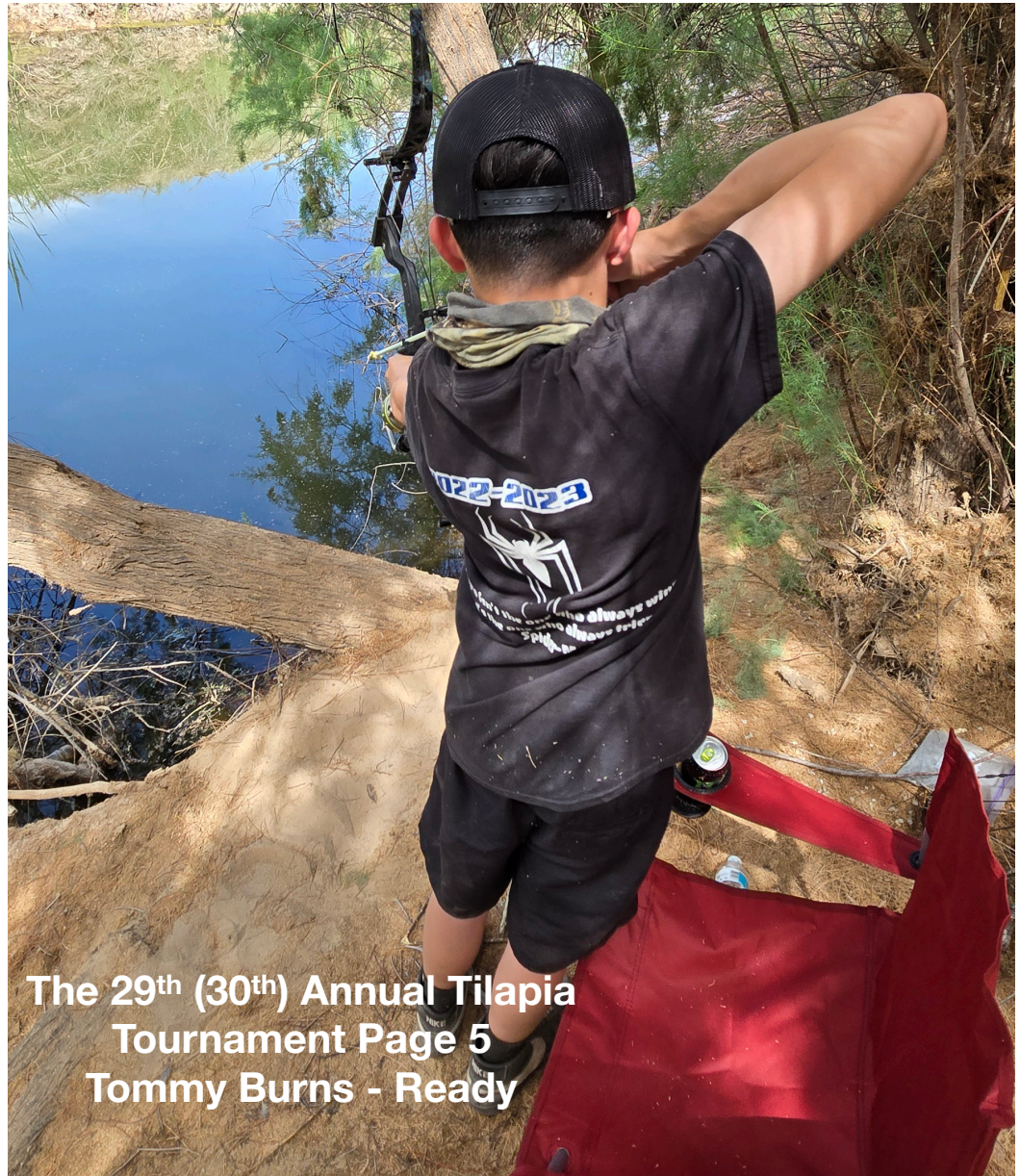

I attended the Fish and Game Commission meeting on April 16th and 17th and had a quick 3 minutes to testify in regard to the Big Game tag allocations for the 25/26 hunting season. It was my intention to be there in person, but scheduling just didn't work out. Your CBH/SAA Legislative team headed up by Amanda Duchardt has done a great job securing additional Archery Only Elk tags for the upcoming season. It's 30 new tags with 20 of them being Bull tags. That's if my count is correct. These tags are spread across 3 hunt units in Northern and Central California. This is a huge win for bowhunters in California. PLEASE get your name in and put in for these tags for 25/26. We worked hard to get these tags, and if the archery community doesn't show interest, they will re-allocate these tags to the General Season. We don't want that! Hunting licenses and draw applications are out, so get in on these today. I will head up to Sacramento mid-month to attend the WRC meeting and hopefully begin the process of getting some additional Bear season concessions and maybe even talk about some Archery Only Sheep tags. Wouldn't that be cool?! More details to follow as they become available.

