

After a 19 year Pursuit... a tag of a lifetime is drawn!

Randy Long has been in archery and hunting for 62 years. His father, Rod Long, got their family into archery when he was 5 years old. In the early 1970s, he won his first award from the Small Game club, Stevens Creek Bowhunters (now Bowhunters Unlimited). So with many years of hunting under his belt now, he has definitely put in the time for the more premium hunts. Like so many other hunters who try some of the more premier locations offer a very small number of tags, and the odds of getting drawn are slim to none. But with persistence year after year, Randy put in for this Utah tag and really didn't expect the results to be any different.

But after the drawing was complete and the results were in. It finally happened. After 18 years of applying, year 19 was the year that he was finally selected for this Elk tag. Now let's see how the hunt went in Randy's words—

"I decided to use an Outfitter/Guide to help my odds of being successful and booked an 8-day hunt. My guide had a lease on some private property, and it held lots of elk, but of course, the biggest elk were on the property next door. The biggest elk would occasionally bed on our property, but we were not able to catch them in a spot where we could put a hunt on them. So we spent an equal amount of time in the national forest hunting. Continued page 6

Legislative Report

Greetings CBH/SAA friends and family!

It's almost time! We look forward to seeing you at the State Unmarked 3D Championship at Cherry Valley Bowhunters in Cherry Valley, CA on November 2, 2025. Please come support Cherry Valley Bowhunters and the CBH Legislative Defense Fund. The Legislative Committee has a great raffle planned, including prizes donated by OnX, Archery Republic, Morrell Targets, Vortex, Clean Waste, Moultrie, Artemis Defense, Turner's Outdoorsman/Riverside Archery, and more!

Following up on last month's article, Chriss Bowles, Bill Gaines and I participated in the September 11 Wildlife Resource Committee (WRC) meeting and provided public testimony in support of California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) proposals related to 2026 regulatory updates and tag allocations. Notably, there was no antihunter opposition on deer, elk, sheep or pronghorn proposals. That quickly ended after lunch when CDFW gave a great presentation on the Bear proposals including a second bear tag and expansion of the bear hunt zone.

Commission staff prefaced public comment with LOTS of contextual statements around the fact that bear hunting is legal in California and that ending bear hunting was not a topic for this meeting. Additionally, the Commission and CDFW staff were clear that "trophy" hunting is NOT legal in California. CDFW generally defined trophy hunting as taking certain parts of the animal and leaving substantial waste – again, not legal in California.

Overall, the comments were very civil with 22 of 29 speakers (including Chriss, Bill and me) speaking in support of expanding the bear hunt zone into Modoc County and adding a second bear tag. Typical comments in opposition included:

- Requests for CDFW to assess impacts of climate change on bear populations, to which CDFW noted that bears are HIGHTLY adaptive to climatic variables and a wide range of habitats.
- 2) Opposition to bear hunting based on "California values" (e.g., accusations that CDFW/FGC is "catering to 0.08% of Californians that hunt bear")
- Request that CDFW protect bears under the belief that bear hunting is cruel and does not resolve human/bear conflicts.

In the end, the Commissioners Zavaleta and Anderson approved moving all of the waterfowl and big game (deer, elk, sheep, pronghorn, bear) proposals forward to the Fish

and Game Commission (FGC) meeting on October 8. To listen to or participate in the FGC meeting, check out https://fgc.ca.gov/Meetings/2025.

Reminder: Whether you have been involved in archery or hunting your whole life, or are new to this sport, you have something of value to add to the conversation, and I encourage you to reach out to me and the CBH Legislative Committee to share your knowledge and experience! We look forward to hearing from you soon!

"The weather was warm and the moon was reaching full at the beginning of my hunt. We did see a herd of elk every day, but I didn;t see what I was looking for.

