That is still a big footprint. The Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation says paid hunting license holders made up 6.87% of the U.S. population in 1980.

IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT

In Pursuit of the Elusive California Gray Fox

Have you ever been told, “Foxes are easy to shoot?” Well, I have too! I have been working on my CBH/SAA Small Game Club “Triple Golden Eagle Award,” for several years now. That is 75 small game species. In this pursuit, I’ve wanted to get a fox... just one little fox... one... a little California Gray Fox to add to my small game species list. I have had some close encounters with the little nervous critters but for one reason

or another I could not connect until Wednesday, February 25th, 2026, at 2:15pm. You may ask why I’m so specific on the day, date, and time? Well, it has been a 5-year challenge, and here is that history....

Meet Jake Ashbaugh. He is one of my friends that has told me several times that shooting a fox is easy... Jake is my good friend, my hunting buddy, my bowfishing buddy, and the only guy I know who has shot and recovered 139 coyotes with his bow.

Jake has devoted several of his trips to taking me fox hunting, over the last 5 years, in pursuit of this little critter. He is a multi-faceted varmint caller who knows where to go and where to station his hunters, so they have a good opportunity to shoot the target animal as they come to his calling.

Oh, and just so you know, all of my other SoCal hunting buddies have also said, “Fox hunting is easy. We see them everywhere we go hunting and they just stand there and look at you. They walk up to us all the time when we do a mouth squeak. They are stupid little critters. You will get your fox on the first trip out.” I knew I could hang my bow on those great words of encouragement, and I would soon add a fox to my official small game list!

However, in reality, this is NOT THE CASE!! The following are just some of the memorable moments of this pursuit.

It all started when I took Darick Roney to the CBH/SAA Small Game Club, Elk Horn Slough, “Shark Tournament” on July 9th, 2016. Burt Malech, the Small Game Club Chairman at the time, hosted the event. Darick got a Thornback Ray and a big Shovelnose Ray (AKA Banjo Fish / Guitarfish, or whatever else you want to call them) added to his small game list.

On the way back to SoCal Darick suggested we stop off at the “pig ranch” south of Stockton, CA. His good friend, Jake Ashbaugh, along with Bradly Grap and others were hunting pigs and Blacktail Deer there. So, we did, and that began another lifelong friendship, this time with Jake. We have been hunting and bowfishing together ever since.

Jake knew I needed a couple of small game species to reach the BIG 50 milestone which would allow me to receive the coveted, Small Game Club, Double Golden Eagle Award.

Jake also knew I didn’t have a badger, so he suggested that we go to the pig ranch and get one. And shortly after, I got my badger. He has since been instrumental in helping me add

From page 9 California Gray Fox continued- other species to my small game list like the Song Dog—AKA coyote, yellowfin croaker, and pack rat, to name a few. Every time we have gone out for a specific species, he has been successful in putting me on the target animal and I have been successful. Well, there were a couple of exceptions!

A bobcat was on my list for the CBH/SAA Big Game Record Book, and we knew the season for bobcat was going to close for a few years. On December 31st of 2019, the last day it was legal to hunt bobcats due to the season being put on hold by the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW), Jake got us set up and started calling. The big “tom” came to the call, in stealth mode, making its way through the timber on my right. I was getting fired up and a little shaky as I watched it come toward me. At twenty-five yards the cat did a stage right and walked away from me, disappearing into the thick timber. Then he reappeared in a clearing forty yards away. Still dealing with the excitement and some shakes, I shot and missed.

An hour later Jake had me at another good place and I watched a smaller cat across thirty yards of open, two-inch-tall grass, and stopped in front of me, at twenty yards. I drew my bow without the cat seeing me and loosed my arrow at a sure kill. I was in disbelief as I watched my arrow sail right over its back. I missed two cats on the same day an hour apart!!! Two cats, within an hour, is just unheard of!! And Jake has not allowed me to forget these two misses, nor will he... EVER!! LOL

With bobcat hunting over, while Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) completes the mandatory five year bobcat study, we turned to hunting “song dogs” and the California Gray Fox.