I attended the HCC meeting virtually this last week, which was also very informative. If you haven't had a chance to jump into an HCC meeting, you should take a minute and do it. There are only about 25 people, and 10 are department folks. They usually last for about 4 hours, and you can drop off anytime. It's a very

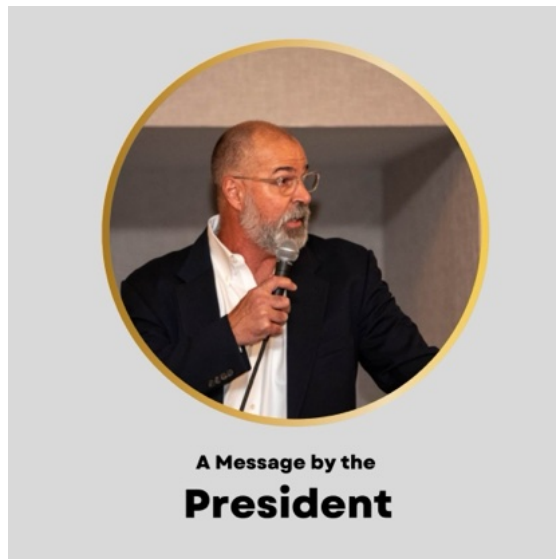
relaxed and open forum and lends itself well to open discussion among several other conservation-minded stakeholders. We had a very good discussion about bears and other large predators, as well as the recent coyote and wolf issues.

As we move forward in the 25/26 regulatory cycle, it will be important to stay informed on our state's (lack of) predator management policy.

Please take a minute to drop a line to your CBH/SAA legislative team with any questions, comments, or requests. We are working hard to make bowhunting a priority here in California.

A couple of archery tournaments of note this month. Congratulations to all the winners at Break the Barriers! Mike Hernandez and his team always do a first-class job running BTB and I know a great time was had by all. Also, congratulations to those at The Fresno Safari. The

Fresno team has been hosting this shoot for years and always has a great turnout and usually good weather. I haven't seen the scores yet, but I'm sure there were some top shooters there as well. By the time this gets to you Redding Western Classic will be in the books. Hopefully everyone is headed up there for the first weekend in May. The team at Straight Arrow always puts on a first-class shoot. Please also get the State Broadhead in the schedule. We are looking forward to a large crowd at Oranco for this year's shoot, and it promises to be a great one. Continued

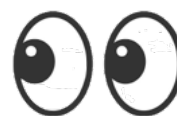

Tilapia Tournament Cont from page 5 After arriving at the PVC Park, I began signing in the 12 participants. At 7 o'clock, I addressed the group, provided the rules, answered questions, and then took a few group photos.

The participants this year were made up of mostly the "Old Guard" that have been coming for many years. I'm grateful to have been able to attend every year since the beginning of this tournament, which allows me to see friends I have known for decades, to make new friends, and this year was no exception.

The Old Guard includes the Roney family... Grandpa Gary, Dylan and his son, "Tilapia Slayer (TS)" 15-year-old Jack; one half of the Carp Coroner Team...Jake Ashbaugh; "Mr. Almost Triple Golden Eagle" Brad Grap; "The Lookout for Border Patrol" Joey Ramirez; Matt and Tommy Burns, "From The Hood 2 The Woods (FTH2TW)" Cat Zamora; and completing the Old Guard was the "Carp Killer" Jim Teel and his boat. We also had a new participant, "At His Own Risk" Corey Alderson, who hangs around with Joey...at his own risk!

Everyone is always anxious to hit the canals and get to shooting, so after that we wished everyone good luck and we went our separate ways. One thing I have learned during the 29 years of hosting or participating in this tournament is that the early bird does NOT necessarily get the worm, so to speak.