"On day 5 we saw a large group of elk feeding off the neighboring property to ours, so we made a plan and started up after them. As we moved up the hill on an old skid road, we saw the cows in the group heading right down the road we were on. It was right as the sun was coming up. We quickly got behind a little cover and waited to see how this would play out.

"The cows were moving fairly quickly right at us, clearing the cover at about 40 yards. I thought two cows and a calf were going to pass within a few feet, but at about 15 feet, they could see something didn't look right and bailed off the road to our left. As soon as they did, I could see a cow about 30 yards away turn broadside and stop to look our way because the cows changed direction. I could also see the antlers of a big bull coming down the road right behind her. As soon as she decided to move off the road I came to full draw, I saw the bull stop at about 35 yards facing me but as I settled into anchor and tried to look through my peep site, all I could see was the sun. It was just over his back and to the left but my peep was funneling all the light into my eye. As that was happening the bull decided something wasn't right, he spun and left the way he came. Super exciting, but no opportunity to shoot. That's just how it goes most of the time.

I was determined and definitely wasn't giving up.

"On the second to last day of our hunt we got a tip that the bulls were screaming in an area of the national forest so the next morning we were there. Unfortunately, they weren't where the tip led us, but we quickly located them a few miles down the road.

"We could hear them down the canyon and up on the other side of the mountain, so we headed down after them. As we approached, we cow called and blew a few location bull bugles to keep them interested and also to let them know that we were on our way. This usually plays out one of two ways. Either the bulls gather their cows and move out, or if we can close the gap fast enough and call close to them, maybe they will try to defend their cows and come to us and fight or run off what they think is a new bull.

"We were able to get to some aspens on our side of the mountain, a couple of hundred yards off the bottom, and use them to quickly close the gap to about 100 yards. When we got as close as the cover would allow, we set up to call again. As soon as we did the bulls, a heard bull and 3 satellites got fired up, they started raking trees, bugling back and coming our way. Two bulls broke off. I couldn't see the one to my right, but the other one was a nice bull coming down the other side and back up in a direction toward me to my left. He only stopped once, when he did, I could see where he was going to break out of the cover. I moved a couple of steps to give me the best shot.

"Just as he was about to clear my cover I drew, and he walked right out and stopped 20 yards away, giving me a great shot. All I can remember is putting the pin in his chest and starting my execution. The bow went off, and the arrow disappeared right behind where my pin was. He only went about 15 yards and stopped, a couple seconds later he fell right there.

"After 19 years, I had not only drawn a tag, but ended this hunt successfully and meat in the freezer. What an exciting moment.

"Playing the point game has a slow payoff, but, in most cases, it pays eventually for your average species. Be patient, make other plans while you build up your points and hopefully you will have opportunities to hunt all the species you desire."

Wow, what an amazing experience Randy had and what a hunt. From learning a new area and not seeing the animals he was looking for. Then almost having the sunlight ruin his opportunity of getting a worthy bull. But one thing Randy did was not give up and in the end he became successful with giving that bull a dirt nap after 19 years when his arrow hit the bullseye. (Literally) Way to go Randy and wish you nothing but success on all your future hunts and adventures with a bow in hand.

Every Arrow that hits a bull's eye is the result of a hundred of misses!

Hi all members.

I would like to officially introduce myself to all of you. My name is Andrew Mack, and I'm the new Small Game Chair.

I have been a bow fisherman and an archer for many years. With bowfishing, it turned into such a passion that I started a guide business where I take new archers and show them how to bowfish on various waters throughout the state. I've been bowfishing for over 14 years now, and every day I'm on the water, it feels like that first day excitement all over again.

There is nothing like chasing game with a bow in hand. From my years of experience and professionally doing it, bow fishing has also turned into many depredation occurrences where lake management or private entities will have me come out and do some carp invasive species control. I usually take out thousands of carp a year, all year long. Just recently, I took the largest Channel Catfish [see award on page 12] from big bear lake and the largest catfish ever taken legally by bowfishing equipment in the state.