Now that I am living between Arizona and California, our hunting and bowfishing trips are fewer and farther between. Most often they are spontaneous trips, so just in case I come prepared. Depending on what time of year it is, I will take my hunting bow, or bowfishing bow, or both, with me on my trips to California. Continued on the next page.

January 2021: Jake and I planned for a fox hunt the next time I was in California which would be in January. I arrived in California and spent some much-needed time with my family then Jake and I settled on a date for the hunt. We drove to an area where in the past, Jake had seen fox while hunting deer. We parked and sat in the truck until it was legal shooting time. Jake had me take a position where I would have a close shot if a fox approached from the dense cover to investigate the sound of Jake's mouth calling. His call sounded impressive and sure enough, two of the little critters popped out forty yards away. I saw movement in the early light as Jake slowly pointed at them. I raised my bow pending my draw. At fifteen yards I drew my bow, got my anchor point, and looked through the peep sight. I could not see my target. I moved my head to the left of my peep so I could see the fox and then back to the peep sight. Nothing!! I could see nothing through my peep sight!! Both foxes realized there was something not right about this situation, and boogied back into the brush and disappeared. Jake said, "Why didn't you shoot?" I just shook my head in disappointment and said... "I couldn't see the fox in my peep!"

This is a frequent problem while using a peep sight in low light situations. The ¼ inch peep that I use allows a small amount of light to pass through hole and strike the eye retina but in this case, it didn't allow enough light for these old eyes to see what I was supposed to aim at. We jumped back into the truck and went to several other areas only to be disappointed that NOTHING came to the call.

February 2022: We planned another fox hunt in February. This is one of the months that I am typically in SoCal. It was a cold twenty five

degree morning when we reached the parking area in the Angeles Mountains. We parked the truck and started our hike up an old, closed, two track road. Jake and I have hiked many hills and flats, so he was not used to my newly developed shortness of breath that I battle. As we hiked up the road he would stop and let me catch my breath for a couple of minutes then we would go another eighty or so yards, and rest. We finally got to the area that he had in mind. He had me sit on the side-hill of the canyon, and he assumed a position a few yards away. Within seconds after he began calling, a fox came bounding out of the brush in the creek bottom about sixty yards away and stopped at thirty yards. Well, he didn't exactly stop, He bounced, spun, turned, and ran to his left and then to his right. So "stopped" really isn't the correct term to use. Soon he realized things smelled fishy, and not the good kind of fishy, and he made a departure to my left. I had not ranged that area with my rangefinder, so I had to guess the distance, and guess which pin I needed to use. I had drawn my bow when he first came to Jake's call, so I was following him with my bow as he moved here and there. Finally, he stopped, I estimated the distance to be twenty five-yards. I watched my arrow hit the ground right below his chest. The walk back to the truck was a welcomed downhill, easy, nonstop hike. Jake didn't have to wait for me on the march out. I am really, really, good at downhill hikes! LOL Jake had another spot in mind, so off we went. We got set up and Jake started calling. Continued on next page.

From page 11- Jake had been calling for about a minute when he stopped and got up. This was unusual as he normally called for about 10 minutes at a time. I looked at him and he said, "Did you hear that fox on my left?" I said, "no." He said, "One came in and was just a few feet from him when the fox smelled us. He was not happy and started hissing and growling." Back at the truck we decided to convert the fox hunt to a coyote hunt. At the first stop, as we were walking into the area, he saw a pack rat. He said... "Hey, do you have a Pack Rat?" I said, "Nope!"