Tilapia aren't in any big rush to head to their favorite daytime spots or come near the surface until around 9 or 10 a.m.—that's when the sun hits the water just right, warming things up and giving them a chance to soak in the rays.

In fact, from 9am to 4pm is my favorite window of time to bowfish. That's when you can catch them moving into their daytime haunts, sunning themselves, and then heading back to deeper water. So, most of the time there is no real rush to get going but you just never know so off we go.

On Saturday, I shot my first fish at 9:30am and Jack shot the first of his 15 tilapia just before that. There is no mandatory time to weigh the fish from the day's successes on Saturday. However, after the sun is low in the sky and we can't see into the water we usually set up the scale and do an official weigh in. Continued next page.

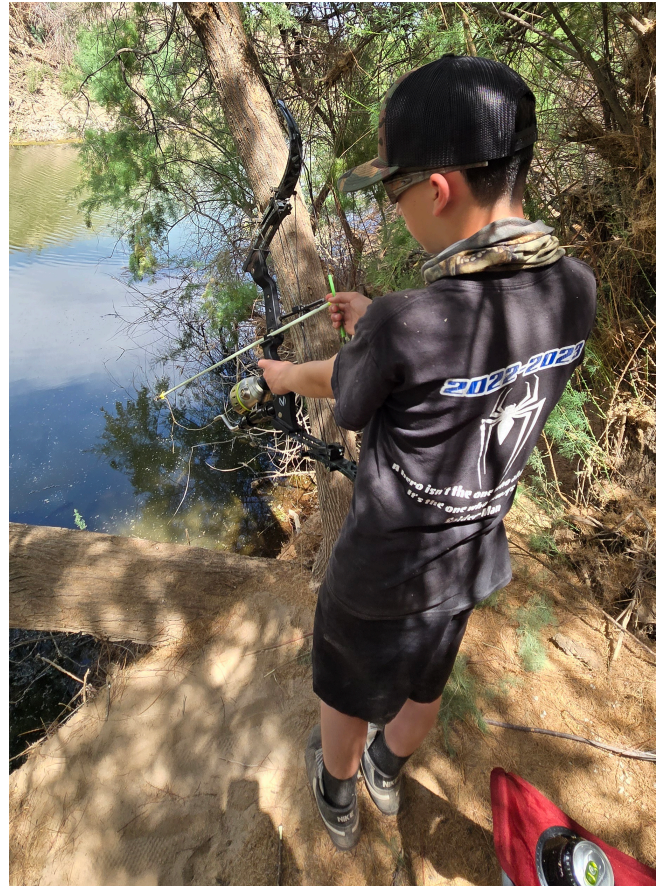
But on Sunday, there is a mandatory weigh in time which is 1pm. If you are not back at the PVC Park and haven't checked in with the host at the 1pm deadline the fish you have are not weighed on our Certified Official Scale, and are disqualified. So, for that reason it is always a good idea to weigh your Saturday fish on Saturday just in case you get delayed.

There is another reason to weigh your fish as soon as possible which is the fish start losing weight right away, **Dylan Roney**, and that can mean someone else's fresher fish can weigh one or two ounces more than your ugly dried-up one would weigh.

On Saturday, I was back at the PVC Park around 4:45pm and got the scales, table and chairs set up and waited for the group to come in. After most of the guys had arrived, we started weighing the fish. Some only had tilapia, some only had carp while others had a mixed bag of both. I was happy to see several guys had fish, which means they had a good day. Everyone got shots at fish but for one reason or another they couldn't connect.

Gary was the first person that came over to my table and he sat down. I asked him how the "TS"

Jack had done, and he said...."You had better get more than one pen and a couple spiral note pads because he has a bunch.". TS started pulling some good-sized Tilapia out of the ice chest.

The first six he weighed went from 3 lbs. 3 oz all the way to 5 lbs. 2 oz. His total for the day was 15 Tilapia with two over the big 5 lbs. mark, just like he did last year.

Grandpa Gary is primarily just along for the ride, so he didn't shoot anything. Dylan Roney turned in one Tilapia and one carp, both were respectable fish that could be placing him on the podium.

Matt and Tommy Burns had a bunch of near misses but nothing to bring to the scale. When I say "Near Misses" I mean it. Their arrows were so close to the fish they made the fish jump out of the water!.