Since there is only three legal bodies of water to bowfish for catfish in California; Big Bear lake, Lake Isabella, and the Delta. The take of catfish was only recently passed in 2018. That was mainly to do with CBH and all its hard work.

On the fishing side of things, I am on a television show, Angler Chronicles. We broadcast weekly on cable, streaming and Direct TV on the FanDuel network. I also do many seminars all year for fishing clubs, hunting clubs, and some trade shows where I speak in front of large crowds about bowfishing, archery, and fishing. Now will implement CBH in those seminars.

I am also an IGFA (International Game Fish Association) representative for the state of California, the association that keeps all the world records for angling, both fresh and saltwater. So this position of small game chairman is right in my wheelhouse.

My goal was for IGFA when I became a part of the

organization was to get more anglers not just chase records. It's important to me to get them excited We have a new Small Game Chairman! I have put about fishing. Its a great activity for the entire family to get on the lake or ocean. I also want to bring awareness to what the IGFA is and stands for.

> CBH. As far as archery and bowfishing, I will work on getting more members. But apart from this also I'll advocate for archery education. I love being out there bowfishing or hunting game and fish that are legal to take, but one thing I'm always adamant about is safety—that's number one.

Something I've noticed, especially with organizations like the IGFA, is

that when things feel stagnant or unattainable, people tend to lose interest. For example, if the record for a bluefin tuna is 1,560 pounds and it was set back in the '80s—with the runner-up being 300 pounds lighter—let's be honest, the odds of anyone breaking that are pretty slim.

So the question becomes: how do you get people excited again? One great way is by adding female and junior divisions. When that happened elsewhere, it got families involved—women and kids out there together—and that brought new life and energy into the sport.

That's exactly what I plan to do here at CBH as the Small Game Chair. I'll be applying what I've learned in the past to add valuer in this new role. One way will be to introduce a Women's Division and a Junior Division (15 and under) for bowfishing, starting with Carp and Tilapia, since those are currently the two recognized small game species for weight records.

Down the road, I'd like to add a few more popular fish species too. When these new divisions launch, any records will only count from the start date forward—no old records will carry over. This gives everyone a fresh start and encourages more bowfishermen (and women!) to get out there and set some new records.

The goal here is to bring more families into the mix. There's nothing quite like seeing a kid light up when their name lands in a record book—especially when they can tell their friends they're in the top five. That excitement spreads. It gets the next generation talking, joining in, and keeping the sport alive. This is just one of several ideas I have, but I believe in taking small steps and building momentum the right way.

Thank you all for having me—I'm excited for what's ahead. Great things are coming.

Between Breath and Release: Archery's Timeless Journey

You wake before sunrise, step into the woods. The ground is damp, the air sharp with that crispness you only feel in the early hours. You nock an arrow, feel the bow bend against your draw, and for a moment the world goes quiet. That pause between breath and release is timeless. It's the same pause our ancestors felt thousands of years ago when survival depended on the arc of a single arrow.

Long before rifles and supermarkets, hunters relied on bows carved from wood and arrows tipped with stone. From caves in South Africa, archaeologists uncovered ancient arrowheads dating back more than 70,000 years, proof that archery is one of humanity's oldest skills. Imagine stalking a deer with nothing but a hand-shaped bow and a sharp flint point, your family's next meal riding on your shot. That was life, every day, for millennia.

Over time, the bow became more than just a hunting tool. Egyptians painted archers on their tomb walls. Chinese emperors held archery contests to test warriors. Medieval armies rose and fell by the skill of their longbowmen. Even when firearms took the battlefield, the bow never truly disappeared; it transformed. It became a sport, a practice, a way for us to stay rooted in something ancient while living in the modern world.

For hunters today, archery offers more than meat in the freezer. Every time you step into the woods with a bow, you slow down and pay attention; the wind's direction, the shift of a deer's ears, the snap of a branch underfoot.