The day ended up being very successful as I was able to add another species to my list. However, that success came with a price. I destroyed three \$25 arrows in the process. Sometimes ya gotta forget about the cost, roll with it, and laugh at it all!! LOL

February 2023: while at the CBH/SAA Annual Meeting, during the Saturday night Banquet, Jake asked me if I wanted to go fox hunting the following morning. I said absolutely! My alarm went off at 4am and that was way too early for me because I had gotten to bed after 1AM, but that "little easy to get fox" was calling me. We hopped into Jake's new Toyota truck and off we went. We were heading to

an area that had been snowing on and off for the previous twenty-four hours. The higher up on the mountain we drove the deeper the snow got. When we got to the dirt road that we were going to take, we found the snowplows had plowed a wall of snow four feet high and several feet deep blocking all access to the road. Jake said, "No problem, we will go down into the flats. I know some spots down there." Half an hour later found us in the lower area and the snow was only about four inches deep.

Soon, the sun broke through the clouds, and it became a bright sunny day, and the snow was melting quickly. We followed a road that was on a ridge, then it dropped into a gentle downward slope. As we continued down, the ground became visible due to the snow melting, and we could see water from the snow creating little riverets. Jake said, "I don't think I should go any further because it looks like it is getting soft." So, he stopped. The truck immediately sank into the mud up to the frame. Continued on the next page.



From page 12 - We worked for a couple of hours trying to get the truck unstuck to no avail. Jake called Darick Roney to see if he could come pull us out. Darick was not available, but he said his brother Dylan might be. About forty minutes later, Jake walked up the road to the top of the hill and met Dylan. Dylan and Jake came within twenty yards of the stuck truck, and his truck sank to the frame. Now we had two trucks stuck out in the middle of nowhere! Darick was finally available just before dark, picked us up and took us back to his house for the night. The following day, Dylan had a friend come and was able to pull his truck out. Jake's truck wasn't rescued for another 7 days because his brake line was broken. We were all worried that the truck would be vandalized but it wasn't. It was rescued then by the "Off Road Towing Company."

February 2024: Jake and I scheduled another hunt. At the second stand, Jake started calling. The sound of Jake's call had barely reached the timber and brush in the dry creek bed when six little critters came rushing toward Jake. I swear I was watching a popcorn machine at a movie theater, as they bounced and darted all around!!! I didn't know which one to keep an eye on.

Several seconds into this circus I saw one stop about twenty yards in front of me. I drew my bow and squeezed the trigger on my release to make that perfect shot. Except the fox was closer than I thought so my arrow sailed over its back and slammed into the rocky creek bottom shattering into hundreds of pieces! The popcorn-popping foxes stopped for a second then resumed bouncing from one place to another. Finally, one stopped close to where the previous one had stopped, only this one was standing on a root ball the size of a soccer ball.

I drew my bow, got my anchor point, looked through my peep sight. I lowered my twenty-yard pin just a little and squeezed the trigger. I heard the distinct sound of a perfect hit. The fox bounced around, going here and there but never acted like it was hit. I was confused as I continued watching it. Then all of them melted back into the thick brush to never be seen again.

I was still in a daze when Jake came over. My brain was incapable of comprehending what just happened! Jake said... "I got all of that on video and you made a perfect shot. But what are you going to do with the root-ball you shot?" I glanced towards the root ball and yep, I center-punched it! The fox was farther than I thought.

Foiled again and another \$50 down the tube for not! One would think this was a total loss, but not Jake. He had video evidence proving I messed up again! Having a video pleased him to no end. He now had another faux pas of mine that he could share with ALL OF OUR FRINDS!! Also, every so often, he sends it to me just to remind me of that crappy, perfectly missed shot. God only knows why I love this guy like a brother! LOL

February 2025: In pursuit of the fox again, we called at several, separate locations on the mountain, and nothing wanted to come play with us. Jake suggested returning to a spot where we had called first thing that morning. He parked the truck and we walked a couple of hundred yards into the canyon and set up. He had me sitting on the hillside just above an old two track road. He started calling, and about one hundred yards up the creek to my left, I saw a beautiful fox trotting toward us. The sun was glistening off its tail and back as it weaved around boulders, clumps of grass and weeds. Continued on hte next page.