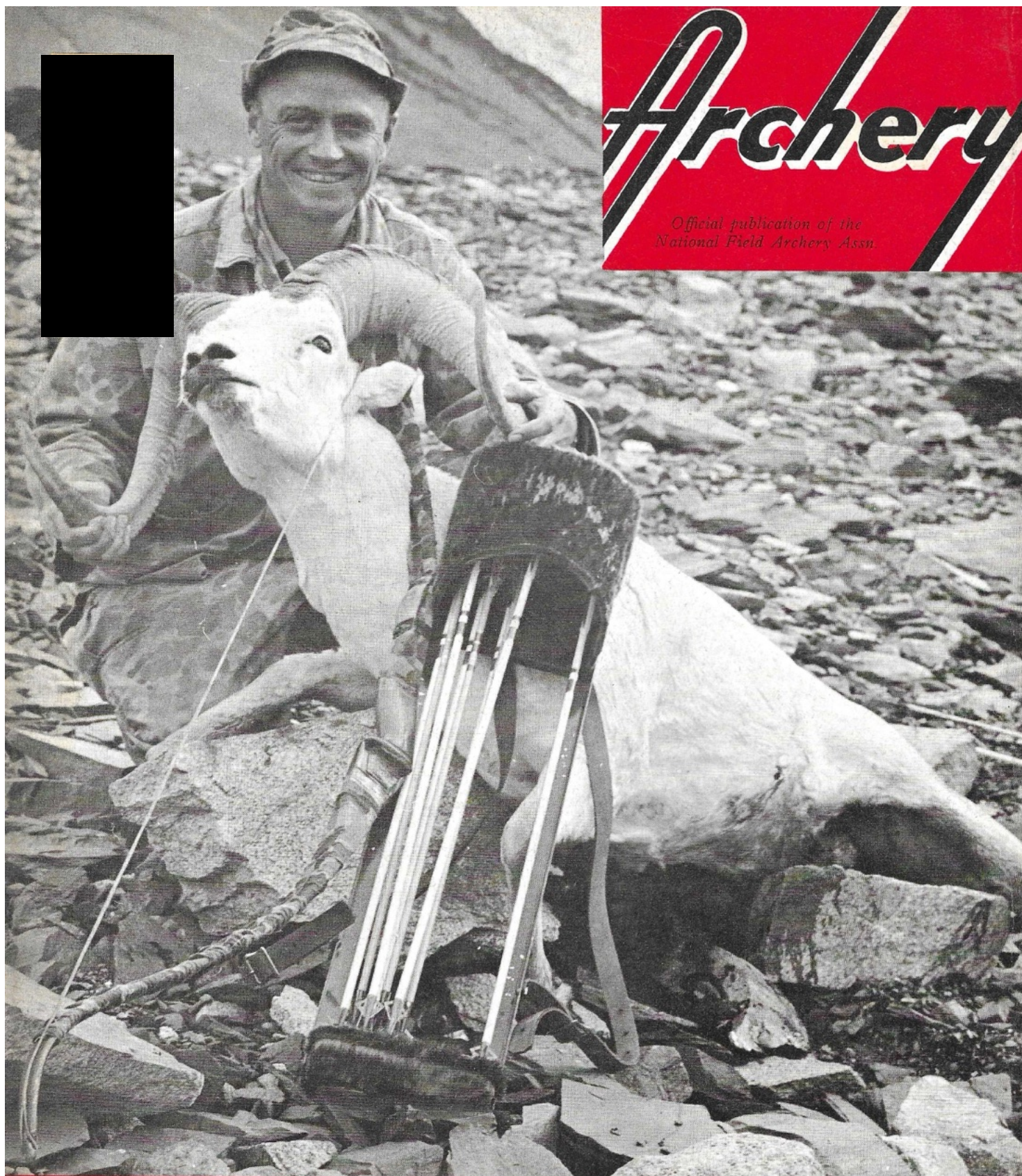

*Catalina--***New
Archery
Frontier**

How many times have you gone hunting and seen 300 animals in a day? How many times have you gone out with 24 arrows and wondered if it would be enough? This is CATALINA! This fantastic hunting land gives the novice a chance to break the ice and kill the hardest, his first big game. It gives the expert an opportunity to match wits and try for a real trophy.

This is the first archery season Catalina has ever had. In the past the Island has been open only to the more financially able clientel, with rates ranging anywhere from \$60 to \$100 a day. Through the efforts of the Vice President of the Interior, Doug Probst, and the new game manager, Fred Kindel, Catalina has come up with the nation's finest archery program. It concludes a 12-month season for Spanish goats and Russian boar, with other game such as quail and dove following the normal California seasons.