Bowhunting forces you to be part of the land, not just a passerby, and it's not just about personal gain.

The license fees and equipment taxes fund most wildlife conservation in this country. Every arrow shot is, in its own way, an investment in the future of wild places.

Archery challenges the body as much as the spirit. Drawing a bow works your shoulders, chest, back, and core. A day of shooting leaves you sore like a gym workout. But it's more than muscle. Every shot is a test of patience, balance, and timing. Some bowhunters say it feels like meditation. Focusing on the target clears your mind, leaving only you, the bow, and the arrow in flight.

Why do kids light up when they pick up a bow for the first time? Maybe it's because of movies like The Hunger Games, maybe it's because bows make them feel like adventurers. Archery grabs their imagination! Opportunities like the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) take that spark and turn it into discipline and confidence. In schools across North America, kids in grades 4 through 12 learn how to focus, control their breathing, and follow through on every shot. Teachers report students carrying those lessons into the classroom with better concentration, more patience, and more self-confidence.

Archery's magic is that it bridges past and present. Each time you draw a bow, you stand in the footsteps of Stone Age hunters, medieval warriors, and Olympic athletes. You carry forward a tradition that has fed families, defended nations, and inspires the next generation.

So, the next time you step onto a range, or into the woods with your bow, remember you're not just pulling a string. You're pulling on a thread that runs through all of human history. And with every arrow released, you're keeping that story alive.

Tree Stands, Wild Boars, and Secrets Found In The Forest

On my recent trip to Europe, we took a tour bus from Passau in the Bavarian region of Germany to Salzburg, Austria. The countryside was beautiful, and it was understandable why *The Sound of Music* was filmed there; rolling green hills, quaint villages, and Salzburg itself sparkled with a special charm. I loved it! The villages with beautifully painted homes, fields, and forest areas. If you haven't been, you might want to schedule a trip. I highly recommend Viking cruises; it was an experience of a lifetime.

Our tour guide, Carson, who had recently been to Poway, a community in the San Diego area where my family lives, it's such a small world, pointed ourt many noteworthy sights along the way.

Carson explained that the forests are full of mostly unused "hoqhsitz" or hunting stands. The hunters are few and far between these days. But it was why this was true, that was something I didn't expect. If a wild boar is taken in this region, it can't be eaten or sold until a local veterinarian tests the meat for radioactive isotopes and gives it the approval as *safe to eat*. This has changed hunting in the area from what he told us. Many just don't want to be bothered. Seeing the article in last month's newsletter about "blue meat," made me think that there could be even more many areas may be usafe to hunt.



Here are the details. The nuclear accident in 1986 occurred at the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant near the town of Pripyat (then a part of the Soviet Union, now in Ukraine). The radiation spread across Europe and as far away as Scandinavia and the U.K. In addition, some say contamination

may also be from the Cold War nuclear weapons testing. However, even decades later, wild boars in Bavaria and Austria still carry cesium in their bodies. A 2023 study found that 88% of sampled boar meat in Germany exceeded safe consumption limits.

You may be asking why only boars? The answer is simple: Wild boars dig deep and root for a specific type of truffle that absorbs these radioactive elements from the soil, rather than grass or farmed crops. This dietary preference means they continually ingest contaminants that other surface-feeding animals don't eat. Deer and other game usually test fine, but even all of these years later, wild boar remain at risk.

Back in California, if you didn't see last month's newsletter, hunters have faced a different kind of warning: "blue meat." In Monterey County, wild pigs have been found with bright blue flesh and fat, a condition caused by a rodenticide called diphacinone. The dye in the bait literally shows up in the animal's tissue. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife has warned hunters: if you see blue-tinged meat or fat, don't eat it. Report it. What's even more unsettling? An animal can be poisoned without showing the telltale blue at all.