From page 13- It was not in a hurry, but it did have food on its mind. In front of me and below the road was a tall stand of thick willows. When the fox was thirty-five yards from me, he entered the willows and disappeared.

Jake was just a few yards to my left, so I kept looking for it to come up the bank, on Jake's side. Once on the road, it would be about fifteen yards from me. However, the fox had other ideas and wanted to know what was in the neighborhood, so while still in the willows, it went just past me a little, putting it downwind from us. Out of the corner of my right eye, I caught some movement in front and a little to the right. I turned my eyes in that direction, and at ten yards, I could see that fox's face. It was level with the surface of the road and was looking directly into my eyes. I swear he had a little paw up and was flipping me off. BUSTED!!!

February 2026: This year rolled around and Jake and I again made plans to go fox hunting during the week before the annual CBH/SAA Meeting. I got to his house at 5am. We spent the morning going to the normal fox haunts where we had seen fox before. But we were foiled at every one of the spots. It was 1pm and we were both discouraged. Jake asked me what I wanted to do and I said, "I think we should go call in a coyote." So off we went and called at two different spots. We had a coyote come in and circle around on Jake's side, downwind. Jake took a long shot that cost him \$25. After looking for his arrow for twenty minutes we gave up and headed back to the truck. Jake said, "Let's go back to where you got flipped off by that fox last year."

Jake parked the truck and we walked a couple hundred yards up that same canyon and I set up on the hillside above the old two track

road. Jake was to my right and he started calling. From the top of the canyon wall, in front of me, about two hundred yards away, I saw a fox bounding down the hill at breakneck speed. It closed the distance to twenty-five yards in about 10 seconds. It stopped and was looking to my right, towards Jake. I raised my bow and split my 20 and 30 yard pins and released my arrow. I watched my arrow slam into the rocky creek bottom just beyond it. My arrow was destroyed. Jake and I both thought I hit it due to its reaction. But as we watched it, we realized that I hadn't hit this little critter. The fletching of my arrow must have touched his back and that is what caused it to react like it was hit.

For the next two minutes we watched this little nervous critter run sixty yards across the creek bottom to the base of the hillside from which it came, and then come back to Jake's calls. It did this several times but would never stop long enough, or close enough, for me to get a shot off. Then from across the creek and to our right Jake saw another fox come running down the hill and was heading toward the first fox in the bottom of the creek. The second fox was a big male, and he ran up to the other fox, boxed it in the face about five times with its front feet, forcing it to retreat to about twenty yards. The male was standing, looking in Jake's direction. I drew my bow and sent an arrow on its way. There was no mistaking whether I hit it or not. It spun and ran five yards, and it was all over within 10 seconds.

Finally, I had my fox!!! Jake and I did a happy dance as I had a big, beautiful California Gray Fox, and...

Hunting Decline from page 7 That compared with about 4.8% in 2021. More recently, national hunting license sales across 47 states were down 0.3% in 2023 from 2022. Hunting is not disappearing, but it is taking up less space in American life than it used to.

California is moving in that same direction. According to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, the state issued 254,491 hunting licenses in 2024, down from 261,048 in 2023. Resident annual hunting licenses fell from 222,679 to 216,600. Deer tags dipped from 185,997 to 183,348. Duck validations dropped from 63,510 to 61,081, and upland game bird validations declined from 136,652 to 133,868. None of that is dramatic on its own. Put together, though, it paints a clear picture.

If you only look at overall hunting decline, you miss the fact that California archery demand is still very real. [But you already know that!] CDFW's 2024 area-specific archery drawing statistics show several hunts with far more applicants than tags. Just a few examples: Bass Hill Archery (A26) had 30 tags and 488 first-choice applicants. Zone X6A (A11) had 50 tags and 340 first-choice applicants. Zone X9A (A16) had 30 tags and 324 first-choice applicants. Zone X1 (A3) had 100 tags and 313 first-choice applicants. This data is a sign that bowhunters are still showing up, still applying, and still hungry for quality opportunities.