To start this program, there have been three experi-

at about 5:00 a.m., and board the modern motor cruiser, the Cabrillo. During the hour and forty-five minute cruise, hot coffee and doughnuts are served, and everyone is briefed on what to expect on the Island. Upon arrival in Avalon, breakfast awaits the docking of the boat. After a hearty round of ham and eggs, the hunters are boarded onto a bus and bound for their particular camp sites. The bus ride is a scenic one, winding 15 miles back into the interior. It is possible to see goats, bear, buffalo, deer, quail, dove and pheasants along the way. After reaching camp there's a mad scramble, and everyone usually is off for the hunt by about 9:00 a.m. After two full days of hunting, the bus reloads and returns the group to Avalon for dinner; the return cruise to the mainland is full of the wildest hunting tales you have ever heard!

The archers have had a 65% kill on the average which is a terrific percentage for bow hunters. There have been 40 to 50 archers on each hunt, and all of them have had many shots. After the hunts, questionnaires were sent to each of the participants to evaluate the program. Needless to say, it has proved very successful.

This program is just the first step in Catalina's game management program. With the revenue from hunting, they are going to plant exotic game animals and game birds such as barbary sheep, wild turkey, chukar, partridge and pheasant. Catalina will become one of the finest year around hunting grounds in the west.

The two archery camp sites are situated in beautiful sheltered valleys of Catalina's rugged, unspoiled terrain. They are located in two of the finest hunting areas of the Island. The camp sites include large wooden-floored tents accommodating up to eight people. Sanitary facilities, fire wood, fire places, cooking pits, picnic tables, fresh water, axes and shovels are all provided.

Hunters should bring their own foodstuffs, bedding and whatever else they may consider necessary for a minimum of two days of camping. Equipment should include:

Lots of arrows (at least two dozen)

Extra bowstrings

Snake-bit kit

Skinning knife

Small woodsman's saw for removing horns

Small flashlight in case you don't make it back to camp until after dark

A police whistle is handy in case of emergency

Small piece of rope

File

Boots rather than tennis shoes (cactus!)

These are suggested along with the other hunting gear you would normally carry.

There are several convenient means of travel available between the mainland and Catalina. Large groups of forty or more or organized week-end hunting groups may charter the modern cruiser, the Cabrillo, at a special round trip rate of \$6.80 per person. Small groups of hunters and families may choose among the following:

1. Island boat service motor cruiser with regular sailings leaving Wilmington at 9:45 a.m. daily, \$7.50 round trip.
2. Catalina Channel Airlines has flights from Long Beach at 8 and 10 a.m. and 2, 4, and 5 p.m. daily. The rate is \$10.74 round trip.
3. Avalon Airlines charter information will be supplied.
4. Private planes: Catalina's "Airport in the Sky" is one of the finest small airports in Southern California. It's open to the public and offers excellent tie-down and parking facilities. Bow hunters who wish to fly to Catalina by private or chartered plane will be met at the airport and transported to the hunting grounds free of charge.

BOW HUNTING RATES

A minimum of two days hunting is required at the following rates:

Men—\$20 a day, includes one free goat tag (trophy size)

Women—\$10 a day

Junior hunters (ages 12-17)—\$10 a day

Children may accompany families free of charge

Non-hunters pay half price

Each animal taken with bow and arrow requires a tag.

Trophy goats (18-inch spread or better) and goats are \$3. Wild boar are \$20. There is

number of wild goats which may be taken, whereas the wild boar are limited to one per hunter.

All bow hunting facilities are reserved for large group hunts on the third week-end of each month. All other week-ends are available for small groups or family hunts. Only the large organized hunts are limited to two days; other groups of hunters can stay as long as they desire.

RESERVATIONS

Advance reservations are necessary, and a deposit of \$20 per hunter is required to confirm reservations. For information, contact Fred Kindel, Santa Catalina Island Company, Box B-2, Avalon, California, or phone Avalon 605; or Jim Dougherty, Kittredge Bow Hut, South Pasadena, California, phone SYcamore 9-3090.

NOTE: In connection with the NFAA National Tournament, there will be a chartered aircraft for those participants who would like to take in a two-day hunt on the Island. There will be more information on this at the National site in Enchanted Forest.