Whether it's cesium in Salzburg or rodenticide in California, the message is the same: hunting doesn't end with the shot. We owe it to ourselves to be responsible, get more information, heed the warnings, and pay attention to what's hidden beneath the surface.

Many people don't know that any member of NFAA has the ability to write an agenda for a rule change; all they need to do is get together with their director, for California, it's me, and write something up.

we will adopt these rules.) this will also allow all age groups.

CA-01 pass these will be the new rules for **LONGBOW**

- A one, two or three piece straight ended bow constructed of wood or any non-metallic material with limbs which are not to be adjusted during competition. When the bow is braced, the string must not touch the limbs between the notches on the limb
- 2. No laminations, marks or blemishes on the belly of the bow or in the sight window will be legal.
- 3. The bow may contain a window, an arrow shelf with strike plate. The strike plate may not exceed more than one inch above the shelf. No mechanical or elevated rests may be used.
- 4. Bow quivers are allowed

A; all arrows must be same size and weight as competition arrows

B; no part of quiver or arrow it is holding shall be visible in sight window

- 5. No clickers, draw-checks, sights, stabilizers, counterweights or levels will be allowed.
- 6. The string may be of any color but must have a single-color center serving. One single nocking point permitted. One or two nock locators may be used. Any marks or string attachments other than brush buttons and string silencers will be illegal.
- 7. The archer shall touch the arrow when nocked and drawing the arrow with the index finger against the nock.
- 8. Finger position may not be changed during competition.
- 9. Gloves, tabs or fingers shall be the only legal releases. Bow slings are permissible. In the case of physical disability of the arm or hand, a chew strap may be used in place of fingers.
- 10. All arrows shall be identical in length, weight, diameter and fletching with allowance for wear and tear.
- 11. During the day of competition, no adjustments may be made to the bow and/or its related equipment unless equipment failure is recognized.
- 12. For all tournaments below the Sectional level, all longbow archers may shoot at Youth distances at the discretion of each State or Club.

C-08 pass allows Junior archers to move up to older classes and then return to to there age class.

Where Do "Bad Bears" Go in California?

If you've spent time in the mountains, you've probably heard the stories — the late-night crashes at the dumpster, the claw marks on cabin doors, the ice chest ripped clean out of the back of a truck. That's the work of California's so-called "bad bears."

These aren't evil animals. They're smart, hungry, and opportunistic — just trying to make a living the easy way. Once a bear figures out that people mean food, it's a short road to trouble. They pry open car doors, tear through tents, and break into cabins, driven by a memory sharper than most dogs and a nose that can smell a snack a mile away



The sad truth? This behavior almost always starts with us. A sandwich left out. A trash can without a lock. Or someone tossing scraps "just this once." And once a bear gets a taste of human food, it rarely goes back to eating berries and grubs. When that easy food disappears, desperation takes over. And desperate bears make dangerous neighbors.

This isn't a new story. Back in 1933, the California Fish and Game Commission tried relocating Yosemite's problem bears to the Big Bear area, hoping they'd rediscover the wild. But bears have strong homing instincts — many simply wandered back or started new conflicts somewhere else.

Today, it's the same song in a different key. Around Lake Tahoe, bears break into homes, rummage through cars, and wander down main streets like they own the place. Wildlife officers do their best, but relocation doesn't always work. Sometimes, the story ends with a hard choice no one wants to make.

For hunters, the lesson is personal. Black bears might not be as fierce as grizzlies, but they're powerful, unpredictable, and quick to defend what they see as theirs. A food-conditioned bear can turn dangerous fast. That's why experienced hunters

never go in solo— not just a tradition, but plain good sense.

In the end, where "bad bears" go depends on us. When people lock up trash, stash food, and respect wildlife boundaries, fewer bears cross the line. But when they do, it's the animals who pay the price. Every "bad bear" started out as a good one — until someone made it too easy to forget how to be wild.