At the same time, the newer faces coming into hunting are not always who people expect. A 2024 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service report found that women make up 17% of active hunters but 33% of new entrants. That is a striking number.

It suggests that while hunting is shrinking overall, some of the fresh energy coming in is

more diverse. The harvest report gives even more reason not to write off California archery just yet. CDFW's 2024 deer harvest report recorded 555 total deer harvested under archery-only tags. The numbers do not tell the whole story, but they tell enough: archery in California is not just surviving on nostalgia. It is still producing real participation and real results.

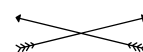
The bigger hunting world is shrinking, the national trend is real. California's overall license numbers are softening. But archery is hanging on. In many parts of this state, it is still one of the places where commitment, challenge, and opportunity all meet.

The truth is that strong demand alone will not carry this forward. If we want California archery to stay healthy, we need access. We need strong mentoring and pathways for new archery hunters.

Traditions do not keep themselves alive. People do. If California archery is going to stay strong, the people in this community will be the reason it does.

A big part of that comes down to the youth. In nearly every kind of activity, early involvement makes a lasting impact. When young people are introduced to archery in a positive, welcoming environment, they are far more likely to stay engaged and carry that interest forward.

That is why the family-friendly efforts happening at so many clubs deserve real recognition. Clubs that welcome families, create a good experience for beginners, and encourage youth participation are doing more than hosting events. They are helping protect the future of archery in California. Keep up the good work, and kudos to you for making that investment where it counts most.

Purpose & Overview

1. This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter and allows archers to compete using their hunting equipment. NFAA rules do not apply to this event.
2. The State Broadhead Tournament shall be a one- or two-day event held on Memorial Day Weekend
3. The Range and Vice President of Hunting or their delegates shall govern this tournament.
4. The range shall be laid out to simulate hunting conditions whenever possible.
5. Archers must use hunting broadheads that comply with California State Fish & Game laws for big game hunting.

A. Scoring

- 1 Vital – 10 | Kill – 8 | Wound – 5
- . Arrow must be in the target to score, except a pass-thru, which must be witnessed by other shooters in the group.
- 2 Bounce-ins and glance-offs do not score.
- 3 Antlers do not score.
- . Shaft touching the line earns the higher score.
- . Double scoring required.
- 5 This is a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.
- . 7a. Targets 40 yards and over will be marked.

4. Cubs and Peewees receive participation awards only.

- 1) Mechanical Broadheads must be operational
- 2) 12" Stabilizer restriction on Bowhunter Release class, class only.
- 3) Bow Quivers are allowed in all styles, but are REQUIRED in "Hunter Release" class
- 4) No magnifying scopes are allowed.
- 5) No Compound over 80 lbs peak draw weight. Rec Recurves and Longbows have no weight limit.

D) Tackle continued

- 6) NO RANGE FINDING DEVICES ALLOWED ON COURSE!!
- 7) Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish and Game codes at all times during the shoot
- 8) Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish and Game code (7/8 minimum diameter)
- 9) Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
- 10) All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
- 11) Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
- 12) Longbows: Any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
- 13) Longbows: Will be shot off the shelf.
- 14) Clickers allowed in all styles.
- 15) All Bows and Broadheads must be inspected on Saturday Morning. All Top Flights must be inspected on Sunday Morning.