Tragic Bear Encounters

"A deadly incident in California has been confirmed as the state's first known fatal attack by a black bear. Patrice Miller, 71, of Downieville, was initially thought to have died before a bear entered her home in November. However, a recent autopsy report confirmed the bear caused her death, likely from a swipe or bite to the neck," according to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW).

The CDFW spokesperson, Peter Tira, called the case "the most extreme example" of conflict, noting that Miller had a history of bear issues on her property, often leaving cat food and trash unsecured—factors that cause bears to lose their natural fear. The bear, a male, was later trapped and euthanized, with DNA confirming its involvement in the tragedy.

This incident highlights the increasing severity of human-wildlife conflict, echoing a separate incident in Carbon County, Pennsylvania. There, a man was attacked by a bear whose highly aggressive behavior was later attributed to **rabies**. See the full story on this YouTube Link: Youtube: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=OY9F5r-NiFc. In the Pennsylvania case, a quick-thinking neighbor shot and killed the diseased bear, saving the victim's life.

When we walk in our neighborhoods, we rarely consider the danger of **animal predators**. Yet, powerful animals are growing bolder, seeing human homes and campsites as easy targets for food. This behavior can escalate, leading to rare but tragic encounters, such as those recently reported in California and Pennsylvania. Hunters are naturally attuned to their surroundings, but this danger demands a conversation about **situational awareness** with family and friends who may not be.



Styles in Young Adult, Youth & Cub: Barebow, Barebow Recurve, Bowhunter Freestyle, Freestyle & Freestyle Limited Recurve, Longbow aluminum/carbon, Longbow wood and Recurve off the shelf & Traditional.

Style in Professional: Freestyle. Professional Divisions include: Adult, Senior, Silver Senior & Master Senior.

In CBH/SAA State Shoots, the following rules will apply; Longbow-wood and Longbow any arrow. Longbow archers shoot the youth distance out to 50 yards. In CBH/SAA State Shoots, CBH/SAA will recognize the Recurve-off the shelf; maximum distance for this class shall be 50 yards.

SECTION F:CBH/SAA STATE 3-D (UNMARKED) CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

(excerpts relevant to shooters)

GENERAL WORKING MECHANICS

- 1) This tournament will consist of a minimum of 42 life-sized animal targets at unmarked distances.
- 2) This tournament shall be a one-(1) arrow tournament.
- 3) Participants must be a NFAA/CBH/SAA member or a CBH/SAA Associate Member and a resident of the state of California or declared residency or have a reciprocal agreement with NFAA on file, at the time of registration to participate for awards.
- 6) In the case of a non-piggybacked tournament, the archers will be assigned a target to shoot with their competition. This will happen in the case of a 1-day tournament or a 2-day tournament.

8) SCORING:

- a) Scoring shall be: Inner Kill Ring= 10 points, Outside Vital Ring= 8 points, Balance of Animal= 5 points.
- b) Scoring on buck/doe combinations shall be as noted above for an arrow in the buck. A hit on the does shall be scored as 0 points.
- c) An arrow must remain in the animal to be scored.
- d) Skip-ins will not be scored. (e.g., 0 points)
- e) An arrow must touch the line to score in the higher scoring area.
- f) No mulligans or doe tags are permitted.
- g) Ties will be decided by a sudden death shoot-off.

9). DIVISIONS AND AWARDS:

- a) Shooting Divisions and Styles shall follow CBH/SAA Standing Rules Article I Tournaments, Section A Tournament Shooting Styles. (See Above)
- b) Awards will be First through Third Place in each division.
- d) A single guest division shall be set up for non-members of CBH/SAA. Shooters in this division shall not be eligible for awards.
- **12) PROTESTS:** Protests will cost \$50.00. A protest can be filed, only by a registered archer of said tournament, or the parent/guardian if juvenile is going to protest, at any time during the tournament or within 30 minutes of conclusion of the shooting day. The 2nd V.P and/or designated Tournament Chairman will rule on the protest. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be refunded.