E. Miscellaneous:

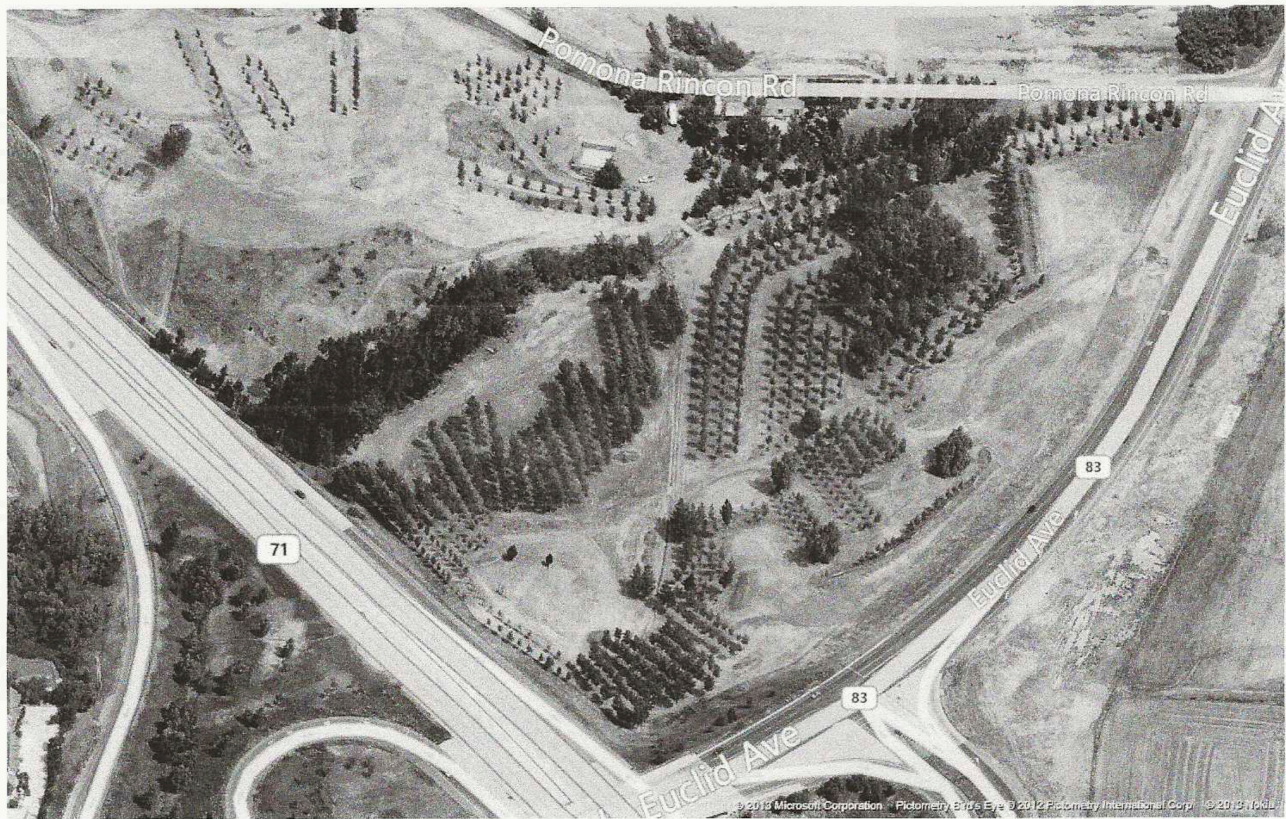
- 1) Cubs and Peewees will shoot field points only
- 2) Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
- 3) All Protests to the Protest Committee will be in writing within (30) thirty minutes of the end of the tournament each day and include a \$25 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
- 4) There must be a MINIMUM OF THREE shooters and a MAXIMUM OF SIX shooters per target each day.
- 5) ALL SHOOTERS WILL BE FLIGHTED BOTH DAYS OF THE TOURNAMENT. If you wish not to be flighted, then you can shoot in the guest class for no awards. Min 3 Max 6 shooters still applies. Cubs and Peewees will not be allowed to shoot in top-flight groups on second day. NO EXCEPTIONS. Parents will be responsible for their kids' care, if shooter is in top flight.
- 6) NO TARGET OR SIGHT NOTES ALLOWED (SIGHT TAPES OF)
- 7) No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will be assisted.
- 8) No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours except tournament officials.
- 9) Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
- 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
- 11) Cell phones allowed, pictures and promotion on social media encouraged.
- 12) Tournament officials will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
- 13) Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualification.
